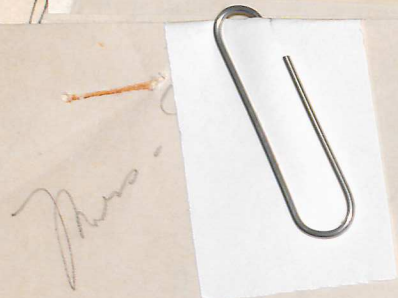

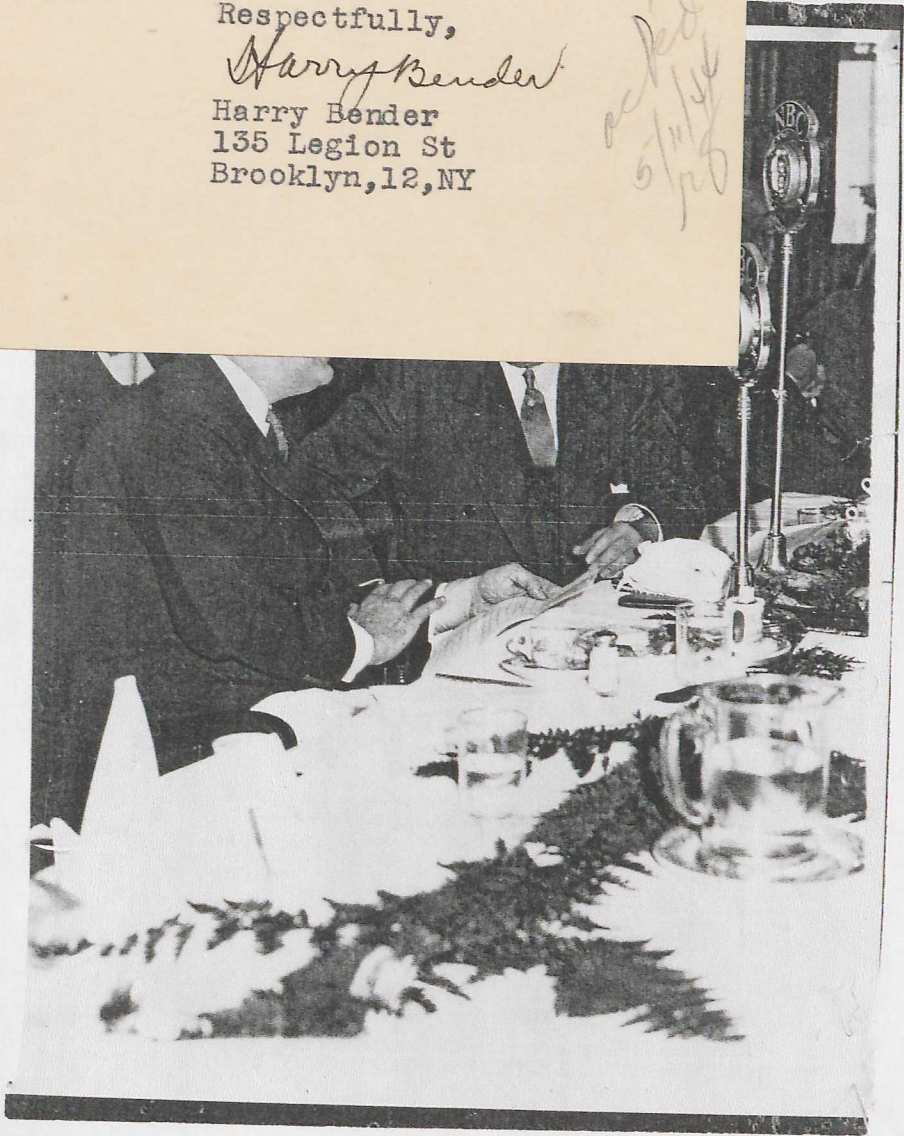

William D. Simmons on 5/16/44 sent a Memorandum to Miss Thompson stating the attached Yearbook, issued by the Rabbi Jacob Joseph School and Mesifta, was left this morning by Mr. Martin North. Gen. Watson instructed Mr. Simmons to see Mr. North and receive from him the Yearbook for the President and, at the same time, he left one for Mrs. Roosevelt also - Mr. Simmons accepted it on her behalf. Mr. Simmons on 5/16/44 also sent a Memo to Gen. Watson informing him that he accepted the Yearbook as instructed; it was left by Mr. Martin North.
