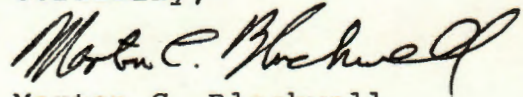

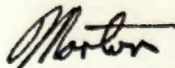
I have enclosed the information you and I recently discussed.

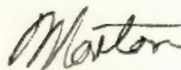

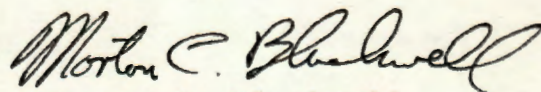

Dear Mr. Blackwell,

I am informed that you are the liason person for Protestants in the White House. Therefore, I am writing to you to ask that you arrange for an interview for me, if possible, with President Reagan; when I am in Washington, D. C. sometime soon. I will be testifying at a sub-committee appropriations committee meeting but do not now know the time. I can send this to you later.

I have been corresponding with President Reagan since his inauguration; first through his secretary, Helen Damm and then later through the plan administered by Gene Higgins. I have done this writing as a former neighbor whom the President never met but who as an older person has had through the years similar experiences common to the mid-west. President Reagan has indicated that my suggestions are helpful. Some of the changes he has made are such as I have been recommending.

My reasons for wishing to have the interview are two-fold. I may have something from our common background and my wide experience in this country and overseas which can be shared better through personal conversation than through letters. And, likewise; I may have something to share with him as a minister concerning our mutual seeking for God's way in the important decisions he has to make. The enclosed gives a brief listing of my training and experiences which are background for such an interview. You may wish to consult with Helen Damm concerning my meeting with the President. She should know if he would be interested and if so, time and length.

Whether or not it proves possible for me to visit with President Reagan, I would appreciate having an interview with you. Forty-two years in the ministry give me a broad base for evaluating what is happening in our world. I am told that you have interviews with Indians. I worked personally with Dakota Indians, beginning in 1940, sometimes living with them. I hope to have at least one such visit this summer. I can speak of the sweep of changes that have evolved through these years.

Thank you for any help you can give in arranging for this suggested interview with President Reagan.

Perhaps you should know the background of the ruby I presented to you. Enclosed is a brief description.

I really thought long and hard over an appropriate presentation for you, and I hope you found my design concept appropriate to the occasion. I could not decide on how to mount the stone. One idea would be to mount it in a frame in which a light could shine through the ruby from behind, thus displaying the red to best effect.

We had a number of inquiries from Time Magazine, Newsweek, and wire services, but I have seen no coverage of the ruby "Stopped ERA" presentation. Perhaps if we had spent Federal funds on the project, it would have been of more interest to them.

I know that you have received many well deserved compliments on the skill and tenacity with which you led the battle to stop ERA. I can only add that you are a unique leader in our time. You have recruited untold thousands of activists who will be vital as we create a new conservative majority and gradually change from defensive to offensive battles.

The ruby was given for you by Mr. Floyd Carpenter, proprietor of the Treasure Chest, P. O. Box 54, Havre de Grace, Maryland 21078. Mr. Carpenter runs one of the nation's largest lapidary processing companies. He and his wife are strong conservatives and great admirers of yours. No one else in the country, to the best of my knowledge, had a suitable ruby in size and quality.

The layout work for the stone was donated by Nina May, who is a well known supplier of type setting and layout services for conservative groups in the D. C. area.

The jewelry work was done by Trygve Nupen Jeweler in Falls Church, Virginia. The "STOPPED ERA" sign and the small plaque inscribed "LEADER OF WINNERS, PHYLLIS SCHLAFLY, JUNE 30, 1982" were crafted in gold by Mr. Nupen, whose fee was paid 5/6 by Paul Weyrich's three organizations and 1/6 by a personal check of mine.

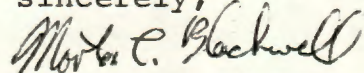
Dear Dr. Janney:

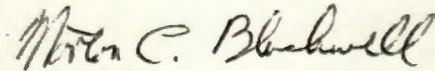

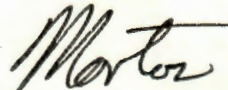

Veterans unit opposes VA-Meharry link

The president of the Veterans Coordinating Council here said today he was opposed to a proposal that would give equal access by Meharry Medical College to the Nashville Veterans Administration Medical Center.

In other action, the Meharry National Alumni Association has asked the NAACP Legal Defense Fund to investigate "possible racial inequities" in the running of the VA hospital since it was established in the late 1940s.

Officials of the defense fund said today no immediate legal action was contemplated but said they are trying to find out Meharry's legal rights to share medical staff positions at the VA hospital equally with Vanderbilt Medical School.

Currently, Vanderbilt faculty and resident physicians dominate the hospital's medical staff under an affiliation agreement dating back to 1947.

"There seems to be, subject to investigation, a disparate treatment of Meharry and Vanderbilt which warrants taking a look at it," said Jack Greenberg, director counsel of the NAACP Legal Defense Fund in New York.

Napolean Williams, assistant Legal Defense Fund counsel, said that if a federal task force currently studying the access question is unable to come up with a solution for sharing the VA hospital, "it would show there would be a need for legal relief."

However, Williams said whether legal action was filed in that case would depend on whether Meharry can prove its le-

gal rights to a share of the hospital.

Hilrey Love, president of the council which represents 8,000 veterans in Davidson County, said his group opposes Meharry's proposal because "the care is just not as good" when doctors from two medical schools serve in the same VA hospital.

"This is the only thing we are concerned about — the quality of care for the veterans hospital," Love said. "We're not politicians. We're just trying to look after the veterans."

"The only reason the hospital exists is to take care of disabled veterans," he said. "It looks to me like Meharry is in trouble financially and they are trying to bail them out at the expense of the veteran."

Love said he had not been invit-

ed to meet with representatives of a federal task force on Meharry who are scheduled to hold a "fact-finding" tour in Nashville Thursday and Friday.

Purpose of the two-day tour, which will include meetings with officials from Meharry, Vanderbilt and the VA hospitals in Nashville and Murfreesboro, is to provide information to the task force, commissioned last month by the White House to help resolve the access issue.

The task force will be represented in Nashville by Dr. Robert Graham, task force director and an official of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services; John Murphy, general counsel of the Veterans Administration; Dr. Earl Brown, deputy chief VA medical director; and Isabel Dunst, HHS.

I am pleased to announce today that President Reagan has ordered action to help Meharry Medical College achieve self-sufficiency.

Meharry, founded in 1876 in Nashville, Tennessee, has played a unique role in American medical history.

It is one of only three institutions dedicated to the training of black physicians. Indeed, more than 40 percent of all black physicians in the United States were trained at Meharry.

Historically, many of its students have come from families with disadvantaged economic backgrounds. Its graduates have established a strong record of practicing primary care medical specialties where they are desperately needed: in areas of physician shortages, particularly areas with high minority populations. Meharry's existence as a predominantly black medical school poses a unique set of complex financial challenges today. President Reagan personally directed that his administration help Meharry face those challenges so it could continue its historic service to America. This is consistent with the President's Executive Order of last September, directing additional federal support for historically black colleges and universities.

At the President's direction during the past month, an interdepartmental task force, formed by the Cabinet Council on Human Resources and consisting of representatives from the departments of Health and Human Services, Education, Justice, The Veterans Administration, and the Office of Management and Budget, has been studying possible ways to deal with the public interest at stake in Meharry's situation.

Earlier this week, task force recommendations were sent to the President.

Today, I am announcing that we will implement the President's decision to assist Meharry in fulfilling its medical training mission by putting into effect the following recommendations:

Access to Veterans Administration Resources

The Veterans Administration will move expeditiously to expand the existing affiliation between Meharry Medical College and the Murfreesboro, Tennessee, Veterans Administration Hospital. This will provide, over the next one to three years, an additional 100 to 200 teaching beds in internal medicine and surgery.

This action will both expand the resources in the mid-Tennessee area for providing services to veterans, as well as provide Meharry with an expanded educational base for its medical student and housestaff training programs.

Hubbard Hospital

The Department of Health and Human Services will seek to arrange to pre-pay the outstanding balance of the loan under which Meharry's Hubbard Hospital was financed with an HHS loan guarantee.

Interim Arrangement for Increased Clinical Teaching Resources

Along with the above federal initiatives, Vanderbilt University has indicated its willingness to enter into discussions with Meharry Medical College, with members of the Meharry Task Force as participants, related to providing interim access to Vanderbilt educational programs for a number of Meharry housestaff and medical students.

The effort to assist Meharry Medical College is not solely a federal responsibility. The President strongly urges and expects the appropriate state and local officials, as well as the private sector, to fully cooperate in this undertaking. He is also confident that the medical community will use its resources to participate in and further this common endeavor.

The administration will continue to encourage local interests in the Nashville area, working with Meharry, to provide expanded access to other local clinical teaching resources that may be available, through private and public institutions.

I want to stress that these actions will bring together a cooperative effort involving all three levels of government: local state and federal. Ultimately, Meharry's ability to stand on a firm financial footing, independent

of special federal support will depend on continuing cooperation on the state and local levels. There is certainly reason for optimism, based upon the voluntary spirit along these lines that has been evident thus far.

Meharry Medical College has faced formidable financial challenges. Considering the unique contribution Meharry has, and continues to make to the health care of the Nation, particularly to minority and disadvantaged Americans, the President believes the public benefits of the plan we announce today will be substantial and lasting. His action offers this historic and vital medical training resource a realistic chance to survive and continue its special service to the health needs of the United States.

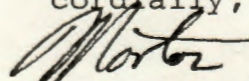
Thank you for sending me the information on the National Education Association PAC. I am sorry to see that the National Education Association does not understand that this Administration has a commitment to education.

Dear Life Member:

How would you feel if America's public school system suddenly ceased to exist?

Would you be angry?

Would you be devastated?

Would you wish that you had done more to recognize the threat and prevent it?

As President of the National Education Association, I must alert you to the possibility (some are already saying probability) that our public schools are marked for extinction.

In its second year, the Administration is attempting to cut another 30% over and above the original proposed cuts.

The Administration claims that the federal government should be only "minimally" involved in public education funding. Its current budget proposals would complete the first phase of the anti-public education plan by lowering education funds from more than \$15 billion in fiscal 1981 to less than \$10 billion next federal year (FY 1983, beginning this October 1).

Further, the Administration boasts of wanting to virtually eliminate federal support for public education by fiscal 1985!

At the very same time, the Administration wants to take the money they are denying our public schools and give it to the private and parochial schools through tuition tax credit proposals that will cost the federal government up to \$7 billion a year!

The Administration has blatantly reversed the traditional IRS ruling that denied tax exempt status to private schools which segregate students on the basis of race.

The Administration is determined to expunge the Department of Education--the federal agency which was created to advocate for America's public schools.

Through "block grants," the Administration has stripped needed programs for handicapped children, the disadvantaged, minorities, migrant children, college students and countless others.

The Administration has callously cut needed school lunch programs for hungry children.

And there is more. Much more.

The Administration has joined hands with powerful right-wing forces in wholehearted support of those who would:

- X • Mandate the teaching of "scientific creationism" in our public schools;
- Censor classroom texts and library books;
- X • Require religious prayers in our public schools;
- Racially segregate children through the expansion and enhancement of "private" schools, 80 percent of which are church-connected;
- Restrict the federal courts from utilizing busing as an available tool in desegregation efforts;
- Eliminate so-called "secular humanist" public school teachers who teach values to students (except, of course, the right-wing's values) and encourage independent or critical thinking. (Virtually all public school teachers have been labeled "secular humanists.")

There is no longer time for debate regarding the motives of the Administration and its right-wing allies when it comes to the public schools.

The record is clear.

The right-wing agenda is being moved to the forefront and "chits" owed by the Administration from the 1980 election are being called in.

At this very moment, the professional fund-raising wizards of the right-wing are preparing new petitions and scurrilous letters to millions of Americans denouncing the Department of Education and advocating tuition tax credits.'

'All of this spells potential disaster for America's public schools unless supporters of traditional American public education rally together now and do something about it.'

If you are like me and believe that our country's greatness and strength lie in our universal public education of all Americans as both citizens and contributors to American life and society, you are probably as alarmed by this Administration's abandonment of public education as I am, and you know something has to be done to stem this tide.

This is a Congressional election year. If more anti-education zealots are elected, our problems will compound geometrically.

If supporters of public education are elected, however, there may still be hope for our school system. All candidates for office must realize that NEA and NEA-PAC will not stand idly by if they take adverse positions on educational issues.

We must help friends of education and defeat education's enemies X
where it counts: at the polls.

Dear Reverend Bridges:

Thank you for your letter of July 16 regarding the article in the Baptist Press headlined "McAteer Backed by White House".

You asked if the article were accurate. It is not.

Ed McAteer was not in communication with anyone at the White House respecting the particulars of the Southern Baptist Convention in New Orleans.

Ed has been for years a strong supporter of restoring voluntary school prayer which the Supreme Court has outlawed, reversing 170 years of previous legality. He was one of those invited to the White House on the National Day of Prayer, May 6, when the President announced his intention to propose a constitutional amendment to restore voluntary school prayer.

At that event, Ed warmly predicted to me that the New Orleans convention would endorse the President's proposed amendment. Many others present also told me they were supporting the President's proposal. As was entirely appropriate, I thanked each cordially.

The article you sent me is both wrong and misleading. Although my wife is a Southern Baptist, she did not attend the convention. I did not know the process by which the convention considered resolutions nor did I know what action, if any, Ed, or any other person intended to take at the convention. Aside from Ed's prediction, the next information I received regarding that convention was the Washington Post story reporting that the convention had endorsed the President's proposed amendment by a three to one margin.

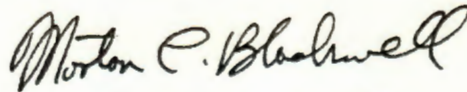
In sum, neither I nor anyone else at the White House asked anyone to take any action regarding the New Orleans convention. Nor did we have any knowledge of events there until after the fact.

The role of the Office of Public Liaison is to facilitate communications regarding public policy between the Administration and organized groups. We have sent leaders of all major interested groups information regarding the proposed amendment. Enclosed is one of our packets on this subject. As soon as it is printed, I will send you a White House Issue Update on this topic which has been prepared for Administration spokesmen.

Public opinion polls indicate 75% of Americans favor restoring voluntary school prayer. The amendment enjoys significant support from a broad variety of religious leaders such as Dr. Adrian Rogers. Secular groups such as the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars have for years at their national conventions called for the kind of remedy the President has proposed. It is our hope that the Congress will act on this amendment this year and that the states will promptly ratify it.

Again, thank you for this opportunity to correct the error in the article which raised your concern.

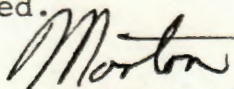

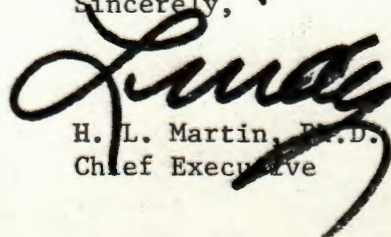
Thank you for a very delightful visit while I was in Washington. I felt a genuine interest in your concern for American Indians and am looking forward to working with you.

SPAIC - Martin Plan
for Indian Self-Sufficiency

Listed below are suggestions for Indian tribes, groups, and communities to aid in becoming self-sufficient.

1. Every effort should be made to encourage the government to honor its trust agreements, treaties, and financial assistance as long as it is needed to help Indian people.
2. Public Law 93-638 should be studied very carefully by Indians. The opportunity for contracting services will aid if properly negotiated and handled in the self-sufficiency process. Proper contracts utilizing Indian manpower can be a valuable tool.
3. Special attention should be given to the establishment of Indian owned and operated businesses that are necessary in the community. That is; household goods, clothing, and other necessities make for business possibilities.
4. Tribes, groups, and communities should determine if they want to develop tourism as a business possibility. Attention should be given to be sure that Indians get the benefit of revenues generated by tourist attractions.
5. Each tribe or group should establish a Tribal Industrial Development Board. This Board would seek business and industry possibilities for the community.
6. Proper contact and relationship should be made with state development boards and seek their assistance in bringing some of their business and industrial discoveries to Indian communities.
7. Nationally Indians should work together to identify their needs to the top industries in the country and ask that they consider bringing their expansion factories to areas where Indians live.
8. Each Indian community should examine the possibility for developing an industrial park. Legal ramifications relative to charters or agreements should be worked out so that prospective businesses would not be turned off by unnecessary red tape.
9. Each tribe or community should carefully assess the resources, both human and natural, and determine how they could be best used to aid the people.
10. Private foundations have money available for humane projects that will aid in research, training, and implementing plans that will especially help needy people. These groups can be identified and the information passed on to Indian groups.

11. Indian leadership should meet with the Mission leadership of churches dedicated to helping Indian people. These groups should be encouraged to spend more of their efforts and programs in career planning and training as a part of meeting spiritual needs.
12. There are organizations in America, such as Save the Children, that are dedicated to helping Indian people. These groups can be identified and utilized in maintaining self-sufficiency.
13. There must be a cooperative effort on the part of all Indians to share their successes, information, expertise, and human resources with all Indian people. It is the purpose of the Society for the Preservation of American Indian Culture to gather this information and share it with all Indian groups.
