The Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers (SHPE) is a dynamic organization organized at a time when the nation's industry is calling for an increase in minorities in engineering. A recent report by the Planning Commission for Expanding Minority Opportunities in Engineering, chaired by Louis Padulo, Director of the Special Opportunities Program at Stanford University, asks for a national objective of a ten to fifteen-fold increase in the supply of minority engineering graduates within the next decade. Rodrigo Garcia, President of SHPE, has guided the organization to work toward this goal and, in addition, to seek upward mobility for practicing Hispanic professional engineers. These objectives will be realized through the use of programs aimed at promoting interest and participation by Hispanos in the engineering profession.

SHPE, in conjunction with the major universities of Los Angeles, is developing a program directed at the local junior and senior high schools in an effort to motivate and assist minority students seeking engineering as a career. Members of the organization have already participated in high school and college career days and referred high school students to California State University, Los Angeles, (CSULA) where they have been placed in the School of Engineering.



SHPE feels that it is not enough only to place engineering students in college, but also feels that the students' career should be continuously motivated. Consequently, SHPE has organized student chapters on the campuses for this purpose. Presently, a chapter exists at the University of Southern California which has named itself, Chicanos in Engineering. In addition, chapters are currently being considered at CSULA and California State University at Long Beach (CSULB). These chapters will provide a group of Spanish-surnamed students organized to handle their peculiar problems and develop comradeship, as in fraternities.

In order to further fortify these students, SHPE has been able to develop summer jobs in engineering for them. For instance, last summer, SHPE was instrumental in developing and implementing a \$100,000 student engineering program with the City of Los Angeles. Fifty students were hired for three months of employment especially designed to expose minority and women students to engineering. SHPE's direct involvement resulted in twenty of the positions being filled with Spanish-surnamed students. Last year's program was such a success that the City's Bureau of Engineering has asked the City Council to continue the program this year. SHPE is already mobilizing itself to create another successful program. SHPE was also asked by private industry to refer students for summer employment.



The organization believes in a total integrated program to meet the needs of students and professionals. Not only is SHPE involved with students, it is currently seeking to develop a talent bank of Hispanic professional engineers to be referred to interested employers. The goal SHPE is striving toward is a total unity of Hispanic students and Hispanic professionals and, ultimately, of all Hispanos.

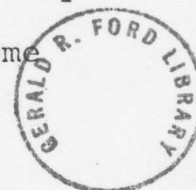
The organization has already received support from industry, governmental agencies and educators. The City Council of the City of Los Angeles recently bestowed a resolution to SHPE which reads as follows:

The membership of SHPE extends throughout the State of California. A professional chapter of the organization is currently being formed in the San Francisco area. SHPE hopes to become



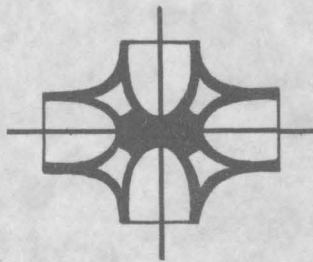

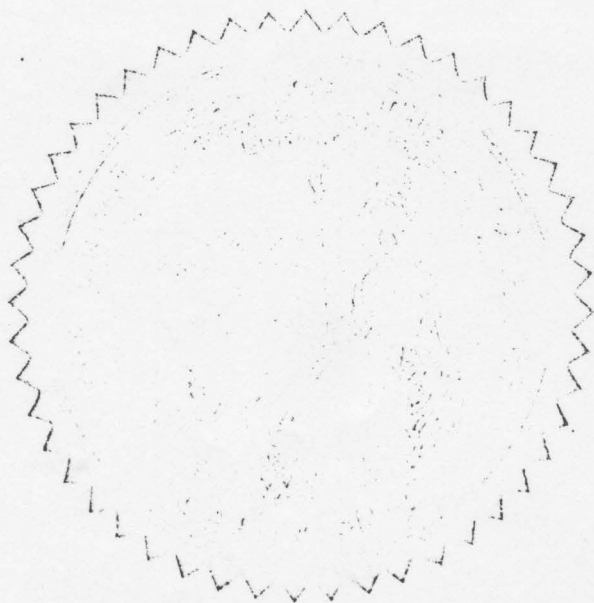

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
OF

THE SOCIETY OF HISPANIC PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS, INC.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is: THE SOCIETY OF HISPANIC PROFESSIONAL ENGINEERS, INC..

ARTICLE II

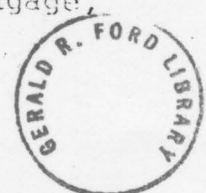
The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

(a) The specific and primary purposes are:

1. To advance Hispanic professional engineers in employment, education, economic and social welfare;
2. To improve the quality of education and training programs preparing Hispanic students to become professional engineers;
3. To implement programs benefiting Hispanics seeking to become engineers;
4. To increase the number of Hispanics entering the field of engineering.

(b) The general purposes and powers are:

1. To solicit, collect, receive, acquire, hold and invest money and property, both real and personal, including money and property received by gift, contribution, bequest, or devise; to sell and convert property, both real and personal, into cash; and to use the funds of this corporation and the proceeds, income, rents, issues, and profits, derived from any property of this corporation for any of the purposes for which this corporation is formed;
2. To purchase, acquire, own, hold, sell, assign, transfer, dispose of mortgage, pledge, hypothecate, or encumber, and to deal in shares, bonds, notes, debentures, or other securities or evidence of indebtedness of any person, firm, corporation, or association and, while the owner or holder of them, to exercise all rights, powers, and privileges of ownership;
3. To purchase or acquire, own, hold, use, lease (either as lessor or lessee), sell, exchange, assign, convey, dispose of, mortgage, hypothecate, or encumber real and personal property;



4. To borrow money, incur indebtedness, and to secure repayment by mortgage, pledge, deed of trust, or other hypothecation of property, both real and personal;
5. To enter into, make, perform, and carry out contracts of every kind for any lawful purpose without limit on amount, with an person, firm, association or corporation, municipality, county, parish, state, territory, government (foreign or domestic), or other municipal or governmental subdivision; and
6. To do all things necessary, expedient, or appropriate to the accomplishment of any of the objects and purposes for which this corporation is formed.

ARTICLE III

The purposes for which this corporation is formed and the activities and the objectives to be carried on and promoted by it are any one or more of the acts and things herein set forth; and, for the accomplishment of these purposes and the carrying on and promotion of said activities and objectives, the corporation shall have, and may exercise, all powers conferred upon it by the laws of the State of California, now or hereafter in effect.

ARTICLE IV

This corporation is not organized for, nor shall it be operated for pecuniary gain or profit, and it does not contemplate the distribution of gains, profits or dividends to the members thereof and is organized solely for non-profit purposes. The property, assets, profits, and net income of this corporation shall be irrevocably dedicated to charitable and educational purposes and no part of the profits or net income of this corporation shall ever inure to the benefit of any director, officer, or member thereof or to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual. Upon the dissolution or winding up of this corporation, its assets remaining after payment of, or provision for payment of, all debts and liabilities of this corporation shall be distributed to a non-profit fund, foundation, or corporation which is organized and operated exclusively for charitable and educational purposes and which has established its tax exempt status under Section 501(c) (6) of the Internal Revenue Code and Section 23701e of the Revenue and Taxation Code. If this corporation holds any assets in trust, they shall be disposed of, in such manner as may be directed



by decree of the Superior Court of the county in which this corporation's principal office is located, upon petition therefor by the Attorney General or by an person concerned in the liquidation.

ARTICLE V

Notwithstanding any of the above statements or purposes and powers, the corporation shall not, except to an insubstantial degree, engage in any activities or exercise any powers that are not in furtherance of the primary purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation is organized pursuant to the General Non-Profit Corporation Law of the State of California.

ARTICLE VII

The county in this State where the principal office for the transaction of business of this corporation is located in Los Angeles County.

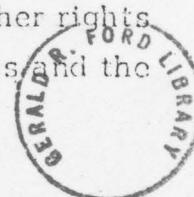

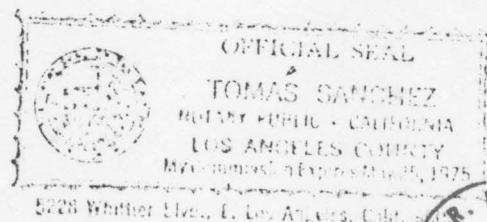

BY-LAWS, RULES AND REGULATIONS

Section 1.

Name and Object

Name. --- The name of the corporation shall be

The Society of Hispanic
Professional Engineers

Objects. -- The objects of the corporation shall be those set forth in its Articles of Incorporation.

Section 2.

Administration

The affairs of this corporation shall be administered by a Board of Directors consisting of five members, who shall be elected by the regular members of this corporation, and each member of said board shall be a regular member of this corporation.

The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers of the corporation.

Section 3.

Officers

Its officers shall consist of a President, a 1st and 2nd Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such additional officers who shall be appointed or elected by the Board of Directors.

Section 4.

President

The President shall represent the corporation and be responsible for all business concerning the corporation. The President shall have full power in the management and business of the corporation, and shall set and establish all policy of the corporation and/or other functions or activities by or under the direction of this corporation, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.



Section 5.

Vice-Presidents

The 1st Vice-President shall assist the President in all business concerning the corporation and shall act as President Pro-tem in the latter's absence.

The 2nd Vice-President shall assist the President and 1st Vice-President in all business concerning the corporation and shall act as President Pro-tem in the absence of both the President and 1st Vice-President.

Section 6.

Secretary

The Secretary shall keep a record of all proceedings; keep the corporate seal and book of blank membership certificates; fill out and countersign all certificates issued and make proper entries in the books of the corporation; and serve all notices required by law or the By-Laws of the corporation.

Section 7.

Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be responsible for the collection of dues, the disbursement of authorized funds and the banking and accounting of all corporation funds. The Treasurer shall make semi-annual financial reports listing all liabilities and assets of the corporation to the Board of Directors.

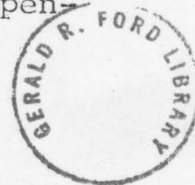
Section 8.

Powers of Directors

General Powers of Directors. -- The Board of Directors shall manage the business of the corporation, subject to the restrictions imposed by law, by the Articles of Incorporation or by these By-Laws. The Board of Directors may exercise all the powers of the corporation.

Specific Powers of the Board of Directors. -- The Board of Directors shall have the following powers:

1. To adopt and alter a common seal of the corporation.
2. To make and change regulations consistent with these By-Laws.
3. To appoint and remove, all agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe their duties, fix their compensation and require fidelity bonds.



4. To pay for any property purchased by the corporation, either wholly or partly in money, bonds, debentures or other securities of the corporation.
5. To borrow money, transact all legal business in respect to make and issue notes, bonds and other negotiable and transferable instruments, mortgages, deeds of trust, trust agreements and to do every act necessary to effectuate the same.
6. To appoint committees in accordance with these By-Laws and to define the powers and duties of the committees.
7. To select and designate banks or trust companies as official depositories of funds and to prescribe and order the manner in which deposits or withdrawals are made.

Compensation of Directors. -- Directors shall not receive any stated salary for their services. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to not allow any director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 9.

Committees

The Board of Directors or the President shall have the power to establish any committee to conduct the business of this society. The President may appoint any regular member to chair such a committee.

Section 10.

Membership

The membership shall be composed of the following types: Regular, Associate, Honorary and Student.

Regular members shall be engineers who hold an Engineer-in-Training Certificate or a Bachelor of Science diploma and who practice or teach engineering. Regular members shall be entitled to cast one vote in elections of officers and all business that the Board of Directors refers to the membership. Regular members may hold office.

Associate members shall be persons who believe and support the purpose of this corporation. Associate members shall not be entitled to vote nor hold office in this corporation. Associate members shall be extended all privileges of a regular member less those exempted above.



Honorary members shall be individuals who have been awarded a membership by the corporation's Board of Directors.

1. They shall be Hispanic persons who have accomplished an outstanding achievement in their engineering profession.
2. Persons who have participated beyond requirement for the advancement of Hispanic persons in the field of engineering.

Student members shall be students enrolled in a curriculum leading to a degree in engineering.

Section 11.

Membership Fees

The Board of Directors shall determine membership fees or dues.

Dues shall be payable annually in advance. A person who is elected to membership in the Society after October 31 in any calendar year shall pay only the proportionate part of the year's dues, reckoned from the first day of the month following the date of the notification of his election.

Not later than June 1 each year, the Secretary shall mail to each member, at his latest address known to the Society, a statement of current indebtedness, if any, of the member and the amount of his dues for the ensuing calendar year.

Any member whose dues are more than three months in arrears shall be so notified by the Secretary. A member whose dues become three months in arrears shall lose the right to vote and to receive publications normally furnished without special charge to members in good standing. Any member whose dues become six months in arrears shall forfeit his connection with the Society provided, however, that the Board of Directors, for cause deemed by it to be sufficient, may extend the time for payment of dues and for the application of these penalties.

The Board of Directors, for cause deemed by it to be sufficient, may excuse any member from the payment of annual dues, temporarily or permanently, and the Board of Directors may remit the whole or any part of the dues which may be in arrears. The Board of Directors, for cause deemed by it to be sufficient, may remove any name from the list of those permanently excused from the payment of dues.



Section 12.

Annual Meeting of Members

There shall be an annual meeting of the regular members of this corporation, to be held as determined by the Board of Directors, during the month of May in each year.

At each annual meeting of regular members of this corporation, there shall be elected a Board of Directors of this corporation for the ensuing year.

Special meetings of the regular members of the corporation may be called by the President or any three directors.

Notice of the calls for any annual or special meeting of the regular members of this corporation shall be given by the Secretary to each regular member not more than thirty (30) days and not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, whether annual or special.

Section 13.

Termination of Membership

Any member, regular or otherwise, may terminate his/her membership at any time, upon written notification to the Secretary of this corporation the effective date of resignation.

The Board of Directors may terminate any member for any infraction of the By-Laws, rules and/or regulations of this corporation.

Section 14.

Liability of Members

No member of this corporation shall be personally or otherwise liable for any of the debts, liabilities and/or obligations of this corporation.

Section 15.

Election of Officers

Elections shall be held on the Annual Meeting.

Offices shall be held for a period of one year, with newly elected officers assuming their official capacities on the first day of July.

Any regular member who has submitted an application to the Secretary and has been accepted into the corporation at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Meeting shall be eligible to vote and hold office.



All ballots must be personally deposited into the election box.

Ballots shall be accepted from any qualified voter until one hour past the scheduled beginning of the Annual Meeting.

Absentee ballots shall be counted separately. Absentee ballots may be obtained from the Secretary; must be sealed in an envelope which shall be signed and dated; and must be submitted to the Secretary at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the scheduled beginning of the Annual Meeting.

Candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared the winners.

If an office is vacated for any reason, the Board of Directors shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

Section 16.

Donations

This corporation may accept gifts, legacies, donation and/or contributions in any form, upon such terms and condition as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 17.

Student Chapters

Student chapters may be established at colleges providing a formal curriculum in engineering. Applications for the establishment of chapters will be reviewed and approved by the Board of Directors.

The applications shall state the chapter's purpose and goals, list the officers and members and be signed by the President and Secretary-Treasurer of each chapter.

The Chapter President shall administer all business concerning the Chapter.

The Vice-President shall assist the President.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep books and accounts of all records, correspondence and money received or disbursed.

The Chapter shall hold elections once each school semester or every other quarter to elect its officers.

The Chapter shall meet once a month.



The Chapter may petition the Society to consider a person of its choice for honorary membership.

The Chapter may also petition the Society to consider programs developed by the Chapter.

Section 18.

Miscellaneous Provisions

The corporate seal of the corporation shall be in such form as the Board of Directors shall determine and shall contain the name of the corporation, the date and state of its creation and such other matters as the Board of Directors, in their discretion, may determine. Said seal may be used by causing it or a facsimile thereof to be impressed, affixed, reproduced or otherwise.

The Principal Office shall be established and maintained in the County of Los Angeles, State of California.

Other offices of the corporation may be established at such places as the Board of Directors may designate or the business of the corporation may require.

Section 19.

Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of this corporation shall end on June 30th of each year.

Section 20.

Amendments

The following procedure shall be followed for amending any portion of these By-Laws:

1. The proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to the Board of Directors for approval, subject to ratification of the general membership.
2. A vote shall be taken at a subsequent meeting of the general membership.
3. A favorable vote of two-thirds of the membership present at a general meeting shall be required for passage.



Section 17
(Revised 1-26-74)

Local and Student Chapters

A local chapter may be established in any locality and shall become operative as soon as the proposed Constitution and Bylaws have been approved by the Board of Directors. Any chapter may be terminated by the Board of Directors for reasons deemed sufficient for such action.

The functions of chapters shall be to encourage members to confer and to make suggestions with respect to matters of policy, to study local problems affecting Hispanic engineers, to cooperate with other chapters in matters of common interest, to achieve closer personal acquaintance and a spirit of cooperation among Hispanic engineers, and otherwise to assist in attaining the objectives of the Society.

The Board of Directors shall encourage chapters to participate in all the affairs of the Society. Chapters shall not act on behalf of the Society as a whole unless so authorized by the Board of Directors.

Student chapters, composed of engineering students, may be established at colleges providing a formal curriculum in engineering. Applications for the establishment of student chapters will be reviewed and approved by the Board of Directors. Any student chapter may be terminated by the Board of Directors for reasons deemed sufficient for such action. The functions of student chapters shall be the encouragement of their members in the study of engineering and in the advancement of Hispanics in the engineering profession. Student chapters shall not act on behalf of the Society.
