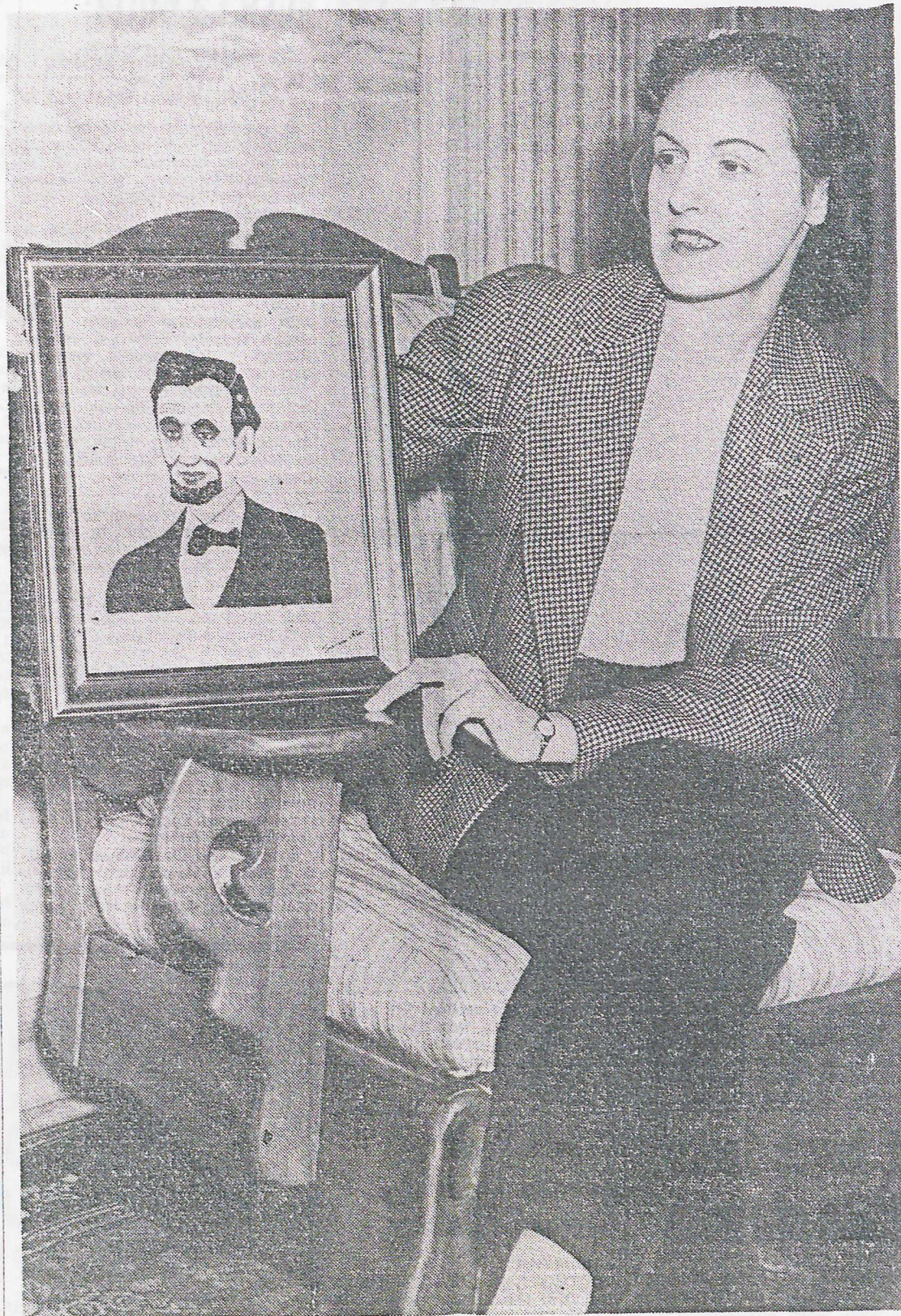

Davis Opens New Flank Pay at Anse La Butte

Townley and McRae Close Well Deal

A production is due to be made within a few days on a wildcat oil test on the southeast flank of the Anse la Butte dome in St. Martin Parish that has indicated prolific oil production.

The test will be made by W. R. Davis and Company on the No. 1 Alexis Voorhies.

BOUGHT BY DAVIS

Davis recently bought the well and surrounding acreage from Ralph Rownley and C. C. McRae, Houston independent operators, after oil sands were cored.

Consideration of the trade was not revealed. Townley and McRae assembled approximately 600 acres for the well. They drilled the test to 8110 feet and then sold out to Davis.

THICK OIL SANDS

There have been conflicting reports about the amount of oil sand in the well, but estimates range as high as 400 feet of sand and sandy shale bearing oil.

Bottom of the hole is 8966 feet and the sands were cored between 7507 feet and 7950 feet.

The well is one mile from production, and is opening a new flank producing area. Stanolind Oil and Gas Company and Glassel and Glassel are other field operators.

GASOLINE QUIET

TULSA, Jan. 17.—Refinery gasoline was quiet in the Midcontinent area today. No further price cuts were expected immediately. Natural gasoline was strong.

Chinese Decorations Believed Duplicated

The secret of a stitch which two Chinese brothers used to decorate an emperor's robes three centuries ago may have been found by an attractive Houston girl.

She's Miss Frances Aber, 1724 Ruth avenue, the daughter of James S. Aber, an oil man. Miss Aber, who dabbles in art as a hobby, developed the stitch while embroidering portraits of national figures.

The Aber home is well-stocked with oil paintings, ivory and wood carvings, and other art objects, as a result of Mr. and Mrs. Aber's interest, but their daughter's amazing embroidery sketches attract most attention from visitors.

She recently completed a portrait of President Roosevelt, against the opposition of many of her father's friends, incidentally, to add to other studies of Abraham Lincoln, Sam Houston and a box of strawberries.

HIGHLY IMPRESSED

Dr. Albert Sultzbremer, noted portrait artist, saw Miss Aber's work on a visit here several years ago and was highly impressed, although he told her it would have little "cash" value in America.

"He asked me if I had ever visited the British Museum in London and seemed surprised when I said I hadn't," Miss Aber said. "Then he claimed that the stitch I used in my portraits was essentially the same as that in the Mandarin coats in the museum."

These coats, done in silver and gold threads, it seems, are the only ones in existence and no modern has been able to duplicate the strange stitching employed.

PORTRAITS ON LINEN

Miss Aber does her portraits on linen, after sketching an outline of the figure to be produced, and works in features and expression with ordinary embroidery and needles. It took her three years to finish the Roosevelt portrait, using 40 skeins of thread. She had to dye threads to obtain a flesh-like color.

Miss Aber says her work is not similar to tapestries because she has been able to capture personality in her faces. She said Dr. Sultzbremer called it "painting with a needle." She's never had any art instruction, but absorbs a love for such work from her mother, an interior decorator.

She doesn't knot threads on her portraits. A lot of embroidery workers in Houston would like to find out the secret but Miss Aber thinks she'll keep it to herself a while longer.

FOUND BY ACCIDENT

"I was surprised when Dr. Sultzbremer told me about those Chinese coats," she said. "I just stumbled on the stitch by accident. Many people think the stitch I use is curved, but it isn't. It's just straight."

That's all the details she'll reveal.

Right now, Miss Aber is undecided about her work. She doesn't know whether to continue or not. Sultzbremer told her to paint because she could never gain recognition in America, for embroidery portraits. Europe, he told her, would like it immensely but Miss Aber doesn't see much chance of a peaceful American girl following an art career over there for a long time to come. In the meantime, she's dividing her time between the embroidery and painting.

"I don't care anything about making money out of it," she says.


MEMORANDUM FOR MISS LeHAND

With reference to your memorandum of March 7, 1941 enclosing a letter from Mr. Robert Moers of New York City transmitting a miniature portrait of the President and also an enlarged photograph thereof which Mr. Ryszard Abramowicz, a Polish citizen, desires to present to the President, I believe that it would be inadvisable for the President to accept this gift regardless of the motives which may have prompted the offer.

It appears from Mr. Moers' letter that Mr. Abramowicz is a refugee from Poland and is in the United States temporarily. It further appears that although on leaving Poland he left most of his personal belongings behind, he managed to carry this valuable gift which he now desires to present to the President. In view of Mr. Abramowicz' status, it is believed that the President should not be under any obligation to him or to be placed in a position which at some time might prove embarrassing.

Accordingly, it is believed that the gift should be returned and that the donor should be informed that although his gracious gesture is greatly appreciated it is regretted that it is contrary to the practice of the President to accept gifts of intrinsic value from persons with whom he is not personally acquainted.

If you concur, and if you so desire, I shall be glad to communicate with Mr. Moers in this sense and to return the gift to him.

The following request is so unusual that it demands explanation, which will you kindly note:

Just before the Democratic convention last fall I sent President Roosevelt a composit of the flags of the western hemisphere. Later, after his inaugural address, I sent him a composit of the flags of sixty-three nations.

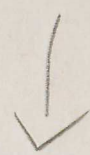

If they do, I ask a personal favor that you look into the booklet sufficient to make sure that its contents are of no help or interest to you; or, on the other hand, that what it contains will aid you in your great desire and efforts to accomplish what you wish to accomplish, namely; to do the most good to the greatest number of American Citizens.

If you find the booklet of help in formulating a plan that will accomplish what you wish and what I feel certain my plan will accomplish, if given a chance, I shall be happy. Should you feel that my plan, or any part of it is what you want, use it as your own. I do not ask for, nor do I seek credit.

I feel sure you will agree with me that if some technique of government can be adopted that will care for the employables when they are temporarily out of employment, and will care for the unemployables all the time; there will be little poverty, suffering, anxiety and fear among our citizens, at least that that might be due to uncertainty as to where the next meal is coming from.

Such a condition would make for a happy and contented nation, one ready and anxious to fight for its freedom and preservation if, and when, invaded.

Our freedom and democracy is in danger of collapse from within, as well as from invasion from without; therefore, it is imperative that we mobilize against the danger from both sources. Please read the quotation in my booklet from our late and beloved Senator Borah.

The proposed plan is "a pay as you go proposition". It is in harmony with our American way of doing business. It would put idle money to work as well as idle men.

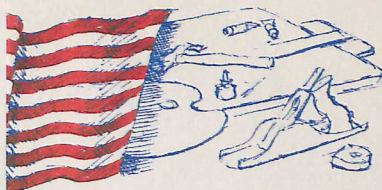

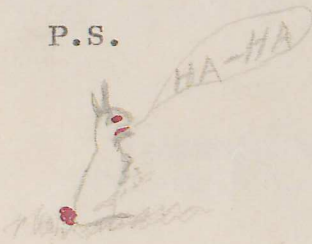

My Dear Mrs. Roosevelt:

May I take the privilege to enlist your services as a messenger to smuggle enclosed little volume, (abelated birthday gift) into the private library of his Excellency, the President.
