We are not sad to see him in service we are very proud. Mr. Nixon we could not have  
children of our own, so we adopted  
this son, and he is such a joy  
and blessing to our lives, as he  
has always been a good Christian  
boy, also student, without a

all the way through 4 yrs College.  
Frat. etc so you & we have every  
right to be proud of him. We  
sacrificed to send him to College  
and encouraged him to get into  
the R. O. T. C. program which he  
did and rec. his Commission when  
he finished College in March and  
is so proud to wear the officers  
uniform of U. S. Army and so  
willing to go and do part for his  
Country.

There are so many things I can't understand. during the 4 yrs he was in R.O.T.C. the Bldg was set fire, boomed the flag torn down etc. we went to see our son in a dress parade this group responsible for these things, turned out and disrupted the assembly to the point of completely out shouting the officers in the assembly and were pushed off the field badly and yet none were arrested. Why??

Mr Nixon we all voted for you including our son at College who voted assenter ballot as this was the first time he passed vote. We voted for you because we believed in you, and what you stood for, the rights of all people, not just a preferred few, also to bring the boys home, and end the war in Vietnam for which I believe you

are doing. because there are so many questions we have about the war over there.

Mr Nixon as I stated before this son is all we have, and we are in our mid. 50's too old to adopt any more, if anything should happen to him and I know of families that have 2 sons, but they only send one into war zones (one at a time) so if one got killed they would still have one left, so when you only have one, it seems only right that he should not be sent into a combat situation, of course my son is an officer, and would never suggest this, as he is willing to serve his country where ever sent, but we feel that it doesn't seem quite fair for an only son to have to go. as we hope to have grandchildren some day and without him there

would be none to carry on the family name. also the loss of our only child would be unbearable. God was so good to us and gave us such a wonderful son to call our own and raise as we see fit.

We've never written to a President before, as we find it hard to put our thoughts onto paper into words, as our education is limited to high school, as we came up in 30's as you did, and had to quit school to help our families educate our younger brothers and sisters, but this Country has been so good to us, and we love it dearly and gave 3 yrs in service in World War II. We are middle class square Americans with a small business we operate, and have taught our son to love and honor his Country for which he does very much. We do not think of you

as a President, we think of you  
as a good friend and Neighbor  
that we can express our needs  
and troubles to.

By the way you are the first  
Republican President we've ever voted  
for, but hope you will not be  
the last as we hope we can vote  
for you again.

John Nixon our son is Lt.  
David W. Disney stationed at Ft.  
Sill Oklahoma, and I would like  
to be able to show him a letter  
from you, as he believes in  
you so much, and that you  
have done and trying to do all  
you promised in your Campaign  
speeches, so he will not believe  
you are unreachable. So if you

our questions we would appreciate

## Defacing Municipal Property Punishable Under Proposed Hampstead Ordinance

An ordinance to make the defacing of municipal property a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of from \$50 to \$250 was introduced into the Hampstead Town Council, Monday, August 16.

The ordinance, which was requested by several councilman at the July meeting of the council, must wait seven days before it can be made law. The council chairman, Oden Kemp, could call a special meeting for that purpose or the bill could wait until the September 20 meeting of the council for passage.

The initial purpose behind the drafting of the ordinance was to protect the town's water tank from painting by youngsters, but was later expanded to include all municipal property.

The ordinance, if passed, will become law twenty days after its enactment.

### ANNEXATION

The petition for annexation of over 600 acres of land adjacent to the town was not ready for presentation to the council Monday and chairman Kemp was visibly disappointed.

According to Mr. Kemp, the town's much discussed zoning ordinance relates directly to the annexation proposal. "We don't have the money for the zoning now. We couldn't even afford the printing right now. That's why we have to have this annexation."

Unless a special meeting is called to discuss the annexation proposal, it too will have to wait for the September 20 meeting.

### WATER

Making the third point in a triangle of inter-related matters with which the council is wrestling, the council voted Monday to service the George Grogan residence on Royal Avenue in Clearview with water. The Grogan home is outside the town limits.

"Water is our big gun. Once they have water they don't care about the rest," groaned councilman Thomas Raver.

"More taxes is a hard thing to sell. If you don't have the promise of water when you are talking annexation, it's

### POLICE

A third item which came to the council and which may need a special meeting before September was the question of hiring additional police help.

Chairman Kemp presented the alternatives of an additional full-time man or a part-time man. The question of school crossing guards was also raised.

"We should discuss this with the police first in a special meeting and then bring a recommendation to the public meeting in September," said Mr. Kemp.

### BAUERLEIN'S

Stewart Thomson called the council's attention to an unmarked drain pipe

across the road from Bauerlein's store. According to Mr. Thomson he had just that weekend helped a lady get her car free when she had backed off over the edge of the drain.

Edward C. Bauerlein said Tuesday that people backed off over the pipe and drove forwards off the edge. He said he had put a long across the opening to catch the wheel so no damage would come to the cars.

"It's been a four year problem," he said. "I was just down last week and they said it 'took time'. So I asked how much time they wanted. I've quit foolin' with them," he said. "I told them that if they didn't fix it I was going to sue."

The council agreed Monday that the pipe should be marked with reflectors to warn drivers.

The next regular meeting of the council will be September 20 at 7:30 p.m. Monthly council meetings are open to the public.

The committee is to meet "at least monthly until plans are finalized." Appointment to the committee will be by the Board of Education. The committee is then to elect a chairman who will submit "a written report to the superintendent and to the president of the Board of Education."

The Board's action follows the request July 27 by the North Carroll Citizens for Better Education "that the Board of Education immediately appoint a specific Planning Committee, headed by a Chairman, including laymen from the community to cover all facets of school planning, including curriculum, plant facilities and Community Use of Schools for each individual construction, whether it be new or major renovation."

The Board is to meet "in the near future" to formulate the committee.

## LOCAL BIDS

In other matters of interest to northern county residents, the bid for major kitchen appliances at the Westminster High School was unanimously awarded to Hyson Brothers of Hampstead.

The Hampstead firm was, in all instances, the low bidder meeting specifications.

Greenmount Fuel Oil Company of Manchester was awarded the bid for supplying oil to Manchester Elementary School, Westminster East Middle

School, West End School, and the Lincoln Road Storage building.

# Manchester Council Okays Annexation Of 20 Acres

The Manchester Town Council voted Tuesday, August 10, to annex 20-plus acres of land at Wilhelm Drive off York Street.

The property is owned by developer Earl Schultz. The annexation proposal had been duly advertised according to Mayor Henry Hoffman, who said no official protesters appeared before the town council.

Mayor Hoffman said Mr. Schultz had initially wanted to build "some apartments" but that the town's "interim zoning" regulations would permit only one-or two-family homes unless the builder wanted to appeal the decision.

The appeal would be to a local board of appeals and Mr. Schultz decided to

stay within the normal provisions of the regulation according to the Mayor.

Although no agreement has been signed to provide water for the homes, the Mayor said the council had told Mr. Schultz several months ago that "we could take care of something like 20 or 25 homes; I don't remember the exact number."

Also at the Tuesday meeting the council agreed to seek bids on a new furnace for the Town Hall. Bids will be sought without the formality of advertising.

The council also agreed to seek a permit for a 300 foot sewer main extension in York Street. The cost of the extension will be born by the developer.

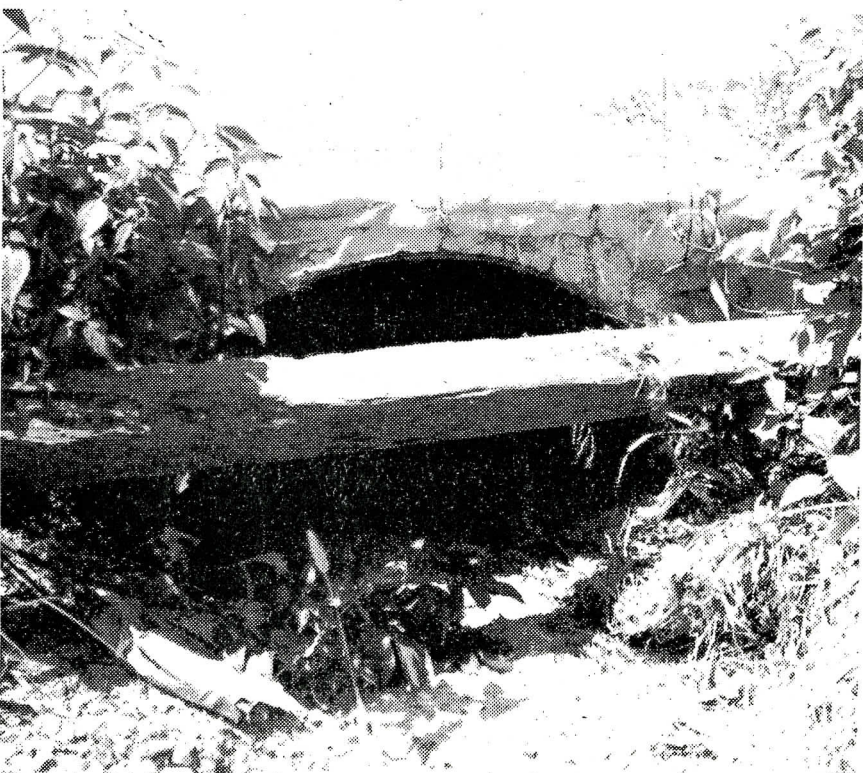

## Court-Martial Of Henderson Beginning At Fort Meade

Fort Meade (AP)—The court-martial of Col. Oran K. Henderson, the first of the My Lai trials to examine the massacre's aftermath, begins today with the prospect that high ranking Army officers will be called to testify.

Two generals and five colonels are on the jury hearing the case against the 51-year-old career officer who has been wounded and decorated in three wars.

### May Call Westmoreland

Maj. Carroll J. Tichenor, the Army prosecutor, included a retired brigadier general in the first week's list of a dozen prospective witnesses.

Henderson's civilian attorney, Henry Rothblatt, said: "I may bring every bit of brass that had

anything to do with Vietnam," including Gen. William Westmoreland, long-time commander of American forces there and now Army chief of staff.

Henderson is charged with willfully failing to investigate reports of a massacre and violating a regulation to report "incidents and acts thought or alleged to be war crimes."

### 5 Other Trials

He also is charged in two counts with lying to a blue-ribbon Army inquiry into the events and aftermath of March 16, 1968, when an infantry company stormed into the South Vietnamese hamlet looking in vain for the 48th Viet Cong battalion.

The five other My Lai courts-

martial—including the current one of Capt. Ernest Medina in Georgia and the 4½-month trial that convicted Lt. William L. Calley, Jr., of murdering 22 civilians—have focused on the assault itself.

Henderson's trial will be the first public exposure of what happened afterward and why it took more than one year before reports of the massacre got beyond the command level of the American Division.

Of 12 officers originally charged with the coverup, Henderson is the only one ordered to trial. Charges against the others were dropped and administrative action taken against some, including the loss of one star for

# NEW Meddlers Harass Counties By Busing Edict Both Black and White Children Victims of Social Experimenters

The crackpot social engineers of the federal government are upon us with their latest craze, busing children all over the landscape to achieve racial balance in a school system.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare is pressuring Prince Georges, Anne Arundel, Wicomico, Charles, Calvert and Dorchester counties to obtain racial balance regardless of where the children live, which means busing.

The quacks of HEW are dedicated to the destruction of the concept of the neighborhood school whenever the school happens to serve an area populated mostly by one race.

If you live in a predominantly white area and most of the students at your neighborhood school are white, this will not be tolerated by the social experimenters who want to use your children.

If you are a Negro in a mostly black neighborhood where the school enrollment is predominantly black, your child, too, will have to be bused away for the silly game of racial balance.

### PUBLIC ANGRY

The people don't want it. The legislatures of the nation don't want it. And the parents nearly everywhere are damned angry about it.

Two years ago the Maryland House of Delegates overwhelmingly passed a bill to prohibit busing children away from their neighborhood schools for racial balance.

The bill, sponsored by Del. William J. Burkhead, D-Anne Arundel, died in the Senate for lack of time to act on it in the final hours of the legislative session.

Since then, however, the Supreme Court has ruled that school systems must have racial balance, even if that requires massive busing to achieve it.

When the federal bureaucrats in HEW rejoiced at the court decision and started pressuring local school systems to comply, there was an enormous bellow of outrage and protest from parents — both white and black.

### NIXON'S PERIL

President Nixon heard the yells and realized his political peril. He announced his firm opposition to mass busing for racial balance.

But Nixon finds himself in the same awkward position as everybody else at this stage. He is stuck with the Supreme Court's decision and his own Department of Health, Education and Welfare, which must try to implement the standards set by the courts.

We have had a long series of wacky court decisions in recent years but the rulings on the busing

of the students and parents involved.

Some years ago when Maryland schools were segregated black children were bused miles away from their homes to all-black schools. I protested the injustice, inconvenience and cost of this apartheid.

### SENSIBLE

I applauded when the school systems of the counties were integrated by merely assigning children to their neighborhood schools, which makes sense.

Of course, some schools remained predominantly black because they served mostly black neighborhoods, and the social reformers are currently trying to break up these concentrations by dispersing the students to other schools.

It is a silly business. It has nothing to do with the quality of education, but can actually damage education.

Some day soon, the court may rule that entire metropolitan areas involving several school systems must impose racial balance in each school.

This would mean that Baltimore inner city students would be bused to suburban schools, and vice versa.

### RESISTANCE

If such a court order ever is issued, I predict such massive resistance that it will be impossible to enforce.

There is no way that government could ever persuade parents in Glen Burnie or Towson or Essex to send their children to inner city schools, or even outer city schools.

And I doubt whether inner city parents would want their children shipped daily to an entirely different cultural and economic environment where they would be aliens.

It is impossible to imagine that any sound educational program could be conducted under such conditions.

Black students are enrolled in most county schools because their families happen to live in the neighborhoods served by the schools.

Neighborhoods are becoming more integrated as black families purchase homes in suburban areas, and this increasingly will be reflected in the school populations.

But we do not need any more alarming and disruptive social engineering by our courts and federal bureaucrats. The people of

## Joppa Church Vandalism Creates \$40,000 I

State police investigators said they were without clues to the identities of vandals who caused more than \$40,000 damage to the Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church in Joppa.

Vandals entered the church in the 1100 block Philadelphia Road sometime between 6:30 p.m. Saturday and 7:30 a.m. Sunday, according to investigators, and smeared walls, rugs and equipment with an epoxy-based turquoise paint.

Church officials estimated that about \$10,000 of the damage was to rugs. Peace symbols, some four feet in diameter, were painted on the bulletin board, an auditorium wall and on the rug in front of main altar.

POLICE SAID THE hoodlums also used a hose to drain water from the furnace boiler into the office of the pastor, the Rev. John H. S. Austin.

The vandals cut and ripped the main power and telephone cables and poured paint into a refrigerator-freezer in the kitchen. Paint was smeared over most of

the kitchen equipment as well as pews, rugs and walls.

Church officials said they believed all of the damage is covered by insurance. They said damage could run as high as \$50,000.

State police said the act marked the second time in less than two years that a church in Harford County has been the target of vandals.

In September of 1969, vandals inflicted \$10,000 damage to the Edgewood Baptist Church. Three teen-aged boys were arrested in connection with the case.

INVESTIGATORS said they were able to lift several fingerprints from the vandalized rooms of the church but were not sure if they would turn out to belong to the vandals.

Sunday services were held in an undamaged chapel in the church but some of the Sunday school classes had to be held outdoors.

Mr. Austin and his family were summoned home from a vacation in Wildwood, N. J., after the vandalism was discovered.

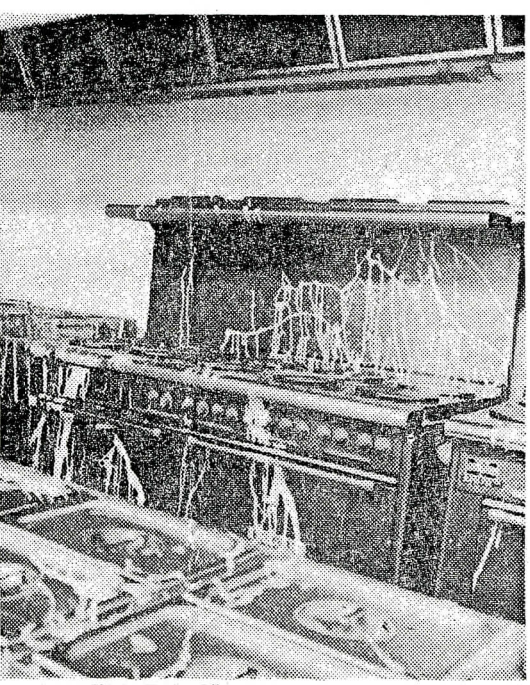

The bill, sponsored by Del. William J. Burkhead, D-Anne Arundel, died in the Senate for lack of time to act on it in the final hours of the legislative session.

Since then, however, the Supreme Court has ruled that school systems must have racial balance, even if that requires massive busing to achieve it.

When the federal bureaucrats in HEW rejoiced at the court decision and started pressuring local school systems to comply, there was an enormous bellow of outrage and protest from parents — both white and black.

### NIXON'S PERIL

President Nixon heard the yells and realized his political peril. He announced his firm opposition to mass busing for racial balance.

But Nixon finds himself in the same awkward position as everybody else at this stage. He is stuck with the Supreme Court's decision and his own Department of Health, Education and Welfare, which must try to implement the standards set by the courts.

We have had a long series of wacky court decisions in recent years but the rulings on the busing question are probably the worst.

Mass busing for racial balance will not improve education for anybody. It will only disrupt education, not to mention the lives

to suburban schools, and vice versa.

### RESISTANCE

If such a court order ever is issued, I predict such massive resistance that it will be impossible to enforce.

There is no way that government could ever persuade parents in Glen Burnie or Towson or Essex to send their children to inner city schools, or even outer city schools.

And I doubt whether inner city parents would want their children shipped daily to an entirely different cultural and economic environment where they would be aliens.

It is impossible to imagine that any sound educational program could be conducted under such conditions.

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Neighborhoods are becoming more integrated as black families purchase homes in suburban areas, and this increasingly will be reflected in the school populations.

But we do not need any more alarming and disruptive social engineering by our courts and federal bureaucrats. The people of this nation are tired of being bullied by a government that has been far too liberal with our tax dollars and now is trying to be liberal with our children.

Pressman said he told Russell that the corner grocer could not charge the same prices as the supermarkets because they did not have the buying capacity and gave credit.

"Mr. Russell said that was the corner merchants' problem, and he would not concede that they had to charge higher prices than the chain stores. He also claimed that the poor did not know that prices were lower at the chain stores."

## Julian Hits 'Wastelands'

City Councilman Emerson R. Julian, D-4th, today attacked city programs which he said have created "wastelands in Baltimore."

The councilman noted that the government has cleared entire square blocks for various projects only to leave them lying vacant, useless and untaxable.

"Right near me," he noted, "you have an area that looks like Europe after the war — as though someone bombed it out."

He referred to the Franklin-Mulberry corridor, where city officials bought block after block of properties to provide a right of way for the East-West Expressway.

**BUT, JULIAN** noted, there has been indecision and switching of routes for the road since then.

The net result is that hundreds of families had to make the sacrifice of moving out from their homes in the path of the planned highway. But not one inch of the route has been built, Julian noted — making the "sacrifice wasted."

He also noted that other areas have been cleared for urban renewal projects long before any useful redevelopment is begun.

During this time, he noted, the properties are removed from the tax rolls because they pass from private ownership to the city's hands.

**THIS WORSENS THE** financial condition of the city just when it is in urgent need of funds to combat urban problems.

He called for better coordination of property purchases, and said site acquisition should not be made long in advance of actual use.

# Ten Persons Arrested In Racial Incidents

County police have arrested ten persons on Main Street in Ellicott City over the past two weeks for incidents the police describe as having "racial overtones."

White and black youths apparently clashed on September 2, the police have said, resulting in a head injury to Jackie A. Sutton, 19, of Liberty Road, Sykesville. The same night police were forced to disperse a large crowd at Maryland and Main Street where the earlier clash had taken place.

Police arrested John Lee Hall, 25, of Furnace Avenue, Elkridge, and Mit-

chell L. Scott, 27, of New Cut Road, Ellicott City, after they began fighting in the crowd.

Howard County police reported they had kept close watch on the situation in Ellicott City since August 27 when friction apparently began in Ellicott City restaurant. Several black youths were apparently chided with racial comments by several white youths in the restaurant, about 11 p.m., police said.

Some fighting occurred, according to

# Time Seen Running Out While Crime Rages On

WASHINGTON — A New York police chief today told law enforcement officials from around the country that the "crime clocks" of America show time is running out and that police have been putting out brush fires while the criminal holocaust rages on.

George A. Murphy, vice president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police and head of the Police Department in Oneida, N. Y., quoted the alarming statistics in the Justice Department's latest crime report and added:

"There is cause for alarm in statistics, but there is another side to the crim epicture. Looking in-

trospectively at our system of criminal justice, we find it was originally established to cope with crime as it occurred.

"POLICE, PROSECUTION, courts and corrections were all designed to deal with the offender after the crime had taken place. Until the two most recent decades, very little was done towards the prevention of crime . . ."

Murphy emphasized that cities across the nation still seethe with the casue of crime and predicted that the social upheaval of today promises to continue for some years to come.

The high ranking policeman told his audience, which included Baltimore Police Commissioner Donald D. Pomerleau, that it is up to them to begin to lay the ground work to meet the challenge of the issues that create crime.

HE TICKED OFF the issues as civil liberties, war, poverty and pollution, and added that they generate crime and recklessness among youth and underprivileged citizens.

Murphy said America is experiencing protests of revolutionary proportions.

"The years ahead," he said, "will be turbulent to say the least. The police officer of tomorrow will be faced with an unprecedented challenge.

"Society will expect him to in-

tercede in sensstvie social turmoil with the wisdom of Solomon, the intelligence of Socrates and the strength of Samson."

MURPHY SAID, however, the nation's crime busters can shape programs of reform and restoration.

"We can insure to ourselves and our successors," he concluded, "the rights of equal justice under law envisioned by our forefathers."

### Maximum Sentence

The six were to be arraigned here today before Paul Kominives, a United States magistrate.

The conspiracy charge carries a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

# Opposition To Busing Continues Through U.S.

Vocal and occasionally violent opposition to court-ordered integration-by-busing plans has continued in some Northern and Southern cities although fewer parents kept their children out of school in many districts.

In Pontiac, Mich., where tensions have run high since 10 school buses were bombed August 30 FBI agents arrested a former Ku Klux Klan official and five others Thursday and charged them with conspiracy in that incident.

Police arrested 13 others in demonstrations and rock-throwing incidents, bringing to 38 the number arrested in anti-busing

protests since Pontiac schools opened Tuesday.

### Calm Community

William Hanger, police chief, said he thought the conspiracy charges would calm the community. Nevertheless, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said it would petition the United States District Court in Detroit today to assign federal marshals to insure order.

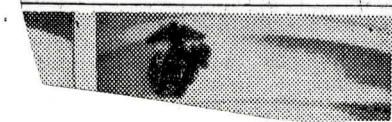

## Resentence Rap Brown, U. S. Court Tells Judge

NEW ORLEANS — (UPI) — A federal appeals court has ordered H. Rap Brown resented on a federal firearms conviction, ruling that the lower court judge who last sentenced the black militant had no right to do so in Brown's absence.

In its decision Friday, the 5th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals invalidated the five-year jail term and \$2,000 fine imposed on Brown and returned the case to U. S. District Court Judge Lansing L. Mitchell of New Orleans for resentencing.

Mitchell sentenced Brown in 1968 for carrying a carbine illegally in travel between New York and New Orleans. Brown is being held in New York.

# Educators To Demand \$7 Billion

## Cite High Urban Costs In Plea to Congress

WASHINGTON — School superintendents are organizing to try for treble the money President Nixon proposes for rural and city systems. If their campaign succeeds, several hundred educators will descend on Washington in late April to demand at least \$7 billion.

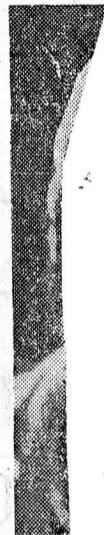
Nixon, with nationwide publicity, asked Congress last week to free \$2.5 billion in the year beginning July 1 to close the learning gap between disadvantaged children and other primary, junior and senior high school pupils.

The money ought to be handed out at the rate of about \$300 per poor child, the President indicated.

SOME SCHOOL officials from all parts of the country dispute Nixon's idea of the total need, argue with his "dollars for scholars" approach and plan an ambitious lobbying effort this spring to pry more out of Congress.

They are working through a council of school officials representing 26 urban areas, the National Education Association and several Washington-based lobbying groups.

Leaders of the move come from Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Seattle in the home states of the two members of Congress positioned to help them the most. They are Sen. Warren Magnuson, D-Wash., and Rep. Daniel J. Flood, D-Pa., who head congressional appropriations committees handling the budgets for primary and secondary school aid.



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HOUSE Education Committee Chairman Carl Perkins, D-Ky., after several pleas from the educators, held a press conference last week to warn congressional budgetmakers that Nixon's proposals would shortchange schools, especially in the ghetto.

It costs perhaps three times as much to educate a child in a city school system as it does in a rural classroom. So, superintendents argue, with Perkins' help, that the \$300 per pupil idea nurtured by the White House, will simply shortchange large schools.

School budgets are not expected to be on the floor of the Senate or House for a vote before late April or early May. Though their strategy is not settled, spokesmen for the educators said they were likely to try a twin attack: To amend budgets in the first general debate, and to add more school money onto supplemental requests for schools.

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# Congress Asked To Adjust Pay

By **NED YOUNG**

The Civil Service Commission has submitted an Administration proposal asking Congress to approve legislation that would remove inequities in the effective dates of pay increases for federal blue collar employees whose pay adjustments were affected by the freeze from August 14 to November 15 last year.

Also those affected by the 6-month deferrel of wage surveys which was subsequently rescinded.

Approximately 214,000 workers would receive retroactive pay adjustments for periods ranging from two weeks to three months, should the proposal become law.

The proposal provides that whether the pay increases were held up by the freeze itself or by the deferment of surveys, pay adjustments would be made retroactive to their normal effective dates.

As to background, on Feb. 23, 1972, the Comptroller General ruled that blue collar workers whose pay adjustments had been held up by the freeze should receive their adjustments retroactively — of the wage survey for the local area was ordered prior to Aug. 15, 1971.

**OF SOME** 35 areas involved, eight did not qualify for such retroactive payments.

Earlier, on Jan. 11, 1972, the President had cancelled the six-month deferment of blue collar wage adjustments and approved the resumption of local wage surveys.

These surveys were conducted on an expedited basis in the affected areas, but all resulting pay increases were required by law to be paid prospectively, rather than retroactively.

Thus, blue collar workers in some 39 wage areas where surveys would have been ordered between September, 1971, and January, 1972, have had their increases delayed for as long as 12 weeks.

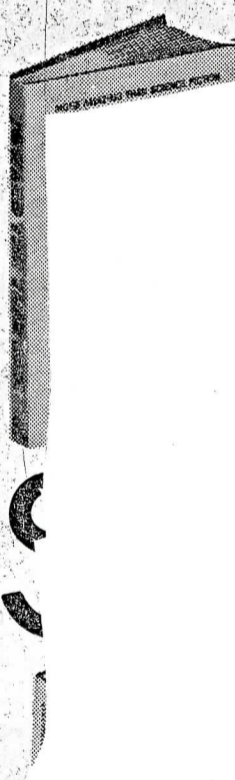

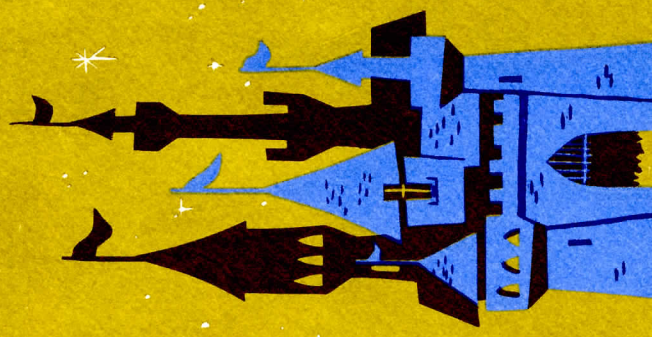

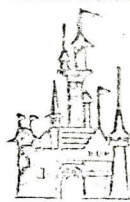

Annually, through an intensive selection process, the Disney organization in California names a lovely, very polished, and especially gracious young lady to serve as the Disneyland Ambassador to the World for that year. The Ambassador carries the friendly spirit and good wishes of Disneyland to heads of states, other political dignitaries and prominent personalities in the arts and sciences during her visit to foreign lands. She is also the official hostess at Disneyland when those people visit the Park.

During 1972, Miss Emily Zinser has been particularly effective as the Disneyland Ambassador. Enclosed is background material on her and her role, which is considerably more than the "beauty queen" type.

The Disney organization has generously assigned Miss Zinser to serve as the "VISIT USA AMBASSADOR" at the opening of the United States Travel Service's mobile tourism exhibit in Sydney, Australia, in early November. At no cost to the government, she and her chaperone are flying to Sydney to be with Jim Hamilton for official opening ceremonies on November 1. As you may know, my address to the Congress on the State of the Union included several proposals which, if enacted, would bring about sweeping changes in governmental operations. As I am particularly anxious that you receive full information about our initiatives for revenue sharing and governmental reorganization, I am enclosing material describing each of these programs in greater detail than was possible in my address on January 22.

These proposals, I think, deserve careful study, and I hope you will feel that they merit your backing. As a businessman, you know the value of streamlined organization. The governmental reorganization which I have submitted to the Congress represents a major step to bring this about within the ranks of the Federal bureaucracy. Even more, you know the value of sound fiscal management and are doubtless aware of the bankruptcy which threatens local and state government. By collecting funds in an orderly manner and then distributing them fairly to these governments, and by giving these governments flexibility in adapting expenditures to local needs, we have the opportunity to enhance both efficiency and accountability.

If we are to restore fiscal and organizational efficiency and effectiveness to government, and if we are to return authority to local

people who understand local problems, prompt action on these measures by the Congress is essential. As these proposals move through the arena of public debate, I hope you will find them worthy of your active support.
