I am sending with this letter the special presentation copy, designed for the President, of "Patents at Work", a statement of the policies which will govern the administration of some 50,000 patents and patent applications vested in the Alien Property Custodian. I send this directly to you because of your long and close association with the President's papers and his library at Hyde Park.

The patent policy described in this booklet presents a sharp contrast to that adopted by the various Alien Property Custodians of the last war. Its real significance will probably not be fully understood or appreciated until after this war is over. To a large extent the patent policy of this office is the President's own program, and for this reason I thought it desirable to place this statement in the President's library where it might be preserved for future generations. I should greatly appreciate it if you personally would see that the President's own copy of "Patents at Work" is safely lodged in the Franklin D. Roosevelt Library at Hyde Park.

My Dear Mr. Roosevelt.

I am giving you an outline of my life, as I may run for the Senate against Senator Tobey, I was going to run before, but as I was seriously hurt in the Annex of our State House was in bed for 6 months and could not run. I have now recovered my health, so I am strong again and expect to be at the State House as Representative of the Farm Bureaus and Granges State and National in my humanitarian work. These Orders are composed of a s and r, and one has to be quite diplomatic in keeping things straight. I being educated, carefully trained in the law, which is valuable in the fight, as a humanitarian Christian and the law, our City Marshall for many years, said I was more valuable in the State House than a lot of politicians. 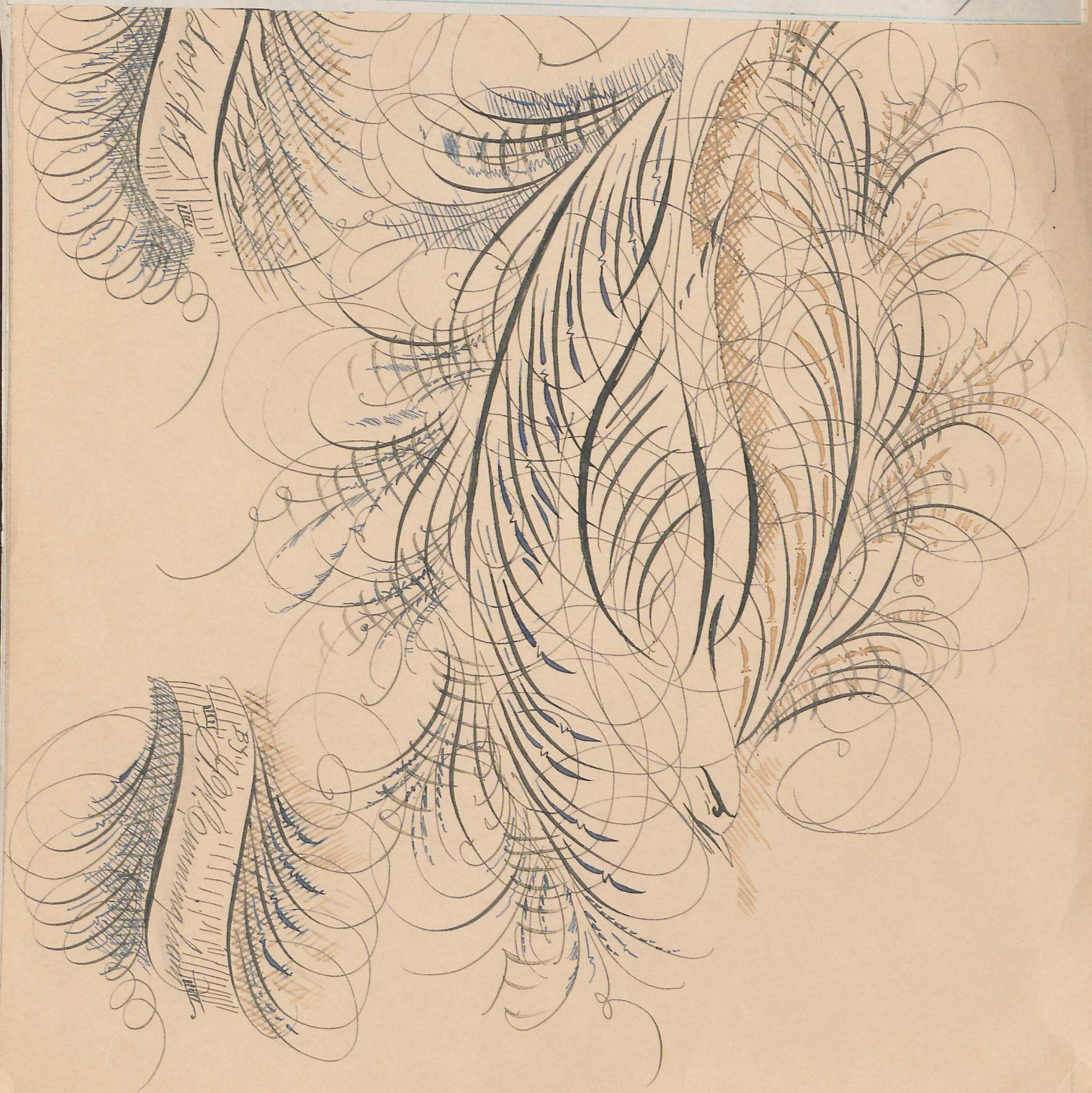

with members and citizens. I gave them some  
information that was new to them. Building jails  
as an Architect, prisons and insane asylums  
I have a long experience. The Police call me a  
Criminologist. Now for an outline of my life. James Far-  
ley said once, he was a graduate of the College of Hard  
Knocks. I was too. Starting from absolutely nothing, and being  
ambitious, I made the fight up. After the High School, I went  
to Bryant Straton & Punnett College, where I learnt to write.  
Then I went with Charles Mellin, Cashier of two railroads,  
who further trained me in railroad affairs. He afterwards be-  
came a famous man in our land, in railroad affairs. I thought  
I could make far more money in Teaching the Spencerian System  
of writing, so I taught in my schools, Seminaries and Colleges  
(preparatory) in three States and three years in Canada, where it  
was awful cold. 14500 pupils I had. After that, in addition, other  
studies. Languages for the foreign born, last 500 boys in Mechanics  
of the iron and wood Trades, and mechanical drawing. Some of them  
are now in our Army service. After a time I got tired of

3) of traveling, and as I was the only child, my father was away at his work. I was needed at home to look out for my mother. In those early times it was thought that every one, should have a trade in case of any emergency. So I went to learn the Machinist Trade, where one learns the whole Trade from the rough to the finish and the tests. They kept me 11 months swinging a heavy sledge hammer, striking for the Blacksmith. I thought that wasn't fair for me, so I kicked, they didn't have any unions here at that time. One had to attend to his own strikes. I said I would leave. I worked hard, they don't like to have their slaves go. So they promise the change. When they delayed I would write out my notice to leave. 24 such times, before I got the Trade. I built machinery that went all over the world, the last a great machine, nickel plated that went to Shanghai China for the great fair. After that I went to the Waltham Watch Company. One couldn't get in unless he was a first class Machinist, and learned the automatic Trade complete and became the head foreman, with 232 men and women. The watch work is so fine it has to be done with magnifying glasses and slower than other work. There came a business slump that might last for years. Then I learnt the building Trade and afterwards Architecture. I wanted after a time to get a practical experience in the theory and practice of steel construction so I went with a Company in Cambridge Mass. that did that kind of work, after I got what I wanted, I went back to the Architect work as an Architectural Engineer. While in Massachusetts

I worked on plans and buildings. I had a great deal to do in building Hopedale Mass. under the Drapers Eben was Governor of the State. I suppose the men of my time, must have passed away. After that I got malaria off the Charles River. where all the towns emptied all of their sewage back of Cambridge Mass was 8 ft of sludge and malaria was where the Charles River ran. hundreds got malaria. I was sick quite a time with it so I left for New Hampshire, where malaria was unknown unless brought there. My family come from Newton Upper Falls near Boston. So I moved into the country, leased after bought 165, did Architect work in my City and state, <sup>and farmed</sup> For our State for Penal and humanity institutions and blocks and large buildings and houses all over our state. Now here the building buildings in flat land. So I am at the State House for humanitarian work, which is not political at all. I have the backing of the Governor and leading citizens and the people. I am sending you a flourish. As far as I know this is a lost art. In this art. throughout I am over Boston's best. I was thinking after this war, you ought to stay until things get settled. I have much use for the run of politicians as well as they are. As a statement of great quality with your experience you are clear about them. All of course your health must be considered. I have seen far more of life than most men is not all. I am still a close friend of Mr. Corran acting U.S. Marshall.

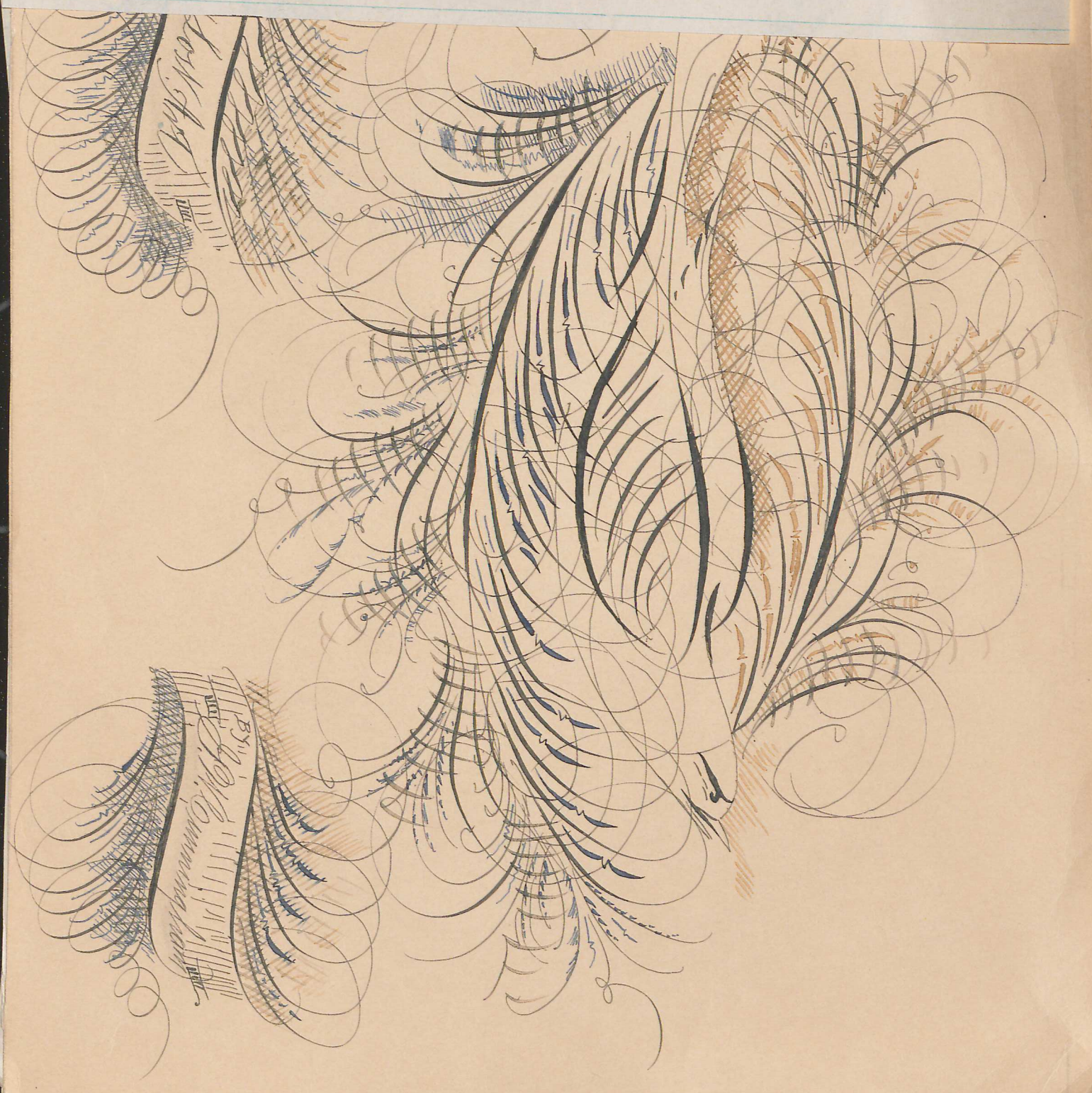

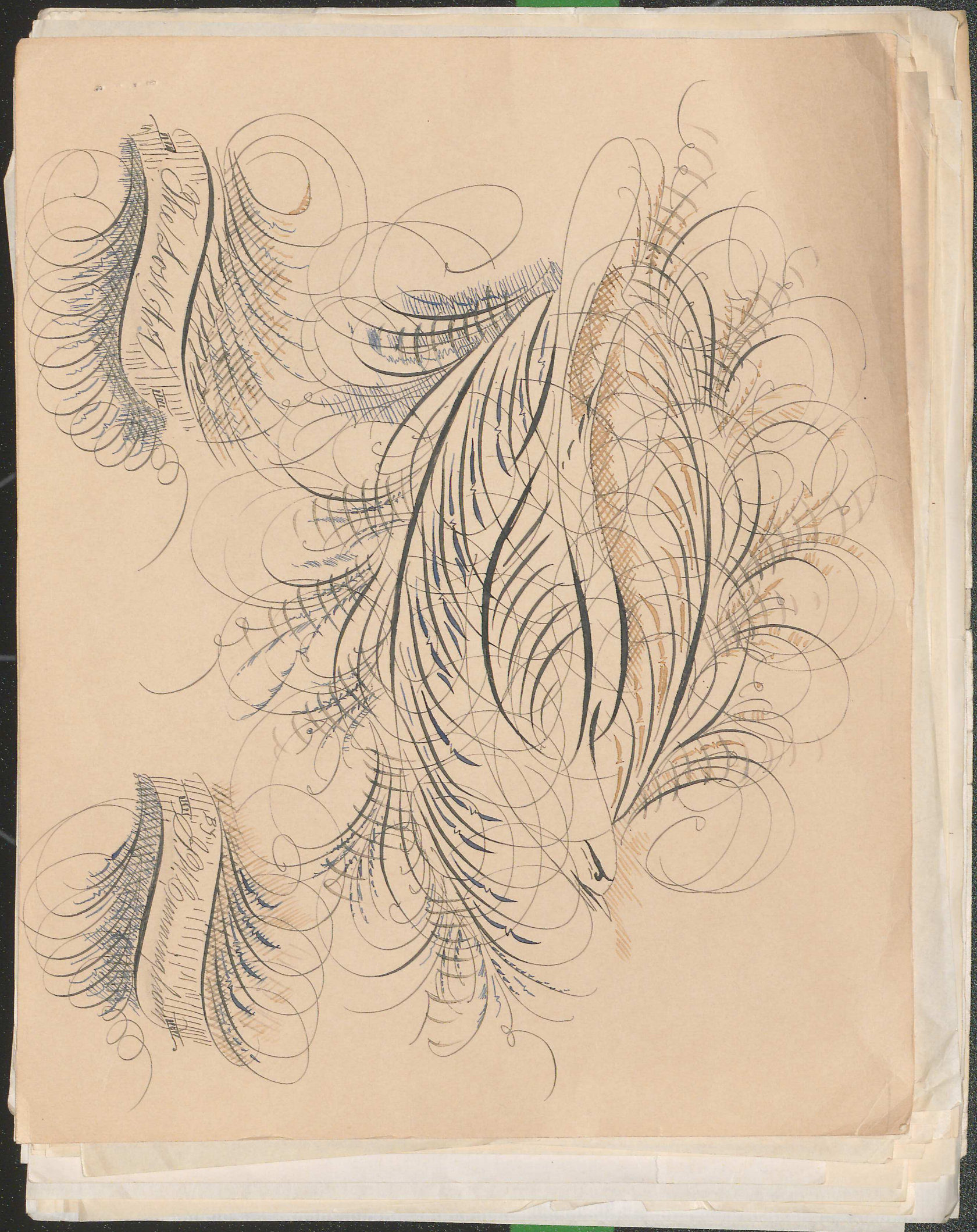

This hospitable southern city's annual community Christmas Tree celebration is attracting national attention both by reason of the effectiveness and attractiveness of the programs as arranged by the municipal authorities, and because of the fact that the tree used, in all probability, cannot be duplicated by any other place in the United States. The tree is a splendid live oak, festooned, as the photograph indicates, with graceful Spanish Gray Moss found in profusion in the Wilmington area. This natural and beautiful dressing for the tree attracts the attention of thousands of visitors throughout the year who come as winter and summer tourists.

This magnificent tree, estimated to be three hundred years old, is located in Hilton Park, an exceptionally beautiful spot in the northern section of the city. The spread of the branches is over 110 feet, the circumference of the trunk is fifteen feet, and this towering monarch of the forest rises to a height of 75 feet. More than 1,000 multi-colored lights and in excess of a thousand ornaments are used to decorate the tree.

The program, participated in by thousands, is inaugurated on Christmas Eve's with a solemn song and prayer service. The tree is surmounted by the "Star of the East" brilliantly lighted. Just to the left of the platform is placed the manger, containing a Babe, illustrative of the birth of the Christ-child. A fireplace, hanging stockings filled with good things for the kiddies, and a real Santa Clause are provided.

Christmas music, apparently issuing from the fire place and branches of the tree, by invisible loud speakers, lend enchantment to the scene.

The illumination of the tree continues through the Christmas season including New Year's night. In carrying out this effective celebration annually, the authorities of the City of Wilmington are given substantial aid by a public-spirited citizen and The Tide Water Power Company.

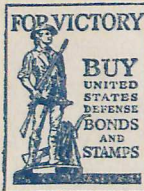

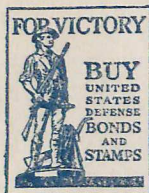

Miss LeHand's letter 2-3-41 says the President feels he ought not to accept the cane and it is being returned with the suggestion that he try to sell it. A letter from Mr. Kitchener 2-17-41 advises that cane has not been received by him. He was advised on 2-28-41 that cane has been sent to Hyde Park to be placed in the President's museum there. Other enclosures attached.

Miss Tully wrote to Mr. Fred W. Shipman on 1-11-43, saying that about the time Miss LeHand's letter of Feb. 3, 1941 was written to Mr. Benjamin Kitchener, the cane referred to was inadvertently sent on to be placed in the President's collection. Says it may be possible to identify it from the sketch Mr. Kitchener has drawn. Asks if it can be located, and if so, to return it to this office, as the donor asks that it be returned to him.

On 1-14-43 Mr. Edgar B. Nixon, Acting Director of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Library, wrote to Miss Tully in reply to her letter to Mr. Shipman, saying they have a number of canes there which resemble Mr. Kitchener's drawing, but cannot identify his particular one without further information. Says he can write to the gentleman, and if cane can be identified, will send it directly to him.




