From the President on down, we have sought to support this outstanding program, and any added impact you can give it will be worthwhile for your state as well as our country.



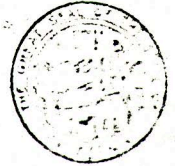

My dear Mr. President:

I hope you will not think it presumptuous of me to offer the following suggestion. I do so from a sincere conviction that the recommendation will further demonstrate your sincere concern and leadership in an area of grave concern to the people of this nation as well as our fellow Californians.


It is my suggestion that you announce to the people that you will, very shortly, convene a special White House Conference on the Nation's Environment.

As we are well aware, the preservation of our environment is an issue of major concern and the search for balanced solutions to the apparently conflicting goals of growth and development, water pollution and degradation should be of the highest priority.

I recently convened a Governor's Conference on California's Changing Environment. It was the first such conference ever called by a Governor. Participants included John Erlichman and Wallie Hickel, as well as a cross section representing every degree of opinion in the environmental spectrum. Youth was well represented and provided extremely valuable input.

In short, we consider our California conference a great success. It added to our inventory of ideas and options in attacking environmental problems and conflicts. I believe that a White House Conference on the Nation's Environment could be of similar value to you and the federal administration.



Dear Governor Reagan:

The President wishes to make available to government and certain other groups many of the facilities at the Western White House in San Clemente. While the area offers generally pleasant weather in a secluded, informal setting, the 10 fully-equipped offices, conference room, kitchen and dining rooms, private beach and bath house, helipad, and excellent communications system provide ideal conference accommodations for up to approximately 40 persons. (The attached sketches will give you a clearer picture of the complex and its geographical location on the southern California coast.) Of course, the costs of all transportation to and from the Western White House, billeting in any of several nearby motels, and whatever catering services are required must be borne by the sponsoring organizations.

Requests for use of the Western White House should be submitted to the Office of the Military Assistant to the President (Attention: Major John V. Brennan, Marine Corps Aide) -- at least three weeks in advance of desired dates of occupancy. When this is done we will make every effort to determine the President's travel plans, and respond to you within a 7-day period. Advice and assistance in logistical planning will be provided when needed.

Dear Governor Reagan: *Ronald*

In September the Vice President wrote to you expressing the President's and his own deep concern about problems relating to the nutrition and health of the American people. At that time he requested your assistance in approaching this problem, specifically, by asking for your suggestions and recommendations for consideration at the White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health.

The letters which he received in response to this request uniformly reflected a profound concern and a genuine seeking for understanding of the many problems relating to hunger and malnutrition in our nation. Perhaps more importantly, they reflected a deep sense of urgency and commitment to action programs to remedy these problems.

I know that Dr. Jean Mayer has already acknowledged your letter and your efforts in behalf of solving these difficult national problems. However, I would like to take this opportunity to bring you further up to date on the follow-up measures that are being taken in the wake of the Conference.

The President has asked the Council for Urban Affairs, of which I am the Executive Secretary, to study the hundreds of recommendations presented to him in the Conference report and to suggest policy directions for a program to resolve the nation's problems of hunger and malnutrition. The Subcommittee on Food and Nutrition of the Council is presently evaluating these recommendations in conjunction with other Departmental studies and will report to the President at the earliest opportunity.

In the meantime, the President's May sixth pledge to have by July, 1970 a food program operating in each county in America that did not have one has almost been met. In addition, pending passage of the Administration's Food

Stamp Bill, the Secretary of Agriculture two months ago changed the Food Stamp regulations to enable low income families to obtain more stamps at a lesser cost. Since this change was put into effect, participation in the food stamp program has increased by about 20 per cent.

Finally, many of the responses which the Vice President received indicated the desirability of holding follow-up conferences at the state level to review the recommendations developed at the White House Conference. Although many governors held state-level conferences prior to the White House Conference, I would hope that additional vehicles for discussion and implementation of the measures discussed at the White House Conference could be developed at the state and local levels. For your information I am including with this letter a list of the delegates from your state who attended the Conference. You will also receive, when it is printed, a copy of the Conference Report to the President.

If I can be of any assistance to you in these follow-up procedures, I will be glad to do so. Again, thank you for your cooperation and active interest and for the contributions which your delegates made to the overall work of the Conference.

Let me thank you for sending the flag and moon dust so handsomely mounted. We have it on display in the Capitol for our many visitors to see.

Now at the risk of adding to your problems and burdens, may I bring something to your attention which is of great concern to California.

The Department of Defense will soon be selecting the prime contractor for the new B-1 bomber. I urge your intervention in this matter on behalf of one of the Los Angeles area's largest and most competent employers, North American Rockwell.

This is the company, the engineering and production team, that has taken Americans to the moon and back; it is here, in the aerospace capital of the world, that the first new United States bomber in years should be built. Surely if quality, price, delivery and superior technology in design and performance are the deciding factors, North American Rockwell should be successful in its bid.

The economic impact of the B-1 on California would be tremendous. The development and test phase alone will amount to approximately \$2 billion, with a potential of \$10 billion if production is authorized. The majority of this money would stay in the state.

The B-1 project not only would help to stem the tremendous number of aerospace layoffs, it also would create more than 40,000 first tier jobs for Californians.

In your letter of March 31 you asked me to intervene with the Department of Defense on behalf of North American Rockwell's competition for the prime contract on the new B-1 bomber. It is my understanding that North American Rockwell is competing with General Dynamics of Texas and the Boeing Company of Seattle.

With due respect to the benefits which will attach to the state of the successful bidder, it has been my long-held belief that political influence should play no part in Defense Department decision making on matters of national security. I will do my best, however, to make sure that political influence is likewise unavailable or unsuccessful on the part of North American Rockwell's competitors.

It is my impression that the Republican Administration under President Nixon is making a clear-cut record of fairness and honesty with respect to defense contract awards, a record which differs somewhat from that of the previous administration.

If you should be informed of the attempted exercise of political influence on behalf of any of North American Rockwell's competitors, I would appreciate your prompt advice as to their names and locations, and I will take immediate and strenuous steps to remedy the situation.

I wish you the best of good fortune in continuing to both govern and protect the people of the State of California.



Ehrlichman talked with Shultz about this situation yesterday and it was agreed that the Secretary would call Governor Reagan, *Knott* to discuss this issue over the telephone. After that conversation the Secretary will then contact Ehrlichman.

The Department has a current problem with the State of California over a required reporting system being required of all State Employment Agencies. California is refusing to implement the required system and Governor Reagan has written letters to the Governor stating his objections to **Tod R. Hullin** system and enlisting their opposition as well.

I am proposing to send the enclosed letter to Governor Reagan. The following presents the background of the issue and the basis for my proposed action.

Background

Under the Wagner-Peyser Act, which authorized the establishment of a Federal-State Employment Security System, the Secretary is given authority to grant Federal Funds derived from the Unemployment Tax Act to States for the operation of an employment service if the State meets certain law and regulations. Among the specific requirements specified in the Act which States must meet is the providing of such reports as shall be determined by the Secretary of Labor.

The reporting system existing up to this time has been in effect since the earliest days of the Employment Service. This system is based upon recording transactions: the number of applications, referrals, placements, counseling interviews and tests. Over the years, it had been recognized that this system was at a serious ~~stage~~ the inability to search on individuals. The system provided, their characteristics, the services provided them, and the results of those services. Without information on the number and kind of people served, effective planning and management of the Employment Security System is extremely

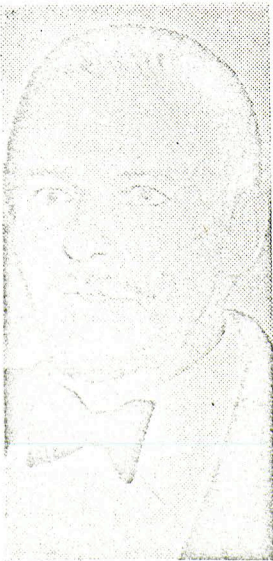

The group will coordinate private contributions and deliveries by U.S. citizens and private agencies to Peru. My dear Mr. President:

On Wednesday, July 7, 1970, a meeting was held in my office for the purpose of discussing the possibility and feasibility of a voluntary affirmative action program for the encouragement of hiring more minorities in the construction field. At this meeting and in attendance were leaders of the major construction unions and representatives of the principal construction-oriented contractor associations.

The leaders of labor and industry assured me personally of their willingness to immediately embark on an effective affirmative action program for this purpose. They have requested my assistance, and have informed me that they stand ready shortly to present to me an effective agreement which would commit themselves to a realistic program in this field. They pointed out to me that California, as the largest state in the union, is very mobile, and that work, when available, can be and usually is carried on in the various parts of the state rather than in isolated localities. For this reason, they are of the opinion that the thrust of such a plan should be on a statewide rather than a community by community basis.

While of necessity the meeting was confined to a general statement of principles, it nevertheless will be followed by immediate meetings contemplating the presentation to me of a concrete and workable plan of affirmative action. I have instructed the Chairman of the California Fair Employment Commission to act as the coordinator of these efforts, in order that we can present to the United States Government an effective and realistic plan, which would contemplate meaningful and long-range goals to eliminate the unequal representation of minority employees in such occupations as may be indicated.

My dear Mr. President:

It is imperative that California seek new ways to contain cost increases in our public medical assistance program. In the first three years of its operation, the cost of all services has risen 85%.

Admittedly, the Congress is aware of runaway costs of health care for the poor and is considering legislation to mitigate those costs. However, California cannot wait for a legislative process that may or may not have the necessary fiscal effect.

A number of controls, many of them costly, have been placed upon providers to make the California Medi-Cal program efficient and yet maintain services.

Heretofore, users have not had to be responsible for their health care costs. To alleviate this, my staff, which administers the Medi-Cal program, has developed an innovative proposal that requires a co-payment for all non-institutional services the recipient receives.

Co-payment has been used extensively in medical care. It achieves two basic goals:

1. Personal financial involvement is assured for the individual receiving a health care service.
2. Unnecessary or marginal utilization diminishes.

What is new is the application of co-payment to those persons receiving a public assistance cash grant.

To institute co-payment requires a waiver of Federal regulations. This has been requested of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

I would greatly appreciate your support in this request. I am sure you are mindful of the need to control the runaway costs in the health area. I believe co-payment is one way to obtain this result.

Dear Mr. President:

I would like to bring to your attention a matter which is of great concern to the State of California, particularly during this period of economic fluctuation and increasing unemployment. At the present time, the Federal Highway Trust Fund has a large quantity of funds which have been collected from taxes assessed against motorists for the purpose of highway construction, which have not yet been released to the states. I am informed that there is a cash balance of over \$2.6 billion in the trust fund, and that this amount is continuing to grow.

Apparently some of these funds are being withheld by the federal government, rather than making available to each state its full share of highway construction monies.

It has consistently been the position of California, and of the National Governors' Conference, that federal highway taxes should be used expeditiously for the construction purposes guaranteed by law. During the previous administration, when only portions of the funds appropriated by Congress were being released, the Governors' Conference took a strong position that full amount should be made available, so that this money could be put to work for the purpose for which it was collected -- building better and safer highways. As you know, most of us, however, were more than willing to modify that position and to temporarily cut back highway construction in an effort to "cool the economy" and combat inflation.

Now an economic factor makes increased highway construction in California more than just a matter of more mileage. A recent statewide survey by the building trades unions in California showed a substantial number of construction workers to be unemployed, with this unemployment rate going as high as 31% in some sections of the state. 

My dear Mr. President:

As you know, we in California are most concerned with the quality and resources of our unique coast and off-shore waters. Your May 23, 1970, announcement regarding United States Oceans Policy was accordingly received with great interest.

In view of the very important influence that this proposal could have upon the coastal zone in which California has a strong and historical interest, I wished you to be aware at an early date that we fully subscribe to the critical need which you recognize of minimizing ecological hazards and protecting the oceans from pollution.

We believe that this need should suggest the reconsideration of all international boundaries asserted by the national government in waters in and off California, particularly those which it (California) might claim as inland waters, such as those lying between the mainland and the Channel Islands. To claim such waters as inland waters or as part of the territorial sea would relieve the very awkward situation that otherwise would exist due to the proposed international trusteeship zone lying between parts of the state, indeed very vital and vulnerable parts of the state. We would further hope that California would be given planning jurisdiction over all such areas under the coastal zone legislation supported by your administration which is now pending before Congress.

We lastly have great concern over the absence of any provision for federal or coastal state jurisdiction over the continental margin for uses other than the development of seabed resources. Already there have been attempts to build islands in areas off California which would lie in the proposed international trusteeship zone. It would seem appropriate that such jurisdiction be clearly established as part of the overall settlement contemplated by your proposal.

My dear Mr. President:

Because of the extreme importance of this matter to thousands of California farmers, I have asked that I be kept informed of the progress of legislation now before the Congress which would permit food processors to seek indemnification for losses suffered due to the federal order dealing with cyclamate-sweetened products.

I understand that the Administration's position regarding this legislation is now being formulated on the basis of reports from various of the executive departments. I would certainly hope and strongly urge that this position be in support of the right of processors to seek indemnification before the U.S. Court of Claims as provided in the legislation. It appears to me that since these processors acted in full and complete compliance with all federal laws and regulations and have been harmed by successive orders taken in the public interest which they could not anticipate, they are entitled in all justice to seek this remedy. Because of the special character of this particular case, it seems to me that it need not be taken as setting a precedent for any future occasions in which federal action is involved.

I find that the effect of the cyclamate orders has been felt directly by California farmers who are in a poor position these days to absorb such economic shock and who are both puzzled and resentful. They will not receive the full value of crops delivered last year because of the losses suffered by the cooperative processors on cyclamate-sweetened products. To some, this could mean the difference between surviving and not surviving on their farms and ranches. I do not exaggerate the seriousness of this problem.

As you will recall, Frank Sinatra endorsed Ronald Reagan when he ran for the gubernatorial election this year. The President and Mrs. Nixon invited Sinatra to attend the Diaz Ordaz dinner in San Diego. Sinatra did not attend the dinner but he did fly in for the reception, although he opened the same night in Las Vegas. Last weekend Sinatra played golf with the Vice President in Palm Springs.

I talked with Paul Keyes today and he offered the suggestion that perhaps Sinatra might be available to do an Evening at the White House. There are obviously strong arguments pro and con in giving Sinatra the White House forum. I am sure that many of our friends in the entertainment field would think it wrong to have a former anti-Nixon person entertain at the White House. I am fairly well convinced that the publicity value alone - not to mention the development of a relationship between Sinatra and the President would far outweigh the negatives.
