All aliens over 21 years of age, now residing in the United States of America who are employed by American individuals, firms and corporations shall within ninety days from the day such becomes a law make application for citizenship papers and become an American citizen. Failing to qualify for citizenship, rights and privilege. Said alien shall be given his or her choice of returning to his or her native land or entering a school to qualify alien for citizenship papers to become an American citizen.

It shall be unlawful for any individual firm or corporation to keep in his employ any alien who does not have or does not apply for citizenship papers within ninety days from time this law becomes effective!

Penalty of \$5000⁰⁰ and imprisonment of two years for each violation of this law.


