This country, side by side with all the other countries fighting the worst enemy mankind has ever encountered, Nazism and Fascism, will finally triumph; justice and equality of opportunity for all, for the common man, will prevail.

## Los Angeles Sculptor Creates Bust of Heroic MacArthur

Clay Model by Alessandro Gabellieri Will Be Cast in Bronze and Presented to President

Admiration for Gen. Douglas MacArthur's unflinching stand in the Philippines has inspired a Los Angeles sculptor to create a bust of the American commander.

Nearing completion in the studio of Alessandro Gabellieri, 8260 Santa Monica Blvd., the clay model will be cast in bronze and presented to President Roosevelt.

Gabellieri, who learned his art in Florence, Italy, is using a full-page photograph published Feb.

8 in the Sunday Times rotogravure section to guide him in his study of the general.

"I think Gen. MacArthur is doing a heroic job over there," the sculptor said yesterday. "This work is to show my appreciation."

The bust, slightly larger than life size, will weigh 300 pounds in bronze and will be placed on a four-inch marble base. Gabellieri started modeling it a month ago and will be finished in another week.

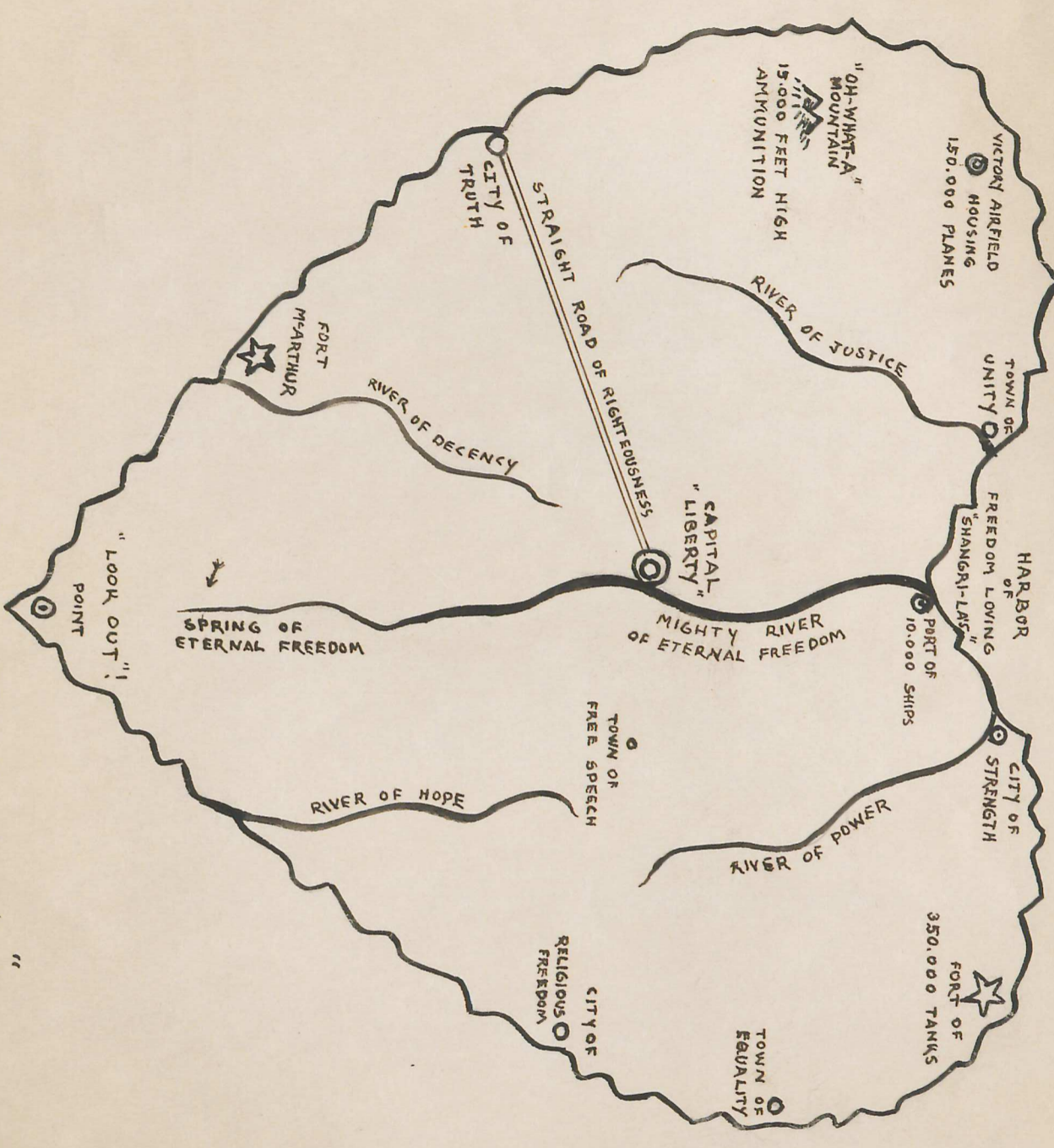
