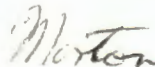

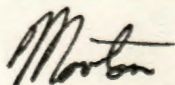

A large number of conservative groups will be extremely upset if Volker is reappointed. They will take it as a signal that the President is missing this opportunity to change the Establishment's business-as-usual practices.

(I note that the economy made an up-turn just at the time when Volker was up for possible reappointment. Volker might even expect that the decision would already have been made by now. Perhaps we should arrange to change the statute so that the term of the Chairman would end and therefore the appointment or reappointment of a Chairman would have to be decided in early November of 1984.)

The American Legion will be observing the third annual ceremony of a NATIONAL PAUSE for the PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE, Monday, June 14, 1982, at 4:00 P.M. at the Historic Ft. McHenry, Baltimore, Maryland. The Star Spangled Banner Flag House, which has sponsored Flag Day for 30 years or more, is the site of the Battle during the War of 1812 that inspired Frances Scott Key to write our National Anthem. The Flag House was the home of Mary Pickersgill, who completed the original Star Spangled Banner in time for it to be flown during the Battle of Baltimore that turned the tide in the War of 1812. The original Flag is on display at the Smithsonian Institute. I hope some day I shall have the opportunity to visit. The Flag House still stands today.

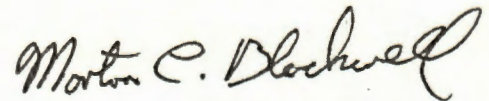

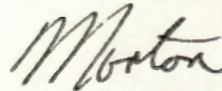

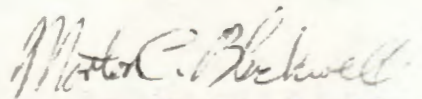
Thank you for your securing of the Paul Harris Fellowship for the President.
