
It is past time you now take stock of our accomplishments since January 1st.

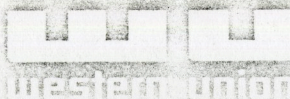

Can't Afford 15 Pct. Increase in Social Security Official

WASHINGTON (UPI): An official of the Social Security Administration says a hike of 15 per cent in benefits sought by liberal House Democrats would be red.

Rep. Charles A. Vanik (D., Cleveland), leader of the move to force a 15 per cent increase instead of the 10 Nixon, argues President is not," insists there is enough in the fund.

Robert J. Myers, chief actuary for SAA and the man who figures how much rates be paid under existing and employed employees.

"We can manage the 10 per cent asked by the President, but if we went to 15 we would be in trouble in eight or 10 years," Myers said.

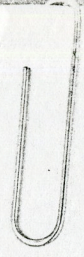

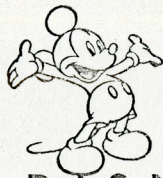
Enclosed are two semi-filled petitions from Walt Whitman high school. They were overlooked when the other petitions were mailed.


Dear President Nixon:

As a college student, 18 years of age, I have been terribly troubled about America's involvement in the Viet Nam War. From a personal point of view, I am troubled because it may mean that my brother, my cousins, and my friends may have to fight a war in which most of us find it very difficult to become emotionally or patriotically involved.

It is my humble opinion, from what I have read in the newspapers and heard on television, that the United States has nothing to gain by any further participation in this war. Our national security is in no way endangered. Throughout my education, I was taught to have a firm belief in democracy. I believe that the Vietnamese have a right to choose whatever government they wish, of course through genuine democratic means. I approve of the policy of immediate withdrawal of American soldiers.

I appeal to you, as President of the United States, to order an immediate withdrawal and heed the demands, the wishes, the prayers of my generation, who are the ones who are doing the fighting and the dying.
