PURPOSE: To maintain contact and provide information on base closures.

BACKGROUND: California was substantially affected by the base closures and should be invited to request assistance from the President's Economic Adjustment Committee. x

TALKING POINTS:

1. I haven't spoken with you for some time; in fact, not since the briefing of the Governors at the White House in February.
2. I hope you have been briefed completely on base closures by the Department of Defense (Under Secretary of the Navy Nesen).
3. I wanted to call your attention particularly to the economic adjustment program which the President has directed to act to aid communities affected by base closures. (See Tab A).
4. The Economic Adjustment Committee, Chaired by the Secretary of Defense, will have its own management team and has been strengthened to better assist communities help themselves get back on their feet.
5. If you desire, you can request the assistance of the President's Economic Adjustment Committee, and I have asked them to stand by to bring a briefing team out to see you and meet with elected representatives from the communities affected and discuss strategy for converting former defense establishments to new civilian domestic uses.
6. If you give us the word, I will have Jim Falk work with your staff to engineer a request from you and an immediate response from the Committee to be followed with a meeting which you could host if you desire.
7. Secretary Richardson will be in California tomorrow and would be happy to meet with the Governor if he is available.

Dear Governor Reagan:

This responds to your April 4 message to the President requesting that Alameda and Contra Costa Counties, California, be declared a major disaster area because of the threat of fire due to some 2,800 acres of dead eucalyptus trees.


Representatives from our Office of Emergency Preparedness Region 9 Office in San Francisco have visited the affected area and consulted with concerned Federal, State, and local officials to determine the extent of the threat and requirements for Federal assistance. The U.S. Forest Service reports that the emergency protective measures recommended by the joint Federal-State evaluation team, and now being undertaken by the State and local governments and private citizens, are adequate to alleviate the potential hazard. These measures appear to be within the capability of the State and local governments and individuals involved. The removal of dead trees and flammable debris from private property is considered to be an urgent requirement; however, the Small Business Administration and the Farmers Home Administration have advised us that long-term, low-interest loans cannot be made available for this purpose under existing authorities.

On the basis of our surveys and consultations, I have concluded that the eucalyptus tree situation is not of such severity and magnitude as to warrant a major disaster declaration and that the fire hazard does not threaten an imminent major disaster at this time. Regretfully, I must inform you of my decision not to recommend to the President that he declare a major disaster in this case.

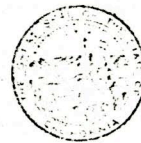



Basically, the more vocal ones, from whom you have already heard, feel that they have been double-crossed over revenue sharing and that, in fact, it will not mean any additional funds for them but simply a transfer of funds from the categorical grants into a general grant. Essentially, local government officials do not understand that what they are getting is greater local option and greater opportunity to make their own decisions without the influence of Federal bureaucrats and guidelines. That message must be communicated to local officials in a more dramatic way. It could come directly from the President.

One of the difficulties you will run into in intergovernmental relations is that the system of Federalism of our country drastically needs reform and not just tinkering. Revenue sharing is a step in the right direction, but at this point, it is only tinkering with the system. Thorough-going reform from the ground up is what is necessary. Clearly, the Federal



SUBJECT: EPA's "Clean Air" Plan for Southern California

EPA Administrator Bill Ruckelshaus has announced a transportation control plan for the City of Los Angeles. This is a draft plan required by the Clean Air Act. EPA must promulgate such a plan because Los Angeles government officials have refused to do so, and, in accordance with the Clean Air Act, the court (City of Riverside v. Ruckelshaus) ordered EPA to act.

The EPA plan is unworkable. We know it and Ruckelshaus will say it. It would require an 80% traffic reduction in the Los Angeles area. Our intention is, of course, never to put such a plan into effect, but to ultimately amend the Clean Air Act to permit administrative discretion in achieving the legislative requirements so that we can permit the technology of the automobile industry to in effect solve the problem itself over time. To do so, we need to call the problem to the public's attention. Public hearings will take place shortly after the plan is published. Ultimately we will move legislation to the Congress to amend the Act.





Newman, Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the Mississippi Legislature, saying that Senator Eastland had conveyed to the President the invitation to attend a Joint Session of the Mississippi Legislature honoring returning POW's anytime at his convenience in February or March; that the President greatly appreciated the invitation but, unfortunately, his schedule was so pressing he would be unable to add this engagement to his calendar; that the President wanted Mr. Newman and all those of this Body to know of his gratitude for their thoughtfulness and his regret he was unable to accept their kind invitation.

Mr. Newman was most understanding, saying they only wanted to do this for the President if his schedule permitted to show their appreciation for his splendid efforts.

Ronald Mr. Newman then asked me if there was someone at the White House who might approach Governor Reagan about appearing before the Mississippi Legislature. He told me they would invite him directly but felt that coming from the White House it might be more helpful. He said the Legislature is in session only on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday (which accounts for my not reaching him last Friday or yesterday) and that the dates of March 6, 7, 8, 13, 14, 15, 20, 21 and 22 were preferably but if the Governor could do this but not until the last week of March, they would arrange the session for a Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday of that week. I told him I would pass this along and we would get back to him on this.

Governor Reagan of California has requested that you issue a major disaster declaration for Marin and San Luis Obispo Counties and the City of South San Francisco because of storm and flood damages suffered in his State.

The Governor has directed that every resource within the State be applied to assist in relieving the impact of the disaster; furthermore, he has certified that State and local expenditures during the past twelve months for disaster relief exceed \$6.4 million. The minimum certification required by our Federal regulations for California is \$5 million.

Federal damage assessments agree with those furnished by the State which reveal public damage of nearly \$3 million and private damage of approximately \$9 million. Cleanup and restoration work eligible for funding from your Disaster Fund is estimated to exceed \$2.5 million. The Small Business Administration loan program will cover the substantial damage to homes and businesses. SBA expects approximately 1300 loan requests totaling nearly \$7 million; of this amount some \$4 million would be forgiven under the law.

Based upon the foregoing, Acting Director Trent recommends, and I agree, that the situation warrants Federal disaster assistance.

That you declare Marin and San Luis Obispo Counties and the City of South San Francisco a Federal disaster area by signing the letter at Tab A.

This report reflects a serious, dedicated effort, to analyze a potentially critical problem, by numerous people from all levels of government and from private institutions. It is gratifying to know that Federal representatives have been able to make valuable contributions, and that previous work in earthquake hazard reduction by the Office of Science and Technology was useful.

You can plan on the continued participation on your Earthquake Council of those Federal agencies active in this area of concern. As for other activities related to implementation of the recommendations of the report, Federal agencies that might be involved will be guided, as you suggested, by the level and nature of their current programs and workloads.

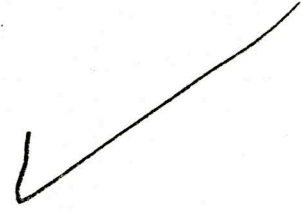

The June 25 announcement of 36 additional parcels of surplus Federal property to be made available for park and recreation use brings to 325 the total number of Legacy of Parks properties since the program was initiated less than two and one-half years ago. I know you join in our pleasure that such progress has been made in this worthwhile program which we consider to be the vanguard of the New Federalism.

The Executive Order establishing the Federal Property Council takes effect July 1, 1973. The Council will, in effect, replace the Property Review Board and take on its functions. In addition, the Council will be responsible for reviewing our Federal real property policies in the light of our overall objectives, and it will recommend to the President necessary modifications.

While I expect that the President's statement and the fact sheet will provide answers to most of the questions you may have, I invite you to contact my office if I can be of further assistance. One of my prime objectives as the new Chairman is to be attentive to State and local officials to ensure that local views receive their appropriate consideration in the property review process, and I would be interested in any ideas or suggestions you might have in this regard.



The President has asked me to respond to your July 6, 1973, letter concerning the Clean Air Act and the problems that are being created by actions to meet standards and deadlines resulting from the Act.

The Clean Air Act has provided the basis for progress in improving air quality. We share your belief, however, that some of the actions required to meet Federal clean air standards, regulations and implementation plans are having an impact on other social and economic objectives that was not foreseen when the Act was passed in 1970. In some cases, it simply will not be possible to meet established standards and deadlines. The Environmental Protection Agency has indicated, for example, that it will not be possible to meet transportation control requirements of the Act in areas such as Los Angeles without intolerable disruption. EPA also indicated that the plan for Los Angeles was issued pursuant to a Court Order and did not represent a policy position.

In this connection, the U.S. Senate Committee on Public Works recently announced its intention of conducting a thorough evaluation of the implications of the Clean Air Act. As a part of this effort, the Committee on June 27, 1973, asked the National Academy of Sciences to review scientific and technical issues relating to the Act.

We agree with your conclusion and that of the Senate Committee that the time has come for a review of the Act. Such a review should take into account the social and economic impact of actions to protect and improve air quality. We believe there should be full public debate of the matter so that there will be a better basis for decisions on actions to protect air quality. These decisions could then strike an appropriate balance among our Nation's objectives with respect to the environment, energy supply, social and economic improvement, and national security.

The President has asked me to thank you for your letter of July 18 and for your expression of support for the steps he is taking. Hearings on the proposed legislation to set up the Department of Energy and Natural Resources, and the Energy Research and Development Administration get underway in the Senate and the House next week, so we feel that we are making good progress.

As to your concern about the geothermal leases, I fully agree that the delay cannot be allowed to continue. The situation is much the same with oil shale. As you know, as Governor of Colorado I had considerable interest in expediting the leasing program. It is difficult to see why, at a time when we are trying to increase our domestic energy supplies, we seem to be at a standstill in shale and geothermal leasing programs.

I have met once with Secretary Morton and have raised that point. I will do so again. I assure you that I will do all in my power to make sure that the latest target dates are met.

Once again, thanks for your expression of support. Please don't hesitate to call on me if I can be of assistance in any way.

Dear Ron:

I am sure that we both share a feeling of relief that the ominous projections for disastrous gasoline shortages during this summer proved incorrect. We have experienced regional problems particularly in my home State, however, and I am concerned that we could experience worse shortages of heating oil this winter if the weather is unusually severe.

There is a diversity of opinion on whether we should institute a mandatory allocation program for fuels. I do not believe such a program will solve our shortage problems. Allocation systems only redistribute the shortages, and only with great difficulty. They may lessen rather than increase available supplies of fuels. I have concluded that we should not adopt a Federal mandatory allocation system for petroleum and petroleum products at this time. My views are more fully explained in a copy of my public statement of this date which I am enclosing with this letter. The statement also includes my best estimate of the fuel situation this winter, as well as a number of actions we are taking to solve some of our problems associated with the shortages.

I am forwarding for your personal attention a copy of a proposed system for mandatory allocation of petroleum and petroleum products. To reiterate, we do not intend to implement this system at this time. We do want to have a system developed and to have had the benefit of your comments, should the situation warrant the implementation of a mandatory system.

The proposal includes significant participation of the state governments in redistributing petroleum products to meet priority needs within state boundaries. I believe that you and your staffs are best able to respond in a timely and equitable manner to these priority demands, many of which will be seasonal or local in nature. The Federal Government would retain overall responsibility, as well as provide a system to equitably distribute supplies to all wholesale purchasers of petroleum products

Dear Governor:

Last Monday while signing the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1973, the President said, "This Act represents a significant extension and reform of the Federal Highway program. For the first time since enactment of the program, States and localities will have the flexibility they need to set their own transportation priorities."

Since this is the single most important piece of legislation that the Department of Transportation has been called upon to administer and is one which constitutes a step forward toward the New Federalism, the President wanted you to have the additional information which I have enclosed. I hope you will find it helpful.

As the President announced at his Press Conference last Saturday, September 8, we believe that it may be necessary in some instances to delay implementing of secondary ambient air quality standards in order to insure adequate supplies of fuel. This strategy is in general consonance with the Clean Fuels Policy announced by the Environmental Protection Agency last winter, but previously applicable only to the combustion of coal.

We would also like to discuss specific proposals to establish procedures within the various states to permit rapid action in granting variances to the State implementation plan.

I believe that one of my Assistants, tentatively advised your office yesterday of our plans for the meeting to be held Wednesday, September 19, at 11:00 am. Eleven Governors are invited. Due to space limitations, I ask that you limit the number of assistants accompanying you to two, preferably to an energy advisor and an environmental advisor. Please advise my Office the names of assistants accompanying you no later than September 17 in order that they may be cleared to enter.

The meeting is scheduled to be held in the Roosevelt Room located in the West Wing of the White House. You will enter through the Northwest Gate on Pennsylvania Avenue. We will have lunch scheduled at about 12:30 p. m.

The President and I are both dedicated to meeting our environmental goals. However, with the possibility of severe cold weather, we believe that the fuel situation could be serious this winter. I look forward to meeting with you to discuss not only the specific actions which we have recommended, but also to provide you with our best projections for the winter heating season.

Thank you for sending your representatives to Washington on such short notice to discuss our national energy problems and proposed solutions with the President, Secretary Morton, Administrator Train and me. I believe that the President made our position clear at the meeting -- we are going to have a difficult time meeting energy demands this winter. We may have shortages of up to 400,000 barrels per day of low sulfur distillate. We must initiate action now to alleviate those shortages. We can do so only with your cooperation.

With your help we will reduce demand, increase our supplies of home heating fuel, and minimize negative impact on the environment. If we wait, we may not be able to hope for so much, and may find that higher sulfur fuels will have to be used in areas where it is least desirable. Import needs could range from 650 to 800 thousand barrels per day compared to 400 thousand last winter. We are going to have problems obtaining such a level of supply from Caribbean and European markets. Unfortunately, the burden of potential shortages is likely to fall more than proportionately on a few areas. The message that several of the Governors were quite concerned about the availability of oil came across to me loud and clear at the meeting. Their comments will be considered carefully during the President's review of the allocation question. However, whatever the outcome of that decision, we must take steps to increase supplies and dampen demand.

It is important to recognize that stringent sulfur restrictions can limit the supplies of available fuel oil this winter. The probable source of incremental imports to the U.S. is Europe. The sulfur content of home heating oil produced there is .5 - .7%, roughly twice that of U.S. production. These imports would normally be consumed in or near the large eastern seaboard cities. However, the more restrictive sulfur emission limitations in those areas (.2 - .5%) can prevent the importation of needed fuel supplies unless temporary variances to state regulations are approved.

It is my belief that variances will be needed on a much larger scale this winter than was the case last year. EPA will be sending out detailed guidance, along the lines of the information contained in the Information Sheet distributed at our meeting. Our goals -- and the steps we ask you to take if we are to meet them -- are as follows:

1. Reduce consumption of home heating fuel by 100,000 barrels per day during this winter. We will take steps to initiate a greatly expanded public information campaign on conservation.

We ask you to take an active and leading role in encouraging energy conservation in your state beginning now.

2. Import 200,000 barrels of higher sulfur distillate (up to .3%) from Europe and the Caribbean, in addition to the normal low sulfur imports which we expect to obtain.

Because many statewide or regional sulfur regulations for distillate would forbid the burning of this distillate, some temporary relaxation of regulations will be necessary to permit such imports. It should be possible to minimize any threat to primary ambient air standards, if such relaxations are made outside of the major urban areas first.

3. Obtain another 100,000 barrels per day of low sulfur distillate from the Caribbean by relaxing sulfur standards on residual fuel oil. Distillate is now being used to mix with higher sulfur residual in order to lower the sulfur content of residual oil to meet sulfur content restrictions. To free up this volume of additional distillates will require relaxing sulfur content limitations covering about 250,000 barrels per day of residual fuel oil.

To accomplish these results, we estimate it will be necessary for states to raise in urban areas some restrictions. First, however, we believe it is necessary to try to relax emissions standards in areas away from the major urbanized areas. In those areas it will normally be possible to go well above the restrictive sulfur levels without approaching the primary standards. In addition, we would encourage you to take steps to relax emission limits on power plants and other sources with tall stacks before relaxing them for other sources. Finally, you should try where possible to have the higher sulfur fuel burned at times when meteorological conditions are most favorable for dispersion.

In addition to freeing up the distillate now used for blending to lower the sulfur content of residual, relaxation of emission limitations on residual will also accomplish the following:

- . Increase the supply of residual fuel oil (since we are also short of residual);

- . Make it possible for certain refineries to handle a higher sulfur crude than they are now using. In some cases this will make it possible for additional refineries to run at full capacity. In other cases it will free the low sulfur crude for use in refineries that can handle only low sulfur crude and are now running at less than capacity. It may also be necessary to relax some emission limits from the refinery itself in order to receive this increased supply;

- . Make it possible to convert some facilities (apartment houses, factories, etc. power plants) from distillates (home heating fuel) to residual, thus freeing up the distillates for homes;

- . Make it easier to get increased production from European refiners with excess capacity by being able to take the residual fuel they produce; and

- . Use for fuel oil some material that is now used for coking because of high sulfur content.

I would emphasize to you the importance of speed. We intend to comply fully with the Clean Air Act, whose required reviews take considerable time. You still must initiate those requests, hold the hearings, and provide the rationale for your requests. I urge you to begin as quickly as possible on that process.

The greater the delay the greater the probability that variances will have to be given wholesale on an emergency basis later on.

Let me assure you once again that every agency of the Federal Government stands ready to assist you in every way possible.

Thank you again for your demonstration of support and concern, and thank you in advance for your cooperation.

Thank you for your letter of September 17 to the President regarding the savings flows to savings and loan associations and the home mortgage market in California.

The Administration shares your concern regarding the ability of thrift institutions, which supply the major share of funds to the home mortgage market, to compete for savers' funds in inflationary periods in which interest rates, especially short-term rates, rise sharply. I do not believe, however, that a return to the deposit ceilings in effect before July 5 would solve their problem, since these institutions would still have to compete with security market instruments which are not controllable except at immense cost to the economy.

Under today's regulations, the basic problem of savings and loans, as you point out, revolves around their statutory asset structure. In his message of August 3 to the Congress, the President recommended several ways to improve the economic viability of savings institutions. He proposed to permit them to invest in a limited amount of consumer loans, to invest in commercial loans closely related to housing, and to purchase high-grade private debt securities. In addition proposed legislation would strengthen the home mortgage market by a tax credit that would be related to mortgage lending activity of thrift institutions, commercial banks, insurance companies, pension funds and other investors.

These, of course, are proposals to restructure financial institutions in the longer term. Looking to the shorter run, we have taken administrative actions to increase the availability of money to savings and loans and to the home mortgage



Herewith some talking points for your proposed phone conversation with Mr. Neece of Governor Reagan's office concerning the Governor's trip to Australia, New Zealand and Singapore in late November:

... It would be very beneficial to U.S. interests if Governor Reagan could act as a special Presidential representative for the promotion of U.S. exports during his visit to Australia, New Zealand and Singapore.

... Economic issues have played a significant role in all relations with all three countries. Australia has been selected as the pilot country in the area for a concentrated trade promotion effort. There is a large American business community and new regional trade center in Singapore.

... The Governor's presence would give emphasis to current strenuous efforts by our Embassies in the three countries to promote U.S. exports, taking advantage of opportunities which have arisen following devaluation.

... We would attempt to facilitate contacts between the Governor and host government officials by arranging for Presidential letters to the government heads of the countries, all of whom have visited Washington during the past years.

... Our Ambassadors in the countries will be pleased to arrange a schedule of appropriate appointments, visits and speaking engagements with the Governor's concurrence.

... The NSC staff and the Department of State will provide written and oral briefing material as the Governor may wish prior to the trip.

My dear Mr. President:

This is to express strong support for your recommendation to open the Elk Hills Naval Petroleum Reserve to commercial oil production.

California is not only a major oil producing state; it is a major refining state. It is therefore of particular importance that we utilize every available source of crude oil. In the San Joaquin Valley, independent refineries are operating below capacity because of a shortage of high-gravity crude oil. The Elk Hills crude is low-sulfur, high-gravity oil.

Reserves are estimated at over a billion barrels. To produce this field at its maximum efficient rate of about 160 thousand barrels a day would not seriously endanger our national security. In fact, the readiness of this oil to meet a national emergency would be enhanced because there would be an assurance that the wells would be in good producing order, that the casing operation equipment is working, and that the tankage and pipelines necessary to handle this volume would be available.

Further, within the Reserve there should be exploratory drilling for deeper zones as well as outpost drilling. For example, the recent discovery by Standard Oil Company of California, Tule Elk field, lies immediately to the north of the Reserve. The Navy has already programmed offset wells to determine if this production extends on to the Reserve. Geologists in the area say that it does.

The President has asked us to reply to your letter of November 16, 1973, in regard to the exploration and development of oil resources in the waters offshore California. We appreciate your concern about this matter and assure you that every effort is being made to expedite the delivery of needed fuel resources within the limits of our commitment to protect the environment and to maintain orderly management practices.

With reference to the resumption of the development and production of the Santa Ynez Unit off the Santa Barbara coast, public hearings were held in early October to receive comments on the draft environmental statement published in July 1973. The comments received have been studied and the final environmental statement will be published shortly. Thereafter, the decision as to whether operations should go forward will be made.

As to the need you mentioned for additional exploration and production offshore California, the Proposed Schedule - Provisional OCS Leasing, published last summer, a copy of which was sent to you on September 27, 1973, proposed a sale offshore Southern California in September 1974. Preparations for such a tentative sale have been going forward but the timing has slipped because of the on-going negotiations between the Department of Defense and the Department of Interior, held in an effort to foreclose possible conflicts between defense operations and leasing operations in certain areas off the Southern California coast. We hope that in the near future these interests may be reconciled and that we may go forward with a call for nominations.

My dear Mr. President:

California has placed a high priority on actions to conserve energy during this period of crisis. The State's Energy Planning Council, chaired by Lieutenant Governor Ed Reinecke, consists of my Cabinet and the most knowledgeable energy experts in California. California residents are generally responding well to requests for lower highway speed, lower thermostat settings, less travel, and I am proud of them. Also, the State is reducing the speed limit to 55 mph.

It is necessary that there be a similar response at the federal level, so I am urging the opening of the Naval Petroleum Reserve No. 1 at Elk Hills in California to large-scale emergency production. The military establishment has placed demands upon the domestic oil industry to furnish substantial supplies of fuel during January. We heartily agree with the need to meet necessary military requirements from any source. However, military needs during a time of crisis should be taken from military reserves. That is what they are for.

At a time when federal spokesmen openly consider public gasoline rationing as an imminent possibility, it is only reasonable that the federal government show its good faith to the people by filling its requirements from supplies which have been set aside for emergency needs, such as those at Elk Hills.

The basic purpose of a naval petroleum reserve is to act as a supplier in the event of an emergency. Military demands placed upon stateside suppliers of middle distillates have been particularly disruptive to the California market and are further impacting the economy of the state.


I call your attention to nationwide reports of public acceptance of energy sacrifice. But there is a reported coincidental doubt as to the degree of the crisis itself. Federal action to dig into its own reserves would go a long way toward dispelling the doubt and would reinforce the basic goodwill that now exists in public acceptance of sacrifice.

It would seem that if there ever were a time of emergency in regard to the use of these Naval petroleum reserves for military purposes, it is now. I urge your action toward this end.

Thanks for your December 21st letter regarding Administration appointments in the 21st District and scheduled speaking engagements in your area by Governor ^{Ronald} Reagan and John Connally.

I regret any embarrassment non-career Presidential or departmental appointments may have caused you. Certainly, the system is designed to avoid the problems you have experienced. Here's the procedure: Before candidates are finally selected and announced - detailed checks are made on a number of fronts, one being through the Republican National Committee with the GOP Congressman representing the candidate. This system has worked fairly well but if you would give me the specifics of any case I could trace it back to see what fell through. I'm sure Chairman George Bush would be happy to discuss the clearance procedure with you.

There is little I can do regarding prominent Republicans accepting speaking engagements in your district. The White House is not involved in any way with scheduling speakers other than Administration officials. However, it is a serious breach of political protocol for major speakers to address groups in a Congressman's district without coordinating first with the GOP Member. I suspect Chairman Bush can be helpful in this regard also.





We are now just fourteen months away from the official beginning of our Nation's 200th anniversary. As the President's personal representative to the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, I look forward to cooperating with you to marshal our finest efforts to make the Bicentennial celebration a great success and a milestone in our proud history.

The President has pointed out that, while the Bicentennial is a birthday, it must also be a time of rebirth. With this view, on December 11, 1973 the President signed into law a bill to establish the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration which replaces and restructures the former Commission. I am confident that programs and projects established in the name of the Bicentennial under this new law will serve as a foundation for our Third Century and a fitting tribute to our founding fathers.

The new Administration will be headed by an Administrator whom the President will announce soon. A twenty-five member Public Advisory Council will also be appointed by the President. Policy will be set by an eleven member board of directors.

To fulfill the President's assignment to provide for a responsible federal effort, a Cabinet level Bicentennial Committee which I chair has been established. Currently we are working to complete plans and budgets in the federal agencies for a Bicentennial program base upon which the states and the private sector will build.

I enclose a copy of the new legislation, a set of first day of issue Bicentennial stamps, and a commemorative Bicentennial medal developed by the Bicentennial Commission and the U.S. Mint for public sale. (Proceeds from the sale of the stamps and medal series will enable the new ARBA to provide additional matching grants for Bicentennial projects at all levels.)

Dear Governor:

On March 29, one year will have passed since the return of the last of more than two and one-half million Americans who served in Vietnam. Their homecoming brought to an honorable conclusion the longest war in our Nation's history. Although the men and women who bore the burden of this conflict can never be fully repaid for their sacrifice, each of them is entitled to special recognition and tribute from our Nation.

Accordingly, under authority given to me by the Congress, I have issued a proclamation designating March 29, 1974 as Vietnam Veterans Day, a copy of which is enclosed. May I respectfully urge you to issue a similar proclamation and to organize or encourage an appropriate observance to honor all the veterans of the Vietnam conflict.

There are no plans to commemorate this date in subsequent years, and in the future all veterans will be honored on the traditional Veterans Day in the fall. As you may have noted, I recently asked the Congress to restore November 11th as the official date to commemorate Veterans Day and to repeal the 1968 legislation which changed it to the fourth Monday in October.

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



As you requested, I have declared a major disaster for California because of damage due to severe storms and flooding beginning about March 29, 1974. I have authorized Federal relief and recovery assistance in the affected areas.

The Administrator, Federal Disaster Assistance Administration, Department of Housing and Urban Development, will coordinate Federal disaster assistance efforts and designate specific areas of the State eligible for such assistance. The Federal Coordinating Officer will be Mr. Robert C. Stevens, Regional Director for Federal Disaster Assistance, HUD Region 9. He will consult with you and assist in the execution of the Federal-State Disaster Assistance Agreement governing expenditure of Federal funds.

Lynn Arroyo informs me that General Haig will receive a clearance request this week for Norm^x Scott to be appointed as Secretary of the Navy. The two contenders are Scott and Middendorf. *J. Wm.* I am further told that the President and Haig have already agreed to Scott but the decision paper is being sent in again for reconfirmation.

You should be aware that Barry^x Goldwater has said "No Middendorf, no Navy". In that regard, I am told that Middendorf has wasted no effort in lobbying every available individual, and as a result has turned several people off.

Scott has Schlesinger's support.

On the day of the announcement, it might be beneficial if either you or Falk call Governor^x Reagan to alert him to the announcement should Scott be appointed.
