2. DELIVER THIS MESSAGE TO CHARGE COMBS ONLY AT 0700 ON FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 12.

3. SOKOLOV CALLED ON ASSISTANT SECRETARY RIDGWAY AT 1830 HOURS EDT TO GIVE THE SOVIET RESPONSE: "WE AGREE TO IMMEDIATELY START WORKING OUT ALL THE NECESSARY DETAILS FOR THE RELEASE OF BOTH INTO CUSTODY OF RESPECTIVE AMBASSADORS. THAT RELEASE SHOULD BE SIMULTANEOUS. WE PROPOSE THAT THE OPERATION BE EFFECTED TOMORROW (THAT IS, SEPTEMBER 12) AT 1000 A.M. IN NEW YORK, LOCAL TIME, AND AT 1800 HOURS IN MOSCOW, MOSCOW TIME. THE SOVIET

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SIDE GUARANTEES THAT IT WILL FULFILL ITS PART WITH REGARD TO THE SIMULTANEOUS RELEASE IF THE U.S. GIVES US THE SAME GUARANTEE."

4. AFTER CONSULTING WITH JUDGE SOFAER, RIDGWAY RESPONDED TO SOKOLOV BY PHONE WITH THE FOLLOWING THREE POINTS:

- IN PRINCIPLE WE AGREE TO THE ARRANGEMENT;
- WITH RESPECT TO THE EXACT TIME, THE U.S. SIDE WILL WORK THIS EVENING (THURSDAY) TO MAKE THE NECESSARY ARRANGEMENTS TO MAKE THE 1000 A.M. TIME PROPOSAL. RIDGWAY WILL GET BACK TONIGHT TO REPORT ON SOFAER'S SUCCESS IN MAKING THE ARRANGEMENTS.
- AS THE SCENARIO UNFOLDS ON FRIDAY, IF THERE IS A DELAY WE CAN ADJUST ACCORDINGLY, KEEPING THE RELEASE SIMULTANEOUS.

5. SOKOLOV SAID HE UNDERSTOOD WHY WE WERE AGREEING IN PRINCIPLE ONLY AT THIS TIME AND UNDERSTOOD AS WELL THE NEED TO ALLOW FOR ADJUSTMENTS WHEN THE SCENARIO ACTUALLY UNFOLDS. HE WILL WAIT TO HEAR FROM RIDGWAY THIS EVENING WHETHER EVERYTHING IS IN PLACE IN NEW YORK. SHULTZ

2. SUMMARY: ASST. SEC. RIDGWAY CALLED IN SOVIET
EMBASSY MIN-COUNSELOR SOKOLOV AT 1:00 P.M. SEPTEMBER 11
TO PROVIDE DEFINITIVE U.S. RESPONSE TO PROPOSAL MADE BY
AMB. DUBININ TO SECRETARY SHULTZ THE DAY BEFORE.
INDICATING THAT USG CONTINUED TO FIND SOVIET PROPOSAL
INADEQUATE IN THAT IT DID NOT RESOLVE THE DANILOFF/
ZAKHAROV CASES, RIDGWAY NOTED THAT SOVIET PROPOSAL

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CORRESPONDED TO THE FIRST PHASE OF THE PROPOSAL SHE HAD MADE TO SOKOLOV SEPTEMBER 9. THE USG WAS PREPARED TO AGREE TO THE REMANDING OF DANILOFF AND ZAKHAROV TO THEIR RESPECTIVE AMBASSADORS AS A FIRST STEP TOWARD A COMPREHENSIVE SOLUTION. RIDGWAY INDICATED THAT, IF THE SOVIETS AGREED, WE WERE PREPARED TO WORK OVERNIGHT TO IMPLEMENT THIS FIRST STEP WITHOUT DELAY. SOKOLOV, AFTER SEEKING CLARIFICATION ON A NUMBER OF POINTS, SAID RIDGWAY'S PRESENTATION HAD "MOVED US FORWARD," AND INDICATED HE WOULD SEEK MOSCOW'S PROMPT APPROVAL TO BEGIN STEPS TO IMPLEMENT THE PLAN. HE ACKNOWLEDGED THAT REMANDING OF DANILOFF AND ZAKHAROV WAS ONLY FIRST STEP TOWARD AN ULTIMATE SETTLEMENT, AND CONFIRMED THAT THE SOVIETS OWED A RESPONSE ON REMAINING ELEMENTS OF USG SEPTEMBER 9 PROPOSAL. SEE ACTION REQUEST PARA 13. END SUMMARY.

3. RIDGWAY WAS ACCOMPANIED BY LEGAL ADVISOR SOFAER AND EUR/SOV DIRECTOR PARRIS. SOVIET EMBASSY COUNSELOR KUZNETSOV ACCOMPANIED SOKOLOV.

4. RIDGWAY OPENED THE MEETING BY NOTING THAT, AS SECRETARY SHULTZ HAD TOLD AMB. DUBININ THE DAY BEFORE, THE PROPOSAL DUBININ HAD PRESENTED FOR REMANDING DANILOFF AND ZAKHAROV TO THEIR AMBASSADORS' CUSTODY WAS INCOMPLETE. IT DID NOT SOLVE THE PROBLEM; IT ONLY POSTPONED IT. WE HAD CAREFULLY EXAMINED THE PROPOSAL DUBININ HAD PRESENTED, AND REVIEWED OUR OWN PROPOSAL OF SEPTEMBER 9. WE REMAINED CONVINCED THAT WE SHOULD SEEK TO SOLVE THE TWO CASES DEFINITELY; INTERIM MEASURES DID NOT GET TO THE HEART OF THE MATTER.

5. NONETHELESS, WE HAD NOTED THAT THE FIRST STAGE OF OUR PROPOSAL COINCIDED WITH THAT OF THE SOVIET PROPOSAL. WE WERE PREPARED TO TAKE THAT FIRST STEP, ON

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THE UNDERSTANDING THAT WE SHOULD PROCEED IMMEDIATELY TO SOLVE A PROBLEM WITH ENORMOUS POTENTIAL TO ADVERSELY AFFECT OUR BILATERAL DIALOGUE AND MUTUAL INTERESTS. IF POSSIBLE, WE WOULD LIKE TO COMPLETE THIS FIRST STEP TONIGHT (THURSDAY NIGHT). WE RECOGNIZED THE DIFFICULTIES POSED BY THE TIME DIFFERENCE, BUT WE HAD ALREADY MADE THE NECESSARY ARRANGEMENTS WITH OUR LEGAL AUTHORITIES. THE RESPONSIBLE JUDGE WOULD BE PREPARED TO MOVE QUICKLY UPON PRESENTATION OF THE CORRECT MOTIONS BY ZAKHAROV'S DEFENSE COUNSEL.

6. RIDGWAY HANDED OVER A PAPER OUTLINING CONDITIONS OF ZAKHAROV'S RELEASE TO CUSTODY OF SOVIET AMBASSADOR. SHE SPECULATED THAT CHARGE COMBS AND BESSMERTNYKH WOULD HAVE TO WORK OUT SIMILAR ARRANGEMENTS FOR DANILOFF'S RELEASE IN MOSCOW. TEXT FOLLOWS:

-- PERSONAL RECOGNIZANCE --I.E., NO BOND OR OTHER SECURITY WOULD BE REQUIRED.

-- AN APPROPRIATE LETTER WOULD BE FILED WITH THE COURT IN WHICH AMB. DUBININ WOULD ASSUME RESPONSIBILITY.

-- THE U.S. GOVERNMENT WOULD BE INFORMED OF ZAKHAROV'S RESIDENCE.

- ZAKHAROV'S TRAVEL WOULD BE RESTRICTED TO A 25-MILE RADIUS FROM THE UN HEADQUARTERS IN NEW YORK CITY.

- ZAKHAROV WOULD BE REQUIRED TO SURRENDER TO THE USG OR COURT HIS PASSPORT AND OTHER TRAVEL DOCUMENTS.

- ZAKHAROV WOULD BE REQUIRED TO CALL THE U.S. MARSHAL ON A DAILY BASIS TO CONFIRM HIS CONTINUED PRESENCE IN

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- ZAKHAROV'S RELEASE WOULD BE CONDITIONAL ON THE PRIOR
RELEASE OF DANILOFF INTO U.S. CUSTODY IN MOSCOW.

END TEXT.

7. RIDGWAY CONCLUDED HER PRESENTATION BY NOTING THAT
THE MAIN OBSTACLE TO PROMPTLY IMPLEMENTING THIS FIRST
STAGE WAS LIKELY TO BE TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATIONS.
(SOKOLOV AGREED.) SHE REITERATED THAT, IF WE WERE ABLE
TO TAKE THE FIRST STEP, WE WOULD WANT IMMEDIATELY TO
FOCUS OUR EFFORTS ON A DEFINITIVE SETTLEMENT OF THE
CASES. SIMPLY REMANDING DANILOFF AND ZAKHAROV TO THEIR
AMBASSADORS' CUSTODY DID NOT SOLVE THE PROBLEM.

8. SOKOLOV RESPONDED THAT, WHILE THE SOVIETS WOULD HAVE
TO ANALYZE CAREFULLY THE PAPER RIDGWAY HAD GIVEN HIM, HE
HAD THREE QUESTIONS:

-- THE FIRST WAS QUICKLY RESOLVED WHEN IT BECAME CLEAR
THAT HE HAD MISUNDERSTOOD THE REQUIREMENT THAT ZAKHAROV
"CALL" THE U.S. MARSHAL TO MEAN AN APPEARANCE IN
PERSON. ONCE RIDGWAY AND SOFAER CLARIFIED THAT WE HAD
IN MIND A TELEPHONE CALL, SOKOLOV INDICATED THAT WOULD
BE NO PROBLEM.

-- THE SECOND HAD TO DO WITH THE WORD "PRIOR " WITH
RESPECT TO THE TIMING OF THE RELEASE OF DANILOFF AND
ZAKHAROV. SOFAER EXPLAINED THAT THE LANGUAGE WAS
DICTATED BY THE LEGAL MACHINERY ON OUR SIDE. ONCE THE
JUDGE HAD APPROVED THE SOVIET PETITION THAT ZAKHAROV BE
REMANDED, WE WOULD PHYSICALLY RELEASE ZAKHAROV TO SOVIET

CUSTODY AS SOON AS WE HAD WORD, PRESUMABLY BY PHONE FROM
MOSCOW, THAT DANILOFF HAD BEEN RELEASED TO U.S. EMBASSY
PERSONNEL. RIDGWAY MADE CLEAR THAT WHAT WE WERE
INTERESTED IN WAS THAT THE TWO BE RELEASED AT THE SAME
TIME.

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- FINALLY, SOKOLOV ASKED ABOUT THE REFERENCE TO DUBININ'S "PERSONAL RECOGNIZANCE." HOW WOULD THIS BE EFFECTED? SOFAER EXPLAINED THAT DUBININ WOULD HAVE TO PROVIDE A LETTER IDENTICAL TO THAT PRESENTED IN THE AUGUST 26 INITIAL SOVIET PETITION THAT ZAKHAROV BE REMANDED IN LIEU OF BAIL. IT WOULD BE NECESSARY ONLY TO CHANGE THE DATE AND ADDRESSEE, SINCE A JUDGE, RATHER THAN THE ORIGINAL MAGISTRATE, WOULD CONSIDER THE PETITION THIS TIME. SOFAER PROVIDED SOKOLOV WITH A COPY OF THE AUGUST 26 LETTER AND INDICATED HE WOULD BE AVAILABLE THROUGHOUT THE DAY TO WORK WITH THE SOVIET EMBASSY TO ENSURE THAT LEGAL REQUIREMENTS WERE MET.

9. RIDGWAY BRIEFLY SUMMARIZED WHERE THINGS STOOD IN THE WAKE OF THE PRECEDING CONVERSATION. THE SOVIET EMBASSY WOULD PRESUMABLY HAVE TO CHECK WITH MOSCOW. ONCE THAT HAD TAKEN PLACE, RIDGWAY ASSUMED SOKOLOV WOULD CONFIRM THAT MOSCOW WAS PREPARED TO MOVE AHEAD IMMEDIATELY. THE EMBASSY WOULD THEN BE IN TOUCH WITH SOFAER ON LEGAL ASPECTS OF THE PROBLEM. (NOTE: SOKOLOV SUBSEQUENTLY CALLED TO CONFIRM THAT MOSCOW HAD BEEN INFORMED OF THE DISCUSSION AND THAT, TO SAVE TIME, HE WAS SENDING KUZNETSOV TO THE DEPARTMENT TO WORK WITH SOFAER IN PREPARING THE NECESSARY PAPERWORK.)

10. SOKOLOV AGREED TO THIS APPROACH, NOTING THAT THE DISCUSSION HAD "MOVED US FORWARD." RIDGWAY UNDERScoreD THAT IT HAD NOT, HOWEVER, RESOLVED THE MAIN PROBLEM. IT WOULD BE NECESSARY TO GET TO WORK IMMEDIATELY ON THE NEXT STEPS IF WE WERE TO ELIMINATE ENTIRELY THIS

PROBLEM, WITH ALL THE POTENTIAL IT CARRIED FOR PUTTING OUR RELATIONSHIP OFF TRACK. SOKOLOV TOOK THE POINT, OBSERVING THAT BOTH SIDES VIEWED REMANDING DANILOFF AND ZAKHAROV AS BUT THE FIRST STEP TOWARD A FINAL SOLUTION TO THE PROBLEM. BUT IT WOULD TAKE THE PROBLEM OFF DEAD

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CENTER. AT THIS POINT, OTHER POTENTIAL ELEMENTS OF A SETTLEMENT SHOULD BE CONSIDERED "IN BRACKETS."

11. PARRIS ASKED IF WE SHOULD INTERPRET SOKOLOV'S LAST REMARK TO MEAN THAT THE SOVIET SIDE RECOGNIZED IT OWED A RESPONSE TO ELEMENTS OF THE USG SEPTEMBER 9 PROPOSAL NOT COVERED IN THIS FIRST STEP. SOKOLOV CONFIRMED THIS, OBSERVING THAT THE U.S. HAD A RIGHT TO A REPLY TO ITS PROPOSALS. THE SOVIETS WERE WORKING ON THE PROBLEM. BUT FOR HUMANITARIAN AND OTHER REASONS IT MADE SENSE FIRST TO TAKE THIS FIRST STEP.

12. SOKOLOV VOLUNTEERED THAT THE SOVIET SIDE WOULD BE PREPARED TO ACT EXPEDIENTLY TO THAT END. HE CONFIRMED THAT HE WOULD CONTACT RIDGWAY WHEN HE HAD SOMETHING FROM MOSCOW, AND THAT HIS STAFF WOULD THEN BE IN TOUCH WITH SOFAER. RIDGWAY POINTED OUT THAT THE SOONER WE COULD WORK OUT THE DETAILS OF THE TWO RELEASES, THE LESS THE LIKELIHOOD OF LEAKS. THE KEY STEP NOW WAS TO PUT ZAKHAROV'S DEFENSE ATTORNEY IN TOUCH WITH THE U.S. ATTORNEY HANDLING THE CASE IN NEW YORK. WE WERE PREPARED TO SETTLE THINGS TONIGHT. SOKOLOV INDICATED HE WOULD DO WHAT HE COULD TO EXPEDITE MATTERS.

13. PER PARRIS-COMBS TELCON, CHARGE IS AUTHORIZED TO CONTACT DEPUTY FOREIGN MINISTER BESSMERTNYKH OR HIGHEST AVAILABLE RESPONSIBLE MFA OFFICIAL TO CONVEY SUBSTANCE OF RIDGWAY PRESENTATION. YOU SHOULD ADVISE SOVIETS THAT

YOU STAND READY TO DO WHATEVER NECESSARY TO FACILITATE DANILOFF'S RELEASE INTO YOUR CUSTODY AT THE EARLIEST POSSIBLE JUNCTURE. FOR YOUR INFORMATION AND POSSIBLE USE IN THIS CONNECTION, WE ARE TRANSMITTING SEPARATELY TEXT OF LETTER WHICH DUBININ WILL PRESENT IN SUPPORT OF PETITION THAT ZAKHAROV BE REMANDED TO HIS CUSTODY. SHULTZ

5. IT IS UNCLEAR FROM HERE PRECISELY WHAT DOCUMENTATION THE SOVIETS MAY REQUEST. OUR CONCERN IS LESS WITH FORM ON THIS POINT THAN WITH SUBSTANCE. YOU MAY AGREE TO ANY FORM OF DOCUMENTATION WHICH YOU CONSIDER ADEQUATELY COVERS OUR INTERESTS. YOU SHOULD NOT AGREE TO ANY TERMS FOR DANILOFF'S RELEASE, NOR UNDERTAKE ANY COMMITMENTS, WHICH WE HAVE NOT REQUIRED FOR ZAKHAROV. THE SIMPLEST APPROACH MIGHT BE FOR THE SOVIETS TO ACCEPT A LETTER FROM YOU ALONG THE LINES OF THAT WHICH DUBININ WILL SUBMIT. DUBININ, AMBASSADOR OF THE UNION OF SOVIET SOCIALIST REPUBLICS TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, HEREBY HAVE THE HONOR TO DRAW YOUR ATTENTION TO THE FACT THAT GENNADY FEDOROVICH ZAKHAROV, A SOVIET NATIONAL, ARRIVED IN THE UNITED STATES IN DECEMBER 1982, HAVING A SOVIET DIPLOMATIC PASSPORT NO. 069083 AND SINCE THAT TIME HAS BEEN ATTACHED TO THE SECRETARIAT OF THE UNITED NATIONS.

THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UKRANIAN SOVIET SOCIALIST REPUBLIC, A UNION REPUBLIC OF THE USSR, MADE AVAILABLE THE SERVICES OF MR. G. I FURTHER ASSURE THIS COURT THAT IF THESE ASSURANCES ARE ACCEPTED IN LIEU OF BAIL MR. GENNADY ZAKHAROV WILL OBSERVE THE ESTABLISHED GEOGRAPHIC RESTRICTIONS ON TRAVEL AND HE WILL NOT LEAVE THE UNITED STATES WITHOUT THE PERMISSION OF THIS COURT.

THESE ASSURANCES ARE GIVEN WITH THE GREATEST RESPECT FOR THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THIS COURT.

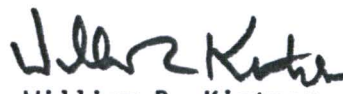

William R. Kintner is Professor of Political Science, Emeritus, at the University of Pennsylvania and a member of the board of the United States Peace Institute, a presidential appointment.

Having received his bachelors degree from the US Military Academy (1940) and his Ph. D. from Georgetown University (1949), Dr. Kintner began his distinguished career during the Korean War, serving in the US intelligence services and as an infantry battalion commander. After the war, Dr. Kintner went on to serve as a member of the planning staff of the National Security Council (1954), a special assistant to the President (1955), consultant to the President's Commission to Study the US Assistance Program (1959), and Chief of the Long-range Plans and Strategic Analysis Section for the Chief of Staff of the US Army (1959-61).

In 1961, he left government service for the academic world to become a professor of political science at the University of Pennsylvania. While at the University, he worked with the Foreign Policy Research Institute as its deputy director (1961-69), director (1969-73), and president (1976), during which time he also returned to government service as the US Ambassador to Thailand (1973-75).

In addition to these posts, Dr. Kintner has also been a fellow at the Hudson Institute, senior adviser to the Operations Research Office at John Hopkins University (1956-57), a consultant to the Stanford Research Institute, a member of the academic board of the Inter-American Defense College (1970-72), and editor of *Orbis* (1969-73, 76-82). He is a trustee of Freedom House and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Dr. Kintner has authored and co-authored numerous books and publications. His works include: *The Front is Everywhere* (1950), *Protracted Conflict* (1959), and *Building the Atlantic World* (1963). He will be the author of a forthcoming book on US - Soviet relations.

TENTATIVE CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

The Struggle Over "Peace"

Soon after its founding in 1917, the Soviet Union brought its first "peace" campaign to the world. The Sixth World Congress of the Communist International, meeting in 1928, resolved that the peace policy of the USSR "provides the best basis for taking advantage of the antagonisms among the imperialist states. . . . [It] does not imply that the Soviet State has become reconciled with capitalism. . . . It is merely a more advantageous form of fighting capitalism. . . ." Soviet peace initiatives would appear to be another form of war.

Many US foreign policy experts believe that the Soviets are currently implementing another major peace offensive. Strong indicators include the publication last December of *A Time for Peace* by Mikhail Gorbachev, a full page ad in *The New York Times* on February 5, 1986, entitled, "Nuclear Disarmament by the Year 2000," and frequent remarks to influential Americans visiting Moscow that the scheduled meeting between Gorbachev and President Reagan must produce positive results.

Soviet peace initiatives are designed to influence western public opinion. Experts anticipate that the emerging offensive is aimed at opinions and policies on arms control and disarmament and on regional issues such as Central America. The US will be portrayed as a menace to humanity whose plans for a strategic defense against Soviet ICBMs could lead to the end of civilization.

Will US policymakers recognize the peace initiative as it develops? Will they counter with effective policy? Can the United States take the offensive in "The Struggle Over 'Peace'"? This conference will examine these questions.

We are writing to urge you to direct the Treasury Department to enforce provisions of the 1930 Tariff Act prohibiting the importation of goods into the United States made by slave labor. We understand the Treasury Department has concluded an investigation of the origin of certain goods which may have been produced by forced labor in the Soviet Union -- tea and wood products among others -- and is currently reviewing the possibility of taking action against certain products. We want to encourage you to hold the line on human rights repression by barring these goods from entry into the United States.

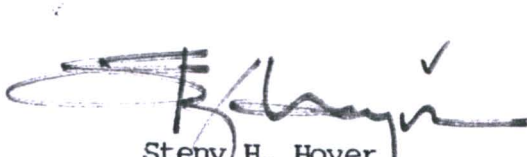
Recently, Soviet dissident Anatoly Shcharansky estimated that there may be as many as 13 million people serving in the forced labor system in the Soviet Union and said it is very difficult to find anything in the Soviet Union which does not include forced labor.

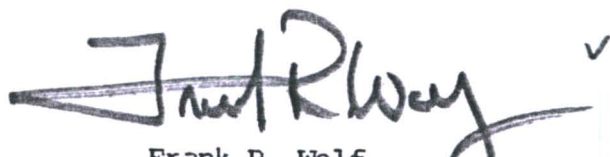
We must take a stand on this issue. It is the law, one which must be enforced and one behind which we must firmly stand. It is not a bargaining chip or a matter for diplomatic negotiation -- it's the law and we must insist that it be enforced without compromise.

If we respond to no other voice, we should heed Shcharansky's admonition: "Weak agreements only make those suffering behind the Iron Curtain more despondent. They are taking the tough line on the front; the least Western diplomats can do is to remember them in between the caviar and cocktail parties." (Wall Street Journal, June 4, 1986).

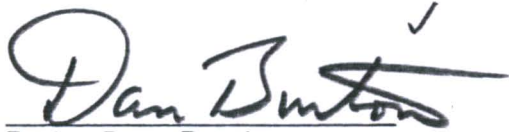

In addition, the Secretary believes it would be extremely useful for the President to meet with Ambassador Hartman as we begin a period of intense preparations for a summit meeting later this year, during which the Ambassador will be playing an important role in our dialogue with senior Soviet officials, including General Secretary Gorbachev. The Secretary has asked that space be found on the President's calendar for a fifteen-minute review of the current scene in the U.S.S.R. and U.S.-Soviet relations either before or after Shevardnadze's September 19-20 visit to Washington.

SUBJECT: Senator Kennedy's Meeting with Shevardnadze

Senator Kennedy called me Monday to say that he had met with Shevardnadze in New York for an hour and a half Sunday evening, and would be glad to provide a briefing. His assistant Gregg Craig came over yesterday to fill me in, on the same basis of confidentiality used earlier with Larry Horowitz. Highlights of the meeting were as follows:

Nuclear Testing:

Shevardnadze led off with a pitch for the Soviet moratorium proposal, in the process telling Kennedy that they appreciated the Congressional resolutions. He said that they felt that both Congress and the American public wanted a moratorium, and therefore, the Administration was "isolated" on the issue. He stated that the question is how to mobilize support so as to "have an impact on the Administration." (Craig did not brief me on the Senator's response to this, except to report that Kennedy told him that he thought the Administration would not accept the moratorium proposal.)

NST

Kennedy then asked whether there was movement on other issues. Shevardnadze replied by giving a run-down on NST issues which tracks closely with what he was telling Shultz in their meetings. So far as Soviet objectives are concerned, Shevardnadze presented them as follows:

(1) "Strengthening the ABM Treaty." He commented that the US wants time to "destroy" the treaty; Soviets want time to "strengthen it." Dismissed the offer of five-year non-withdrawal as meaningless since nothing could be deployed in that time frame in any event. He did imply that by "strengthening" they meant a non-withdrawal commitment for 10-15 years.

(2) "Avoid an arms race in space." Under this rubric, Shevardnadze spoke of banning space-to-earth weapons, implying

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that that would be adequate. (That is, "space-to-space" would not be constrained except by the ABM Treaty.)

(3) Strategic Weapons: Either 30% or 50% reduction would be OK, dependent upon the degree to which the ABM Treaty could be "strengthened." Absent such "strengthening", however, no START agreement is possible.

Daniloff:

Kennedy brought up Daniloff at this point saying that feelings all over were very high, and that they covered the political spectrum; even liberal Democrats were screaming for blood. Shevardnadze said, "We have felt this," and then launched his usual spiel that this atmosphere of crisis had been created in an artificial way and was being used by "influential people" who wanted to make sure that a Summit meeting could not occur. He noted that the "whole affair" -- including the expulsion of the 25 in New York -- was timed so as to prevent his meeting with Shultz and the President, but said the Soviets would not fall into the "trap" laid.

Kennedy told him that the crisis was a genuine one since no U.S. Administration could remain indifferent to the arrest of an American citizen under such circumstances. Shevardnadze mumbled something about their being concerned with the "dignity of a Soviet citizen," and sang the standard refrain about pressure not being the way to deal with the Soviet Union. He added that Daniloff would be tried.

Kennedy said that putting Daniloff on trial would be a big mistake on the Soviet part: it would only play right in the hands of those elements which wished to wreck any improvement in U.S.-Soviet relations. Shevardnadze informed Kennedy that the Soviets were proposing either that both Daniloff and Zakharov be released without trial, or that trials be speeded up, both tried, then both expelled. He said that everything must be simultaneous, and on the basis of reciprocity and equality.

Kennedy told him that no American President could agree to such terms. We had said publicly that Daniloff is not a spy and Zakharov is. That precluded any direct trade of the sort he mentioned.

Shevardnadze then asked how Kennedy would propose to solve the matter if he were President. Kennedy said that he could answer only in terms of what he considered politically feasible for any U.S. President. In that respect, he felt that if Daniloff were

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released promptly and without a trial, then it should be possible to work out some arrangement whereby the Soviets release a few dissidents over the coming weeks (which they could explain on humanitarian or health grounds), after which there could be an understanding that Zakharov would be allowed to return to the Soviet Union. He said that, in his view, this was as far as any U.S. President could go in making advance understandings on the matter, and that the Soviets had to recognize that any straight swap or direct equivalence was simply politically impossible in the U.S.

COMMENT: Craig said that Kennedy considered the information in the last paragraph to be extremely sensitive, and that he recognized the danger of appearing to second-guess the President -- or unwittingly get in the way of negotiations we have in progress. However, he had made the statements in an effort to give credence to what he thought was the Administration's position.

If, indeed, Kennedy was as firm on the "political realities" as Craig claims (he read these statements to me from his notes), then I believe they could be helpful. Certainly we should be careful not to bend on a point which even Kennedy has told them is out of the question.

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
