MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

Subject: Nomination of Representative and
Appointment of Alternate Represent-
ative to Serve on the Executive
Board of the World Health
Organization (WHO)

Discussion:

The United States was elected to membership on the WHO Executive Board for a three year term beginning July 28, 1969. Public Law 643 - 80th Congress requires that the President shall nominate the Representative by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and shall appoint the Alternate Representative.

Recommendation:

I recommend that you give your informal approval for the nomination of Dr. S. Paul Ehrlich, Jr., Deputy Director, Office of International Health, United States Public Health Service as Representative on the Executive Board of the World Health and the appointment of Dr. Benjamin D. Blood, Associate Director, International Organizations Affairs, Office of International Health, United States Public Health Service as Alternate Representative. I make these recommendations with the concurrence of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Subject: Nomination of the Representative of the United States and appointment of the Alternate Representative of the United States on the Executive Board of the World Health Organization

The United States was elected to membership on the World Health Organization Executive Board for a term of three years beginning July 28, 1969.

To represent the United States on this Board, I recommend, with the concurrence of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, that Dr. S. Paul Ehrlich, Jr., of Virginia, be designated the Representative of the United States of America and Dr. Benjamin B. Blood, of Virginia, be designated the Alternate Representative of the United States of America on the Executive Board of the World Health Organization.

Pursuant to Public Law 643, 80th Congress, as amended, the Representative of the United States of America is designated by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and the Alternate Representative of the United States of America is designated by the President.

Dr. Ehrlich and Dr. Blood have been accorded security clearances based on full field investigations by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

There are enclosed for your approval the nomination of Dr. Ehrlich as Representative and the commission for Dr. Blood as Alternate Representative.

THE WHITE HOUSE

The President today announced his intention to nominate Dr. S. Paul Ehrlich, Jr. of Bailey's Cross Roads, Virginia, to be the Representative of the United States on the Executive Board of the World Health Organization. He also announced the appointment of Dr. Benjamin D. Blood of McLean, Virginia, to be the Alternate Representative of the United States on the Executive Board of that organization.

The United States was elected to membership on the Executive Board of the World Health Organization for a term of three years beginning July 28, 1969.

Ehrlich, 37, is the Deputy Director of the Office of International Health of the Public Health Service. He received his Medical Doctor's degree from the University of Minnesota in 1957. He served as a medical officer with the United States Coast Guard in 1958 and 1959 when he became a member of the Grants and Training branch of the National Heart Institute. In 1961 he was made Chief of the Field and Training section of the Heart Disease Control Program Division of Chronic Diseases. From 1966 to 1967 he was the Assistant Chief for Program Development of the Heart Disease Control Program and in 1967 was made Deputy Chief of the Program.

In 1967 he became Associate Director for Bilateral Programs in the Office of International Health of the Public Health Service, a position he held until he assumed his current job.

Ehrlich is married and has three children.

Blood, 55, has been the Associate Director for International Organization Affairs in the Office of International Health. He is currently assigned to the U.S. Mission in Geneva.

He received his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine from Colorado State University in 1939 and went into the general practice of Veterinary Medicine, first in Indiana and then in Missouri. From 1942 to 1946 he served as a Veterinarian in the United States Air Force.

In 1946 he became Chief of the Bureau of Veterinary Affairs for the U.S. Military government in Korea, a position he held until 1949 when he became the Chief of Veterinary Public Health of the Pan American Health Organization. From 1952 to 1957 he was a consultant to that same organization. In 1964 he served as International Health Representative for the Office of International Health of the Public Health Service and in 1965 became Acting Chief of the International Relations Division, a position he held until he assumed his current job in 1966.

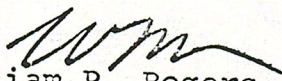
