

As pointed out in our previous conversation, Governor Reagan has been most helpful in articulating a rational posture for the Nixon Administration as it relates to the controversial proposed welfare regulations concerning sanctions against the States for payments to ineligible and overpayments.

The Governor enjoys photographs as mementos, particularly when they are as good as I was able to find in the White House photo operation. In going over the photographs at the convention in Miami, I found several photos of the Governor while he was presiding over the convention. The first, which is indexed D-84C-19, would be most suitable for a presidential autograph. There are three others which the Governor might also appreciate copies of. They are: D-86C-13A; D-87C-23A; and, D-87C-26A.

Of course, Governor Reagan plans to be here in Washington for the inaugural and could be that if the photographs were available at that time a suitable opportunity for presentation would be quite likely.

DEAR MR PRESIDENT:

WE HAVE CAREFULLY ANALYZED HR 1 AND, IN ITS PRESENT FORM, IT CAUSES THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA SERIOUS PROBLEMS OF A FISCAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE NATURE.

ALTHOUGH THE BILL HAS SOME VALUABLE POINTS, IT HAS MANY MORE DEFECTS. THE MOST SIGNIFICANT DEFECTS ARE LISTED BELOW.

1. HR 1 REMOVES ADMINISTRATIVE RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE PROGRAMS FOR THE AGED, BLIND, AND DISABLED FROM THE STATE, THEREBY ELIMINATING STATE PREROGATIVES AND FLEXIBILITY OF THESE PROGRAMS. THIS WOULD RESULT IN DUPLICATION OF FUNCTIONS AND ADMINISTRATION BETWEEN FEDERAL AND STATE

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ORGANIZATIONAL UNITS.

2. HR 1 WOULD INCREASE DRAMATICALLY THE COST TO CALIFORNIA OF THESE ADULT PROGRAMS SINCE THE "HOLD HARMLESS" FORMULA DOES NOT RECOGNIZE THE NATURE OF CALIFORNIA ADULT AID PROGRAMS. AS A RESULT OF HR 1, WE ESTIMATE INCREASED COSTS TO CALIFORNIA IN CALENDAR YEAR 1974 FOR THE PAYMENT PORTION OF THE ADULT CATEGORY TO BE \$233 MILLION IF THE STATE ADMINISTERS THE PROGRAM, OR \$114 MILLION IF THE STATE OPTS FOR FEDERAL ADMINISTRATION - A SIGNIFICANT COST INCREASE IN BOTH CASES.
3. EVEN IF THE STATE OPTED FOR THE LESS COSTLY AND LESS DESIROUS FEDERAL MECHANISM, DUPLICATE WELFARE SYSTEMS (BOTH STATE AND FEDERAL) WOULD STILL BE NECESSARY SINCE HR 1 MAKES NO PROVISION FOR SPECIAL NEEDS AND SOCIAL SERVICES WHICH WILL

On behalf of President Nixon, I am replying to your letter of November 24,
1972, regarding the failure of Lieutenant Colonel Ernest L. Norberg,
Retired, to be promoted to the grade of Colonel in the Organized Reserve
Corps in 1949.

By virtue of Section 207 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946,
now codified in 10 U.S.C. 1552, the Congress has vested authority for the
correction of military records in the Secretaries of the several military
departments. It was for this reason that your letter has been referred
to the Department of Defense for appropriate action and reply.

In order to properly evaluate the merits of the issue raised by you in
your letter, I have been informed by the Department of the Army that it
will be necessary to obtain Colonel Norberg's military records from the
United States Army Reserve Components Personnel and Administration Center
at St. Louis, Missouri, for re-examination and consideration by the Army
Board for Correction of Military Records. Consequently, some delay may be
expected before a final determination is made.

Colonel Norberg will be advised by letter of your interest and the
measures being taken based on your letter to the President.

Your concern in this matter is understood and appreciated. Please be
assured that the Board will reconsider Colonel Norberg's case as expedi-
tiously as circumstances permit.



My dear Mr. President:

Senator Tunney has sent me a copy of a letter dated August 16 which he and Congressman John McFall cosigned and sent to Colonel James Donovan of the United States Army Corps of Engineers regarding the New Melones Dam Project. A copy of their letter is enclosed.

I feel the points they make are quite reasonable and extremely important. The State has consistently supported construction of the New Melones Dam to provide badly needed flood control and other important benefits, but we must insist on giving equal consideration to mitigation measures necessary to offset environmental damages caused by the project. Most of the concerns expressed in the referenced letter have also been brought out in California's comments on the Environmental Impact Statements dated May 23, 1972 and August 18, 1972.

I join Senator Tunney and Congressman McFall in urging that adequate mitigation measures be assured in the necessary approvals and authorizations. Your support would be appreciated.

The Democrats have this targeted as a pick-up seat with Dr. Bud Davis. In the next week we are being visited by Senators Kennedy, Humphrey and Tunney and we understand others are to follow.

Your committee has been very gracious to us in arranging the Vice President's visit for a rally in Twin Falls on the 23rd and Secretary Romney in Idaho Falls at a later date. However, the one big affair we have been trying to promote for a fund raiser and had set for October 21st with Edgar Bergen and a local variety type show, to raise money for McClure's race as well as the other congressional candidates, has been changed because of some schedule problems. We had hoped, at one time, to have Governor Reagan but he was not available for the 21st. We have now had to move our program to November 4th, which we will call a Republican Gala for the whole state. We hope to raise \$20,000 or more for Jim McClure's tough race for the Senate. I understand that Governor Reagan is being held back and is not committed for November 4th. This would put the frosting on the cake for the Idaho campaign as this Gala would be held in Boise, the largest city and in the largest county in the State.

We need to make early announcements for ticket sales and have a full staff ready to move on this. We are in a position to arrange to pick up Governor Reagan late Saturday afternoon and return him to Sacramento the evening of the 4th.

I am making this urgent request on behalf of our committee.

This is one of the three pieces of a package you directed to John Evans on September 18, 1972. Specifically, this is Tab C, Congressman Archer's charges respecting the use of OEO funds in California.

Bill
First, it appears that Congressman Archer's charges are accurate. That a Legal Services organization funded by OEO filed suit over a provision of the California Welfare Act pertaining to the release of income information. It is highly unlikely that Congressman Archer will try to surface this issue. However, since it is before the California Supreme Court, it may well surface on its own.

In the event a ruling is handed down before the Election, we could expect considerable press coverage.

In view of the Vice President's encounter with OEO Legal Services, including his recent article in the American Bar Journal, I think the Administration's viewpoint is clear that Legal Services Attorneys should be representing their clients and not engaging in social crusades on their own.

Unfortunately, there is nothing we can do to alter the course of this case. It is pending in the Courts, and all we can do is await a ruling.

I would not recommend intervention in the California situation at this time, although I will keep in close touch with O. E. O. and will keep you advised.

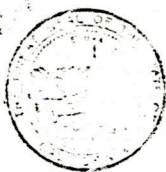





In the past two days the Governors of California and New York have placed calls to you. Ken Cole talked to Reagan and I talked to Rockefeller. Each had essentially the same message -- that he was 100% behind you in your recent Southeast Asian initiative. Each felt strongly that the precise manner in which you are handling the total situation is the only possible way to achieve our goals.

The Governors wanted, too, to wish you and Mrs. Nixon a Merry Christmas.

I have read with interest the part of the Joint Communique¹ and related press releases regarding salinity of the Colorado River following talks between you and President Echeverria on June 15 and 16, 1972. The quality of water delivered to Mexico has been a significant issue between the two countries for more than ten years, and I am pleased that you have discussed it with President Echeverria in the interest of seeking a "definitive, equitable and just solution to this problem at the earliest possible time".

I should like to offer the full support of the State of California to you and your special representative in seeking a solution to this complex problem; I understand you expect a report from him by the end of 1972. I wish to stress the importance of your representative discussing this matter with the seven states of the Colorado River Basin, both individually and collectively via the Committee of Fourteen, which has worked so effectively for the past several years. Through such discussions he may be fully informed of the problems confronting the states and the relative merits of all of the alternative ways in which the Mexican problem may be solved.

I want to emphasize that water users in Arizona, Nevada, and California also have problems resulting from water quality of the Colorado River. Any program to provide benefits to users of Colorado River water must also provide water quality improvement to both the Colorado River Basin States and Mexico. Any solution or solutions that the special representative recommends should be compatible with solution of the overall water quality problem of the Colorado River.

Please call upon me or my representatives for any assistance we can provide in solving this most serious international problem.

Per your request I spoke with Mayor Wilson regarding your meeting with Governor Reagan. He requested that you reach agreement with the Governor on the following two points:

- (1) Call from the City of San Diego to the Governor for assistance of the National Guard.

The Mayor would like the Governor to understand that either the Mayor or his designee (the Police Chief) are the ONLY persons who should be authorized to call the Governor requesting the activation of the National Guard. The Mayor emphasized that the Sheriff should NOT have the authority to make this call.

The Mayor feels the Sheriff is a "little trigger happy" and is capable of using the Convention as a platform to project himself into the national spotlight. The Mayor indicated that the Governor can act on his own initiative and that this worries him. He feels the Governor has surrounded himself with some individuals who are also "trigger happy" and could use the Convention to project the Governor into the national spotlight.

I. PURPOSE

Governors Reagan, Evans and ^{TOM} McCall were invited to meet with you to discuss the dock strike and the steps necessary to end it. (McCall is in Japan and could not attend.) Basically we wanted this meeting to focus public attention on the dock strike issue and to give us a public forum to once again press the Congress and the ILWU.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS AND PRESS PLAN

A. Background: Your emergency legislation to end the dock strike was submitted to the Congress on January 21; you asked for action by January 28. Thus far the Senate Labor Committee has held hearings but there has been no disposition on the part of the Committee to act. The House Labor Committee held hearings today (January 31); once again, it does not look like the House Committee will move.

Our legislation to end this strike is strongly opposed by labor and both Labor Committees will be reluctant to report anything out. This is also a good opportunity to note once again that for the past two years you have requested from the Congress legislation to deal with strikes that affect the transportation industry, a bill we have now labeled the "Crippling Strikes Prevention Act".

The strike is having a very severe effect on the West Coast and is especially harmful to agricultural areas. It is a major political issue on the Coast. Responsibility for it rests largely

Ronald
Governor Reagan, and I have reached agreement in principle as to his work relief project. His application will continue to ask approval for coverage of the full 48% of the potential general target population which he seeks to include. My approval, on the other hand, will be for a one-year "start-up" target of roughly 25% of that population for full processing through the project, but we will allow California to classify and register for the project the entire 48%.

This will allow California to process fully approximately 30,000 employable recipients, if the State can work out the necessary arrangements for that number (which is highly unlikely) and to get ready to process the remaining 28,000 employables during the project's second year (if it is ready to do so and the project is working out satisfactorily). At the same time, the limit imposed by my approval will, in our view, improve the chances of a successful defense of the expected lawsuit.

There are a number of technical issues which remain to be worked out. I attach a copy of John Twiname's letter to Jim Hall. As was explained to Mr. Hall by telephone last Friday, this letter was constructed with an eye to assisting the defense of any lawsuit. California's affirmative responses should improve the project's design, prospects for success and legal defensibility. I will keep you informed of further developments.

Dear Governor Reagan:

The President has requested that I respond to your letter of August 4, 1972, concerning discussions during the recent visit of President Echeverria about the delivery of water to Mexico under the 1944 Water Treaty.

At that time the President indicated the United States was prepared immediately to make certain additional substitution waters available to Mexico as had been recommended by the Department of State and Department of Interior with concurrence of the Governors' Committee of Fourteen.

During the discussions, President Echeverria reiterated Mexico's position that, under the Treaty, it was entitled to water of the same quality as the waters diverted from Imperial Dam, some 26 miles upstream from Morelos Dam, Mexico's point of diversion. No commitments were given to the President of Mexico in this regard. The only commitments made were those reflected in the joint communique and the subsequent agreement in the form of Minute No. 241 of the International Boundary and Water Commission.

While Minute No. 218 of 1965 has been a workable arrangement from a practical standpoint, it and the two annual renewals have failed to bring the two countries to a final solution of the salinity problem.

As you know, despite the vigorous efforts made by the State Department and U.S. Section of the International Boundary and Water Commission, it has not been possible to conclude a long-term agreement with Mexico


