#### Runnerup Brings \$2; Shown for Iraan Sailor

"Surprise" grand champion steer of the 1944 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, a 900-pound Hereford exhibited by Mrs. Merlyn Gail Kothmann, 414 Club Hill in Mason, was bid in at auction Friday, March 17, at \$2.50 per pound.

The runner-up champion, "Miss Chief," 890-pound Hereford entered for George Lee of Iraan, now in the Navy, sold to the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce at \$2 a pound.

Dr. Charles H. Harris, Fort Worth, winner of honors with his Hereford breeding stock in the show, opened the bidding at \$1 a pound for "Surprise" and "Miss Chief," manager of North Food Markets and Chamber of Commerce president, as well as J. H. Hall, manager of the Swift & Co. plant here, were among other bidders.

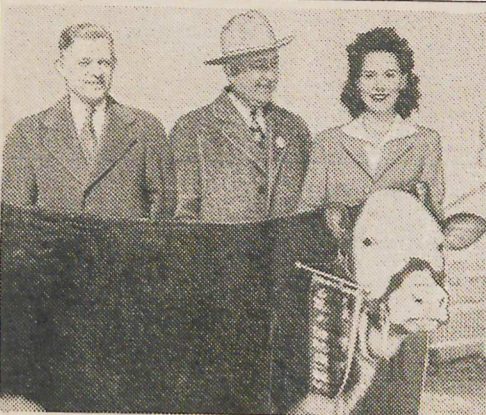
Appeals to Buys. John C. Burnt, president of the Exposition, opened the auction with an appeal to buyers to "show the West Texas spirit" because he said, "the production of red meat builds better soldiers and the price you pay today will encourage these youngsters to breed and feed better cattle."

Carter added to this appeal the challenge to "show West Texas people that this Fort Worth show appreciates cattle as well as the cow in Houston and Chicago." His expressed appreciation for the war-time sacrifices made by cattlemen in feeding the exhibit animals and getting them to the show under difficulties, and for the exhibition officials who overcome handicaps to move the show from its traditional North Side site to the new site at Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum.

#### MacArthur Renews His Pledge to Retake Isles

CANBERRA, Australia, March 17 (AP)—I shall return to the Philippines, General MacArthur said Friday, repeating the pledge he made when he landed in Australia two years ago from embattled Corregidor.

#### Nazis Driven From All but One Corner of Cassino

BY RICHARD G. MASSOCK. ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NAPLES, March 17 (AP)—Fifth Army forces have fought their way through bomb-demolished Cassino to its southwestern outskirts and have captured several prominent heights overlooking the ruined town. Allied headquarters announced Friday.

New Zealand troops who plunged into the rubble immediately after Wednesday's 2,500-ton aerial bombing encountered strong German resistance but finally drove them from all except one corner of the town.

From that point strategic Route 6, Via Cassina, leads into the Liri Valley and to Rome.

The Germans still were occupying the ruins of ancient Monte Cassino, and from there were directing artillery and mortar fire on Allied positions in the valley.

Artillery poured streams of shells Thursday into the Nazi-occupied abbey in support of the ground troops climbing slowly up the steep, rocky slopes. Allied smoke shells spread a heavy pall around the hilltop, hiding activities in the valley from German observation.

Simultaneously with announcement of the second consecutive night raid on Sofia, capital of Bulgaria, it was announced officially that the RAF has sent formations of four-motored Halifax into the Mediterranean theater. Medium and Halifax Blaites Sofia railway targets Thursday night with thousands of incendiary and high explosive bombs.

The heaviest air attack in Italy Wednesday's assault on Cassino, Piedmont, three miles west of Cassino, where Marauders and Mitchell hit three layers around Pontecorvo, also back of Cassino, and Esperia near the Adriatic beachhead.

LONDON, March 17 (AP)—A Air Force announcement said that a strong force of U. S. Heavies and Liberators bombed the Vienna area Friday, flying across the Alps from bases in Italy and administering to German-held territory its third heavy bombardment in 24 hours.

The operation against the old Austrian capital, with the aid of transport in France, bombing the Michelin tire factory at Clermont-Ferrand, 30 miles southwest of Vichy, and the rail yards at Amiens, both master cogs in Hitler's anti-invasion machinery.

Not a plane was lost in this second successive night operation of the RAF's heavy bombers which hit a peak stride Wednesday night when more than 1,000 of the four-engine bombers pounded Stuttgart and other targets with over 3,360 tons of bombs.

The German, one report said, are retreating hurriedly across the Dniester at Mogilev and Podolki into Rumanian territory with the Soviet close at their heels.

The Russians battered their way to Rumania after splitting German lines in the Southern Ukraine and eliminating the Kherson pocket where several Nazi divisions had been trapped.

Artillery Fire Is Heavy. Heavy artillery supported massive tank and infantry columns who sliced in the Odessa-Lwow railroad at a point only 25 miles from Rumania.

Severance of the double-tracked escape artery, which already was cut last week inside old Poland far to the northwest, was achieved after a 15-mile surge by Marshal Konev's 2nd Ukrainian Army. Premier Stalin proclaimed the victory in a special order-of-the-day.

Stalin described how the Red Army seized "the large rail junction and town of Vapnyarka Wednesday, thus cutting the important Zhmerinka-Odessa main rail line."

By slashing the trunkline, the Soviets divided Nazi armies in South Russia into two separate groups. The southernmost, estimated at hundreds of thousands of troops, had only two secondary, single-tracked railroads left for retreat into Rumania.

Naval Leave Supplies. These southern forces were reported "hurriedly" retreating, leaving large quantities of vital war materials. Soviet men liberated more than 30 additional villages.

Field Marshal von Manstein lost heavily on the Nikolayev sector, particularly in the Bereznegovata-Sugirevka area, where remnants of several trapped enemy divisions were "completely liquidated."

Nikolayev, German-held naval base at the mouth of the Bug River, was reported to be abandoned and southwest.

Novaya Odessa Taken. General Malinovsky's 3rd Ukrainian Army, in a drive that overran more than 41 inhabited places, occupied Novaya Odessa, on the east bank of the Lower Bug at a point 22 miles northwest of Nikolayev.

Further south, other columns of Malinovsky's army reached the river's mouth west of Alexandrovka, their guns dominating all waterborne traffic passing from Nikolayev into the Black Sea. (TURN TO PAGE 8, COLUMN 2)

#### Mrs. Howard Files Claim Against Simmons Estate

TULSA, March 17 (Sp)—Mrs. Ella B. Howard, Fort Worth, has filed claim against the estate of the late T. Karl Simmons, Tulsa oil man, for \$19,580 to pay the expense of a trial in which she was acquitted of a manslaughter charge in the slaying of Simmons' wife in the Mayo Hotel here.

Mrs. Howard alleged in her claim that Simmons had promised to pay all of her trial costs if she would marry him.

Simmons previously had given her \$20,000 "because I wanted to." The claim was filed March 7 with George Sheehan, office manager of the T. K. Simmons Oil Company and executor of the estate, only five days before any claims against the estate would have become invalid. A notice to creditors published in Tulsa set March 12 as deadline for filing of claims.

The Fort Worth woman made her claim based upon what she termed an "oral agreement" with Simmons five days after her acquittal by a Tulsa district court jury last June 9.

The claim was handed to Sheehan through Marvin Simpson, Fort Worth, one of three attorneys who defended Mrs. Howard.

"I know absolutely nothing about any oral agreement between Mrs. Howard and Mr. Simmons," Sheehan said.

#### Lt. Marvin E. Grice Missing in Air Action Over Austria

Second Lt. Marvin Edward Grice, 22, one of three flying sons of Dr. and Mrs. T. W. Grice 1332 E. Richmond, has been missing in action over Austria since Feb. 23, the War Department has informed his parents.

Lieutenant Grice, who attended the University of Texas after graduation from Wichita Falls High School, was pilot of a B-24 bomber. His last letter was written Feb. 15.

He received his aviation cadet training in the Summer of 1942 at Nashville.

One of his brothers, Second Lt. Charles Richmond Grice, is a prisoner of Germany. He is a graduate of Paschal High School and the University of Texas and was commissioned at Mather Field, flying four-motored bombers at Fort Col., going overseas in November, North Army Air Field.

#### Paratroops in Burma Land Behind Jap Lines

NEW DELHI, March 7 (AP)—Airborne Allied troops have made successful landing behind the Japanese lines in Northern Burma, where American and Chinese forces have been driving the Lord Mountbatten's headquarters announced Friday.

It was the first reported use of airborne troops in the current campaign, which is being fought through dense jungle and over rugged terrain where communication facilities are at a minimum.

Wreck Kills 800 Nazis. NAPLES, March 17 (AP)—Papers found on a German prisoner have disclosed that a train wreck 100 miles north of Rome recently caused 800 German casualties. Allied headquarters said Friday.

The wreck was believed the work of Italian saboteurs.

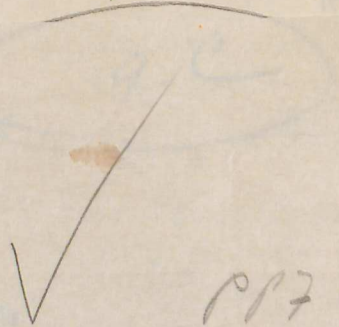





Condict wherein he further states that Mr. McCoy's sister and brother-in-law would like to accompany them to Hyde Park to present the gifts to the President and Mrs. Roosevelt. - Miss Tully on Aug. 24, 1944 replied stating that the President is most appreciative of his offer to present him with the two copies of the book containing the inscription "Edward Delano, from his affectionate brother Frank, 1834," and he would be delighted to have the other items "Blueprints for Freedom" which Mr. McCoy has offered him. Further states that the President wishes it were possible to arrange to have Mr. Condict present them personally but because of the accumulated work in his absence from Washington it is not possible to make any appointments except those that are strictly official. Miss Tully states that in view of this, that perhaps Mr. Condict would be willing to forward the items to the President.
