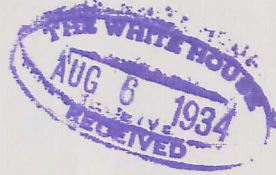





I've been here thirty nine years, and I use to send my father a picture of every President, since President McKinley until now President Roosevelt.

In May 1933 I sent to my father President Roosevelt's picture. It's only 4x6 inches. Then I received a letter from my father in June 1933. He wrote me back, and he says that he'd like to make a nice, big, picture. He ordered this picture in Damascus, it is about thirty miles away from the town. He wrote me back, and he said the picture costed him fifty five dollars. Then I sent him the money, and he received the money about July 1, 1933.

Then days after he paid for the picture - my father died in July 19, 1933. Before he died he told my cousin to look out for

the picture, for when it was ready, to send it to me, in America.

I received a letter from my cousin. He asked me for forty-five dollars, more, for the picture, because the people there chided him for the money. And I sent the money, because my father started to have the picture made, and I wanted to have it finished, because I liked to do what my father wanted.

Then in June 1934, they sent the picture. When it came to the Custom House in Providence, R.I., they sent me a notice, and I was glad to get the picture. Then I paid a duty charge, and expense of twenty-seven dollars and eighty-four cents, and I was glad to pay. Even if it would cost one hundred dollars, I'd pay, because I wanted to satisfy what my father had started.

I delivered it to the White House with safety. After I left the White House I went to the middle west for five weeks. I came back home September 18. When I saw the picture back home, it broke my heart.

Then I thought about my father, who is 85 years old, and I was awfully sorry for him, because he was the one who started to make the picture.

This is the whole story, and I wish you good help and long life.




