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Margaret Dress

Margaret Myers Dress, 62, secretary to Fernando E.C. deBaca, President Ford's special assistant for Hispanic affairs, died of cancer Monday at her home on Virginia Avenue NW.

From 1964 until the late 1960s, Mrs. Dress she was a research secretary in the ornithological laboratory of S. Dillon Ripley, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, and later served as coordinator of special events in the institution's public affairs office.

Before joining deBaca's staff a year ago, she had worked in San Francisco as a secretary for the Federal

Communications Commission and the Federal Energy Administration.

She leaves her mother, Alice Mugge of Melbourne, Fla., two sons, Richard, of Alexandria, and William, of Oak Ridge, Tenn., a daughter, Alice Dress of the District, and a brother and a sister.

Memorial services will be held at 2 p.m. tomorrow at Lee Funeral Home, 4th Street and Massachusetts Avenue NE.
