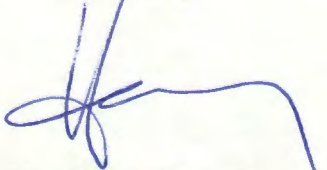

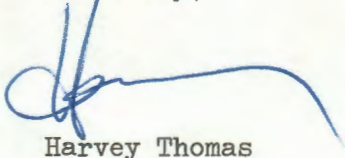

Dear Morton:

It was great talking to you last Friday night, March 11. You sounded great. To follow up on our conversation about the withholding of interest income and dividend income, I believe that the President is making a major political and economic blunder.

Instead of supporting the withholding of interest income and dividend income, President Reagan must advocate the termination of the withholding provisions. The reasons to abolish them are:

- (1) the reduction of accumulated interest income which results for less taxable income. For example, a person invests \$10,000.00 for a six month Certificate of Deposit at 12% in which the interest expense is paid monthly. The monthly interest income of \$100.00 is invested into a savings account of 6%. Thus, \$550 is earned the next month along with an additional \$100.00 from the CD account. With withholding, a person would get only \$90 per month to go along with the government getting or better yet confiscating \$10.00 per month from the CD. Also, the investor earns only \$.405 the next month in the savings account ($\$90.00 \times .06/12 \times .9$) while the government is getting \$.095. Thus, you can see how the government reduced my accumulated interest income which means lower taxable income which in turn means lower tax revenues, a larger deficit.
- (2) an increase in inflation which is due to less funds available for the private sector to buy government bonds as well as a larger deficit because of smaller tax revenues. The Federal Reserve Board will buy the unsold government securities, an act which increases the monetary supply. Remember, an increase in the money supply without an increase in goods and services means inflation in the future, rising prices.

- (3) a potential rise in interest rates due to increase competitive bidding between the federal government and the private sector at the same money supply level, an act to hinder economic recovery.
- (4) an increase in banking costs to the consumer. For example, in Indianapolis, the major banks are charging service fees on profit entity accounts and for non-profit entity accounts whether a check was written or not.

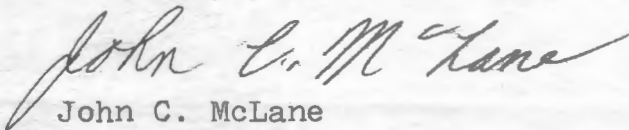
Morton, we must get Reagan to change his mind on this poorly conceived policy. If the President wants to get compliance, require all banks, savings & loans institutions, credit unions, and brokerage firms to send forms "1099" to each investor whatever level of interest income or dividend income is as well as sending them to the IRS.

Morton, please inform the President, there is even a loophole in his withholding provisions. Any smart investment advisor would advise his affluent clients to invest a certain number of dollars to produce interest income of upto only \$150.00 per year per account. Since the banks, the S & L's, the credit unions, and brokerage firms don't have to send the investor form "1099", the investor could fail to report the income on his appropriate tax forms with the probability from being caught of over 90%. In order to prevent low compliance, eliminate that \$150 interest income exclusion before the "1099" form comes into play.

Morton, let us not get the savers and investors angry at our great President. Instead, please show President Reagan my letter so that he may see the potential great error of clinging to this poorly conceived plan.

Why does he not engage Dr. Schwarz to write up the content for such talks?

1. As feudal age ends, commercial rape of mother earth ("land").
2. Cost of access to it becomes too expensive. "Land" ceases to compete effectively with industry for human labor. (In North America, availability of vast stretches of inexpensive good new land delays this phase of the process by 300 years).
3. WAGES (labor's share in the product) fall or, alternatively, unemployment rises as speculators hold ever more "land" for ransom. Consequences: POVERTY-IN-THE-MIDST-OF-PLENTY ("PMP") and confused economic theories trying to deal with problem.

"PMP" (see "3" above) powerfully reinforces this phase of process "B". Most wage-earners can no longer afford to buy independent education.
2. Education, by nature a cultural undertaking in the creation of inner (psychic/spiritual) wealth, becomes a political tool designed to produce "equality."
3. Spreading inner poverty - "IP." Inner vision and conceptual powers wane. Processes A/B become impenetrable.
4. Individual ability to unite with other individuals in the supra-personal domain of thought degenerates.

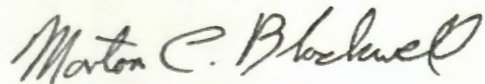

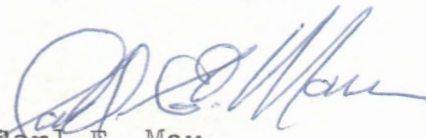

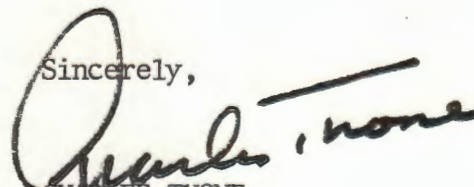

Dear Secretary Lehman:

In the short time you have been Secretary of the Navy I am sure you have received many interesting letters, but I assure you the letter you are about to read will be the most exciting to date. This is said without fear of contradiction. It has been developed in two parts. I will start with Part A, but before I do I would like to give you some highlights of my background because I am sure it will help you come to two favorable decisions on my plans.

It was a little over a month ago when the Delaware County Council recruited me to create interest and enthusiasm in procuring the USS Iowa for the Penn Shipbuilding Company in Chester for repairs. Unfortunately your department announced its decision in four days to go elsewhere. I then went in another direction. It was my privilege to direct a petition to your department asking for work for the Penn Shipyard. I was able to direct the Chester police and other important folks in Delaware County to procure over 10,000 signatures. These were presented to your department just recently. The reason I was so enthusiastic about this is because when I was a student at Brown University I saw soup kitchens and men selling apples on the streets in Providence, Rhode Island. I never, never want this to happen again in America.

I am officially known as the Idea Man of Delaware County, Pennsylvania. I have some 41 plaques majestically hanging on the walls in my office in Media, Pa. Just to name a few - I created a high medial strip for highways to prevent cross-over accidents way back in 1947 while a District Highway Safety Director for the State of Pennsylvania. The National Safety Council feels this project has saved thousands of lives since that time.

During the Vietnam War I was Director of the Veterans Hospital Radio Network at the height of the war. I made bedside visits to

our wounded, both in Japan and Vietnam. I would send the tapes to their home town radio stations where they were played and then given to their families. I could go on and on, but I want you to become aware of two of my present projects.

PART A

While in Vietnam I made tapes on the hospital ships USS Sanctuary and the USS Hope. When I came back to this country I made a visit to the Chesapeake Bay area and went aboard numerous ships which are now mothballed. At that time the Maritime Commission said they were being held for future emergencies. They continue to say this. I claim an emergency exists today. My proposal is simply this - as an experiment take several of these ships to Chester, Pa., refurbish them as hospital ships and sell them to foreign countries. I am sure a tremendous market for this type of a project could be established. I have always maintained the USA is the greatest country in the world, but it is also the most wasteful. It makes me cringe when I see over 350 of these ships simply rusting and deteriorating. This project would certainly be a slight blow to the unemployment situation in this country.

I might also add that some of these ships could be used not as prison ships but as rehabilitation ships for juvenile offenders on dope and alcohol. They would be sentenced to this type of ship to learn a trade. I am enclosing a copy of a letter from the warden at Broadmeadows Prison fully endorsing this project.

PART B

Three years ago I attempted to get the Liberty Bell entered in the Tournament of Roses Parade in California. I was turned down by the Historical Commission for a number of reasons. Probably the chief reason that Mayor William Green brought up was that it might develop further cracks. I have now conferred with the engineers at the Franklin Institute and they claim a cradle can be made which will make it metallurgically sound. Jack Kelly, Vice President of the Olympic Committee, tells me that Arthur Kaufmann, head of the Historical Commission, has turned a deaf ear on my proposal, so I am now going in a different direction.

I have written letters to folks whom I consider real Americans; viz, Bob Hope, Kate Smith, twenty governors and President Reagan. To date I have received enthusiastic letters from eleven governors and John Eisenhower fully endorsing the project. I am enclosing a typical letter from the Governor of Nebraska. I am also enclosing a copy of our proposal on re-selling America. When I complete this part of the project, I will present, in brochure form, all of the endorsements to the Historical Commission.

If Mayor Green still insists on the Bell's safety, the idea occurred to me that this could become a great project for the Navy Department. The possibility exists in my mind that somewhere in this land of ours there is an historical ship which is navigable and mount the Bell on it. We could start in Philadelphia, go down the Delaware River and stop at seaports along the East Coast, visit seaports in the Gulf of Mexico, backtrack to the Panama Canal, and go up the West Coast as far as Alaska. This second plan would certainly procure 100% security.

This alternative plan could become a great recruiting project for the Navy or even the Army and Marine Corps.

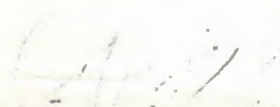
I want to emphasize that all money raised above the expenses would go to the Olympic Committee. Speaking of this phase, I am sure you are aware that all foreign governments allot money for their respective Olympic athletes. We are the only country in the world which provides private funding for this great four year event.

In closing, even though this has been a lengthy letter, I trust you will analyze every paragraph before coming to any decision. I feel it would be great to have the United States Navy help re-sell America.

I shall send copies of this letter to President Reagan and other great Americans in this country.

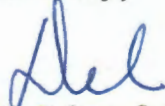

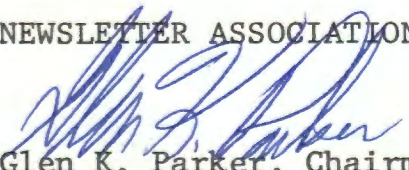

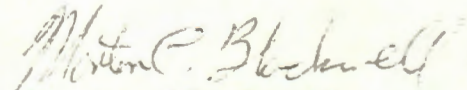

MacNelly
I devote time to comic

Pulitzer-winning cartoonist giving up craft

For the time being, at least, Jeff MacNelly is out of the newspaper business.

But that doesn't mean he'll be out of the newspaper.

Although MacNelly ended his 11-year tenure with the Richmond News-Leader Monday, it was hardly a retirement. Rather, the two-time Pulitzer prize winner is giving up his first love — drawing editorial cartoons — to devote more creative energy to his comic strip "Shoe", now syndicated in 650 daily newspapers.

It might have been more appropriate had MacNelly bowed out with a cartoon, but he settled for a statement.

"I am devoting more time to the birdbrains in my comic strip 'Shoe'", he said. "I would like to devote less time to the birdbrains on the national and international stages, thereby making room for new projects and new ideas."

The marriage between MacNelly, only 34, and

the News-Leader produced Pulitzers in 1971 and 1977, two Reuben Awards (given to the nation's best cartoonists), the first Thomas Nast Award and a formidable network of syndication (450 daily newspapers, including The News.)

But when "Shoe" eclipsed MacNelly's editorial cartoons in volume of syndication, the University of North Carolina graduate obviously felt it necessary to make a choice.

"The change is a little frightening," he said. "But with the move will come freedom from daily deadlines. And freedom, after all, is what makes life interesting."

Contacted at the News-Leader Monday, editorial page editor Ross Mackenzie conceded that MacNelly's decision was no surprise.

"I've known about it for some time," said Mackenzie, the man who hired MacNelly in 1970 and calls him "probably the most widely-read political cartoonist in America today."

The separation was apparently amicable.

"I think the key phrase here is 'stopping syndi-

cation'", said Mackenzie. "That means he's not only not doing cartoons for us, he's not doing them for anybody else."

In his statement, however, MacNelly said: "I'm not giving up political cartooning entirely. I'll continue to draw, but in different formats and forums as the occasions arise."

The Chicago Tribune-New York News Syndicate, which distributed MacNelly's cartoons, said it will offer the work of Columbus Dispatch cartoonist Jack Ohman to clients who carried MacNelly.

During a visit with his sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Daniels, in Lynchburg last May, MacNelly described himself as "a small 'm' mugwump with Whiggish tendencies."

Translated, that means somewhat on the conservative side. But MacNelly is no political zealot.

"The best way to make your point is through humor," he said. "Not gloom and doom."

MacNelly's final daily cartoon for the News-Leader ran Monday, showing an elderly couple in a buggy hauling a large trunk labeled "Retirement".
