Since your visit to Zagreb and Croatia, the situation of the Croatian people has worsened.

Thousands of Croats have been jailed since December 1971; one Croat in every three has been forced to leave his homeland.

We are concerned in particular about the sentencing of students in Zagreb because Tito gave directions that the judge need not observe the legal requirements.

Croatia belongs to the West and therefore the West should protect the Croatian people and its seashores lest it fall into double slavery. Croats are forced into Revolution to protect their lives: therefore it must be obvious to you that the Croatian nation faces a desperate situation.
