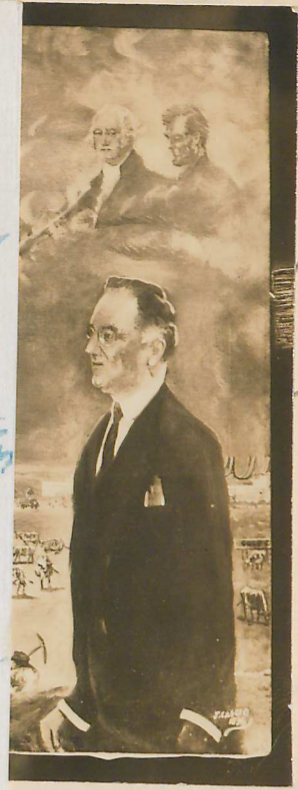

**Atlantan Makes Jeweled Sword
Of Historic Relic for President**

**Charles P. Cimerro Reworks
Watch Fob Owned by
Jackson.**

President Roosevelt is scheduled to receive from an Atlantan soon a gift steeped in historic lore and wrought in fine craftsmanship. The gift is a small, solid gold sword, made from a watch fob owned and worn by President Andrew Jackson.

Charles P. Cimerro, Atlanta goldsmith, bought the historic relic in New Orleans and fashioned the beautiful jeweled piece for the President because of his love and admiration for the "great democratic leader."

The goldsmith, who was born in Paris, was inclined to talk more Saturday of his President than of his workmanship which went into the making of the valuable gift.

Talks of President.

"No one can help but admire the fine principles and the character of President Roosevelt," he declared. "His humanitarian spirit makes him one of the really great people of the world and his determined manner of taking on his shoulders the burdens of the country is a thing of which the nation should be proud."

"When the direct influence of a President is felt by practically everyone in his country, just as I have felt it, you may know we have a great man at the head of the government. Characters like that of President Roosevelt are the ones which make other nations look up to this country."

Token of Appreciation.

"With the celebrations all over the country of Jackson Day dinners, I thought it would be fitting to take the past president's gold watch fob and rework it into a token of appreciation for our present leader."

Mr. Cimerro bought the Jackson fob from Paul Perrett, in New Orleans, who had obtained the historic piece in Savannah. Hand-made and hand-finished, the sword has an engraved scroll-work guard over the white enameled hilt, with two pearls, taken from a brooch which belonged

to Mr. Cimerro's mother, set in the ends of the hilt.

"Sempre Avante."

The blade of the sword carries the motto, "Sempre Avante," always forward, and bears the inscription: "To the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt from Charles P. Cimerro, Atlanta, Georgia."

Mr. Cimerro had planned to present the sword to the President on his last visit to Atlanta, but said he knew the President would be busy with other affairs and did not do it. He had planned a trip to Washington for the purpose but decided against it. Now he says he thinks he will just mail it to President Roosevelt and hopes he will like it.

My dear Mr. President:

It is my privilege to send you a copy of my book, The Explosive Theory of the Universe. It is a topic in which I think you may be interested, and the work is the result of a long investigation I have made on the subject.

While I know that you are always busily engaged, there probably are odd moments when you may wish to turn from the stress of other activities and in which you may find time to read through its pages. The book is for occasional reading and is written for those moments when one wishes to take perspective of the universe in which he plays his part.

Without getting into the abstruse involutions of mathematical formulae, you may be interested in the accounting for the absorption of motion, the principle of the persistence of energy. Then, too, the accounting for the maintenance of stellar temperatures by a resupply of energy directly from the basic atom field is a new theory. Again, that pure light travels in a straight line through a pure basic atom field is reciprocal, and not antagonistic, with the theory of light's curvature, since the character of all light that comes to us is necessarily modified.

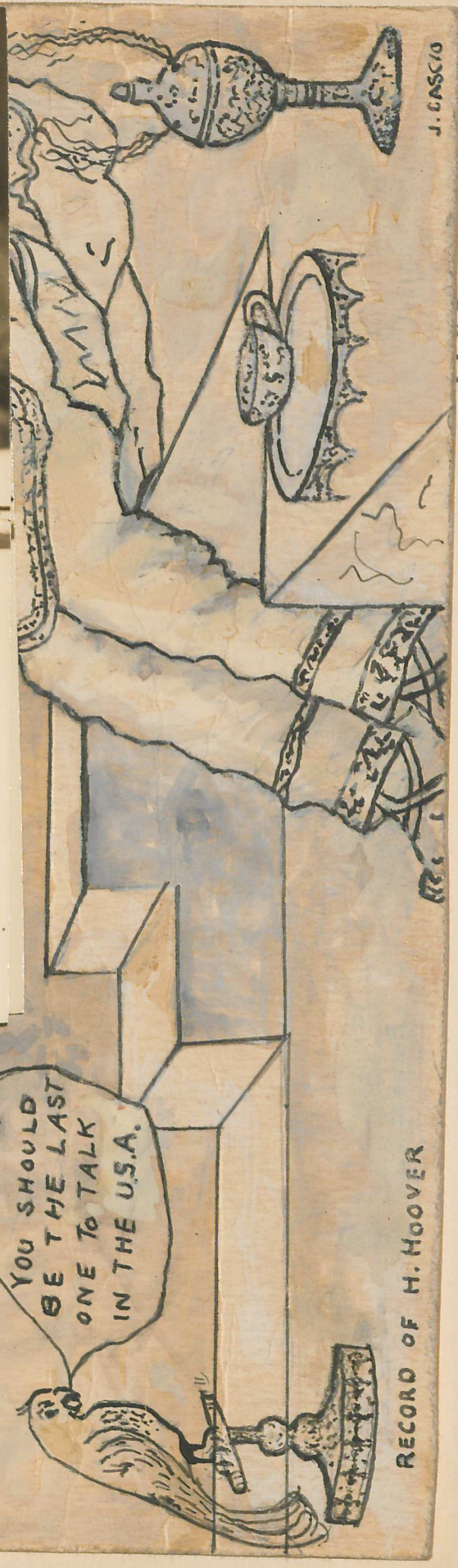

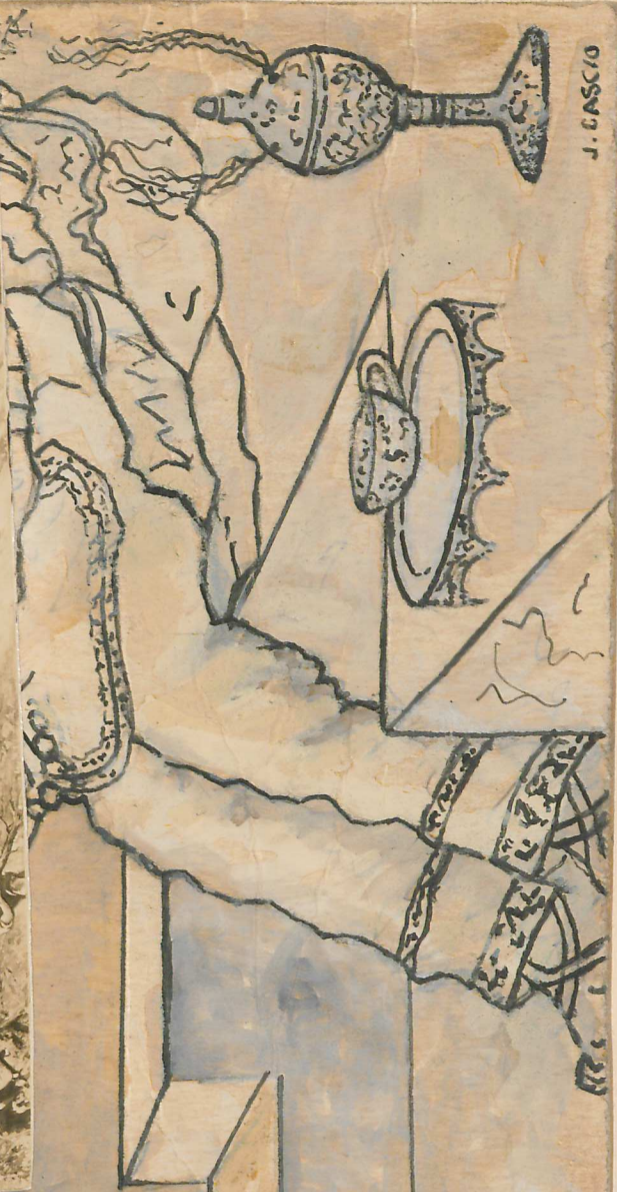



States that at the last meeting the distributor of the Cleveland and Cincinnati Commemorative Half Dollars was present, and an arrangement was made whereby both coins would be sent to the President with the compliments of the distributor.
