Dear Secretary Lehman:

I am writing to you in search of your assistance in obtaining an admissions acceptance to the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences School of Medicine. Mr. Morton C. Blackwell, Special Assistant to the President in the Office of Public Liason, has suggested I appeal to you.

While attending medical school on the island of Grenada, I acquired a deeper gratitude to and appreciation for the United States Armed Forces. The evacuation of medical students and other American citizens from Grenada afforded me the opportunity to assess my own personal character in a time of crisis. Driven by an inner force of leadership, I was able to take charge of the immediate situation and working within the limitations congruent to the situation, safeguarded the lives of my fellow classmates and myself during the thirty-six hours we were alone on the Grand Anse campus. In reflection, I now realize how comfortable I felt being in charge and aiding others through an experience novel even to myself.

Upon returning to the United States, I was privileged to visit a critically wounded Army Ranger in the Intensive-Care Unit of Walter Reed Hospital. The twenty year old soldier lay comatose. In speaking with his father, Colonel Robin Luketina, I was touched by his words, "He was only doing his job". Well, that may be true but it does not relieve the tremendous debt I feel toward the men and women who rescued me in Grenada.

I addressed the Outreach Conference on Central American Affairs on November 2, 1983 sponsored by the Office of Public Liason. In my brief talk I tried to express my sincere appreciation to President Reagan and the Armed Services for my safe return home. As one actually involved and not just a bystander, I tried to quell the criticism of the United States intervention in Grenada. Finally, upon meeting with President Reagan, I was able to

personally thank the man who had the character to make the controversial decision which saved my life.

Mr. Secretary, I am a medical student of mediocre grades with an average presentation on paper. I am a man with sincere obligations to the President of the United States, to the Armed Forces and to myself to become a doctor. I feel the only fulfillment of these obligations would be attendance at the Uniformed Services University of Health Sciences College of Medicine which would culminate in the opportunity to serve my country which has served me so well.

My feeling is so strong that I see the time and effort I have invested in St. George's University School of Medicine as preparatory for the College of Medicine in Bethesda. All I need is the chance and to you, Sir, I appeal.

I have included a brief biographical sketch for your personal perusal. Thank you for your time and consideration of this matter.

SUBJECT: Correspondence relative to Bob Jones, III

Thank you for sharing the December 27 letter to you from Bob Jones, III and for asking for my thoughts.

His comments are not typical of the letters we get from religious leaders. When such sentiments are expressed, they are usually phoned in, often by leaders who begin by listing their credentials as Reagan supporters in 1980.

Time and again recently, I have heard comments to the effect that this is the most anti-church administration in history.

This sounds strange in light of the Voluntary Prayer Amendment, the Year of the Bible, the Tuition Tax Credits bill, etc. But religious leaders who were most supportive of the Reagan 1980 candidacy are increasingly concerned at what they see as government threats and assaults on religious freedom.

The course I have suggested to the Administration is outlined in the attached briefing papers I prepared for Mr. Meese and Mr. Baker for use in their meeting last week with key Protestant leaders.

Increasingly, conservative religious leaders tell me they are learning to distinguish between words and actions, between token efforts and serious undertakings.

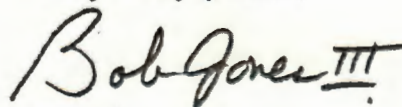
One of the purposes for which the voluminous White House staff exists is for the providing of inquiry into abuses of the bureaucracy.

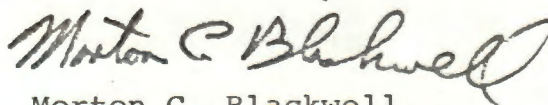

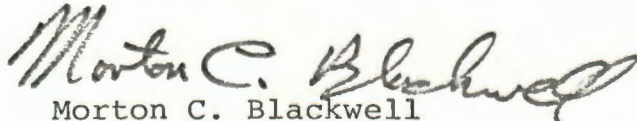
