Dear Mr. President,

I am writing you on Christmas Eve because I have a suggestion I believe important.

I have noticed during and since my recent military status, that the United States is pouring thousands of semi-skilled and highly skilled military men back into civilian life without guidance or a channeling process. Universities set the example by operating free employment agencies and by opening their records of the students to potential employers.

Therefore I suggest:

(1) That the U.S. Government set up a minimum fee employment service for separating military personnel with initial contact well before separation.

(2) That to implement this service, military 201 files on these individuals be opened to potential employers, upon approval of the individual concerned and a minimum of military authorities.

My reasons for making this suggestion are as follows:

(1) At the very least, these troops should have access to a national computer system so everyone knows what is coming available in jobs and where they can go to get them. Employers must know what skills are about to be released.

(2) Military recruiters boast widely how one can learn a new skill for civilian life in the military, but few recent studies have been done, to my knowledge, of how best to apply military skills to civilian life. This problem is increasingly true of retired military. With a specialized employment service, a growing cadre would be learning how to do just this.

(3) The Employment Service will make the individual aware of job opportunities in other areas of the United States less depressed, perhaps, than his home town (possibly the government could pay his fare there). The United States would then be taking a giant step against geographic unemployment by encouraging old skills and new military skills into a new area.

(4) Soldiers, especially college graduates, have an education that is now two to four years cold, with military training often having little relevance to their career and sometimes no real positive credit toward that career. They need assistance, contacts, and open records.

(5) Often, the maturity and thinking of the individual has changed markedly while in the service. He no longer fits into the old neighborhood or job. His goals have altered and he needs different opportunities.

(6) Some soldiers are prevented from returning to the old school or job for financial reasons caused by increased family or other complications.

(7) Many of the young soldiers are afraid to seek out professional employment agencies. They are uncertain of themselves or they lack money. State regulations on fees vary widely and some leading agencies demand their fee on hiring, putting a drain on savings or a

tight budget.

(8) I don't believe it is in the best interests of the United States to put trained military men into possibly socially unstable neighborhoods and leave them unemployed for any period of time. The neighborhood may not be the same. They may not fully understand what has occurred in the area if they have been out of the country. It is economically draining, and it could be dangerous.

(9) Generally, a better social mix will be encouraged. Philosophies and ideas will be exchanged in new neighborhoods and patterns will be broken.

Mr. President, I have expressed myself openly and I hope you will give some serious consideration to my ideas. I believe military separations and retirements provide an excellent opportunity to encourage relocation of skills that would have a low resistance to such relocation if opportunity beckoned. The fringe benefit might be more incentive to join the military service. I am sure, such a program would at least be a small step toward easing some social and economic tensions in this country.

Dear Mr. Showalter:

President Nixon has asked me to thank you for your letter and to explain his view of the mail he receives from the public. I am delighted to do so.

During his first year in office the President received more than three million letters, cards and telegrams -- so you will realize that he can personally deal with only a small percentage of the communications that come in. He is deeply interested in the letters sent to the White House, however, and he reads as many of them as he can. In addition to a random sampling of letters which the President reads twice a week, especially thoughtful letters are sent to his office for his attention. He dictates replies -- and sometimes writes them in longhand -- to many of these letters, although the many urgent demands on his time do not allow him to respond to as many of them as he would like.

Letters dealing with specific matters which come under the jurisdiction of government agencies, or which touch upon matters where agencies have particular competence, are normally referred to such agencies. The President has directed that such correspondence receive careful attention and prompt, responsive answers.

The President has found that many people who write to him have special insights and useful suggestions concerning the nation's affairs which would otherwise be unavailable to him. He has directed that every such letter be reviewed by an appropriate member of his staff. Frequently such letters will also be sent to government officials in the various departments and agencies for consideration there. It is not true that letters addressed to the President never get beyond the lowest staff level, as some of your students believe.

The processing of the President's correspondence involves far more than counting the number of writers who are for or against his position on given issues. In fact, he does not look to his mail for an accurate

reading of public opinion on issues: he knows that the mail cannot be considered to be a poll. However, White House staff members are frequently asked whether or not the mail is favorable to the President. We do not attach much significance to these counts, but when newsmen ask us we give them the most accurate count possible. It is not surprising that mail received by the White House can tend to have a different tone than that received by members of the Congress, since the writers are attracted by different positions on issues and spurred by different motives.

Contrary to the belief of some of your students, letters from young people, whether encouraging or critical, receive careful consideration. As your students may know, the President has a number of young people -- including many in their twenties -- on his staff, and he has appointed many more to important positions within the government. The President is making particular efforts at the present time to facilitate communication with students and other young people, in order to get the benefit of their thinking. A high proportion of the letters which are sent to the President's office for his personal attention are from young people, particularly young servicemen, young teachers, and students.

The President has stressed many times that he looks upon today's student generation as the best in this nation's history and the hope of its future. And he has always tried to leave no doubt that these criticisms he has expressed are directed at the small minority of students who are violent and destructive.

During a press conference on May 8, the President was asked, "Mr. President, what do you think the students are trying to say?"

The President's reply, in part, was this: "They are trying to say that they want peace . . . they want to stop the killing . . . they want to end the draft . . . we ought to get out of Vietnam. I agree with everything that they are trying to accomplish." A copy of the transcript of the Press Conference is enclosed. I believe that a reading of his replies to the questions concerning students will refute the contention that he has written off those students who disagree with him as part of the "lunatic fringe."

It is a pleasure to have this opportunity to give you this summary of the President's views on the points raised in your letter. He asked me to convey his warm good wishes to you and to each of your students.

JUST ONE MAN'S THOUGHTS ABOUT THINGS WHICH SHOULD CONCERN YOU!

Tuesday afternoon I had just returned from picking up my cleaning at the shop of a fine old Jewish gentleman who has been a good friend for years. I am sure he cleans the clothing of Arab students just as well as he cleans mine, and at the same prices.

She saw, in Cuba, only those things she was INTENDED to see, heard only what she was INTENDED to hear. I cannot help but wonder if it has crossed her confused little brain what her fate would have been if she had stood on the steps of the University of Havana extolling the virtues of the United States and berating communism! It just might get through to her someday, but with her head so crammed with the stuff, it may take her longer than most to GROW UP!

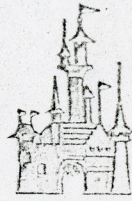

My dear Mr. President: I MAY CONCERN:

I am appealing to you as a last resort and pray you can help me. I am a widow, deaf, 75 years old and will be 76 years on August 9th. I have had three heart attacks and a stroke. Fortunately, I have recovered and am ambulatory except for a loss of memory. However, I am on anti-coagulants (Dicumarol, Dyxamol and Diuril) which makes it necessary for me to have blood drawn for a prothrombin test every two or three weeks at the hospital.

After losing three pregnancies, and then my husband at 54 years of age in 1948, I adopted a five day old baby boy. I worked 15 years in a nursing home to raise and educate this boy. He had a 2-S deferment for college but had to leave Hiram Scott College in his third year due to lack of money. He came home and had a 2-A for one year to study photography and from 5:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. he drives a taxi cab to pay his schooling and help pay the taxes. He gets up at 5:00 a.m. to get to school six days a week.

Draft Board, Local 151, 213 South Water Street, Waukegan, Illinois 60085 has now said he has passed his physical.

At my age, the need for my son's help in driving me to the hospital and doing my shopping and heavy house work is an acute one. I have no one else; my family are all dead. The draft board lawyer told me because I receive \$161.30 Social Security and \$120.00 interest, I am not wholly dependent upon him.

How many years can you live at my age and condition? Maybe two, or four, or less. My life depends upon the help I get from my son. This worry is now causing my blood pressure to rise. I implore you, please help me get a hardship deferment for my son John. It means my life.

Yugoslav Hero Who Saved the Lives of More World War 2 Fliers Now Works as a Porter in H

By HAL JACQUES

"I am nobody now. For a while, I was a soldier. I fought for what I believed in. If no one knows now what I have done, it is all right. I, Bora Kacarevic, Serb from Yugoslavia, I will know."

This is how the former guerrilla hero sums up his life — the life of a hero whose courage saved over 250 Allied fliers in World War 2.

Today, Kacarevic is a poorly paid, part-time porter in Hollywood, Calif. He has never been decorated by the U.S. government.

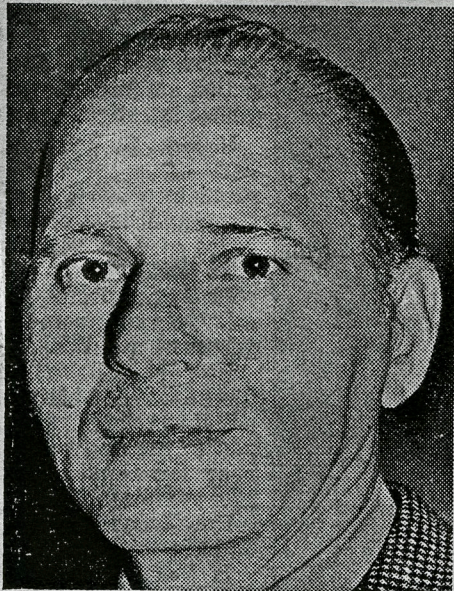
"What I did for Americans in the war was the most happy thing in my life," he told The ENQUIRER during an interview in his tiny, 1½-room apartment.

"Every man has a hope for his life. Many die before reaching their hopes. But I have accomplished many things.

"I know what it means not to have freedom.

"But I have come to freedom," he said.

Now an American citizen, Kacarevic, 55, told how he fled the Nazis at the outbreak of war, spent a year undergoing British commando training, then parachuted into occupied

Yugoslavia as a young lieutenant of the Chetnik guerrillas.

His mission was to lead a band of 50 ragged, ill-equipped resistance fighters in sabotaging German communications lines — and rescuing Allied airmen who parachuted or crash-landed.

"In every village the Nazis nailed up a sign that said if anybody helped Americans, his home would be burned

and his entire family executed," Kacarevic recalled.

"They caught one man wearing an American shirt, another had several feet of American parachute cord. They were both shot."

Still the guerrillas managed to hide Allied fliers by the dozen.

One of the airmen was Merrill Walker, now a police lieutenant in Los Angeles, who commanded a B-24 Liberator bomber which was ripped apart by Nazi fire and crash-landed in Yugoslavia.

It was the start of 66 days of hide-and-seek that Walker remembers as an endless nightmare.

"From the moment they (Kacarevic and his men) got us out of the plane, we were kept on the move continually," Walker told The ENQUIRER. "We spent a day here and a day there.

"We slept in barns, caves, haystacks and out in the hills.

"Now and then we'd run into various groups of other fliers, on the run like we were, and all of them being cared for by Kacarevic and his band of men."

Walker noticed that his group never saw the same group of other Americans twice, and it dawned on him that Kacarevic had the hillsides literally swarming with escapees.

Ultimately, Walker found, there were more than 250 of them. "Kacar-

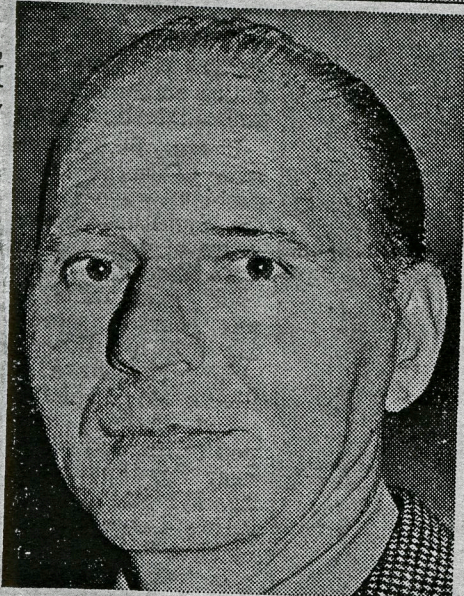

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Ultimately, Walker found, there were more than 250 of them. "Kacar-

evic was really incredible," Walker recalled.

"Somehow, Kacarevic managed to acquire medical supplies, food — even cigarettes."

Another American officer, Major Charles King of Tucumcari, N. Mex., recalled:

"At times, there was a driving snowstorm and food was very scarce, but Kacarevic went out and walked far into the night so that I could have something to eat.

"He bought my food. Tobacco was at a premium, but he always saw to it that I had a smoke, which he bought with his own money."

When Kacarevic disappeared, it was to work on another project — the construction of a secret airfield on a nearby mountain plateau.

"I saw it as the only way these men could ever get back to their own people," he said.

"I used to buy 50 pounds of tobacco. For a pinch of this, people from the village came and worked to clear the field so planes could land. I did this many times."

It took a year and a half to complete the landing strip. A month before it was ready, Kacarevic radioed Allied forces in Italy and told them of his escapees.

"They did not believe me," he recalled with a grin. "They thought it was a German trick."

Finally convinced, the Allies began an evacuation operation in August 1944.

Fighter planes escorted the heavier troop carriers in, circled protectively overhead, and escorted them out without a hitch.

In two days, Kacarevic's "guests" were gone.

As the war neared its end, Kacarevic — ill with typhoid and wounded in the thigh — was flown by British advance units to Italy, where he recovered in a hospital.

As a Chetnik loyal to the exiled King Peter, he could not return to Communist-controlled Yugoslavia. After 20 months in a displaced persons' camp near Naples, he went to Morocco, then on to Canada, and finally to the United States in 1952.

He worked on a Detroit auto assembly line — and, he said, saved \$13,000 for his old age — until 1958, when he moved to Los Angeles.

One of the few evidences he had of his adopted country's appreciation was a commendation, signed in 1944 by Walker and three fellow officers, which stated:

"Lieutenant Kacarevic has done much more than his duty in seeing that the Americans were properly cared for. He has unselfishly used his own personal funds . . ."
