It will be noted from the above-mentioned despatch that an expression of the President's thanks has already been conveyed to the Foreign Minister. Accordingly, no further action is necessary.

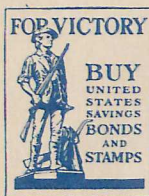

I am sending to you a novel^d entitled "THE ELDER BROTHER",

Gov. Dewey scores a telling point when he contends that President Roosevelt is not an indispensable man, and that our hopes of enduring peace must not be built on the perishable foundation of a single personality.

President Roosevelt is not an indispensable man. A fourth term would be two terms more than had been accorded any other President in our history. The people are well aware of that fact, and great numbers feel profoundly disturbed by the implications of a fourth term.

Still, the fact that the President is not an indispensable man does not mean that Gov. Dewey is one. He has been building up an indictment against the President and his administration, but he has not been proving a case for himself. Since no man is indispensable, it follows that Gov. Dewey is not entitled to the Presidency merely on the basis of his winning personality. He is obligated as a candidate to offer a program and principles to the people, as well as his willingness to take the place of the President.

Criticism is pertinent to the campaign debate, but it is not enough. Perhaps the Republican candidate means to devote the final speeches of his campaign to his constructive program, but that would be rather late on the political calendar. Traditionally, the American people have expected candidates to discuss their program and their point of view even before their partisan nomination.

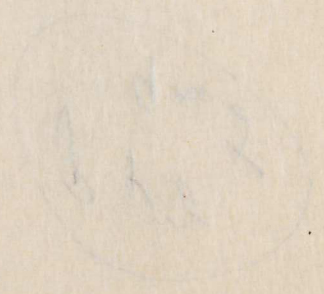

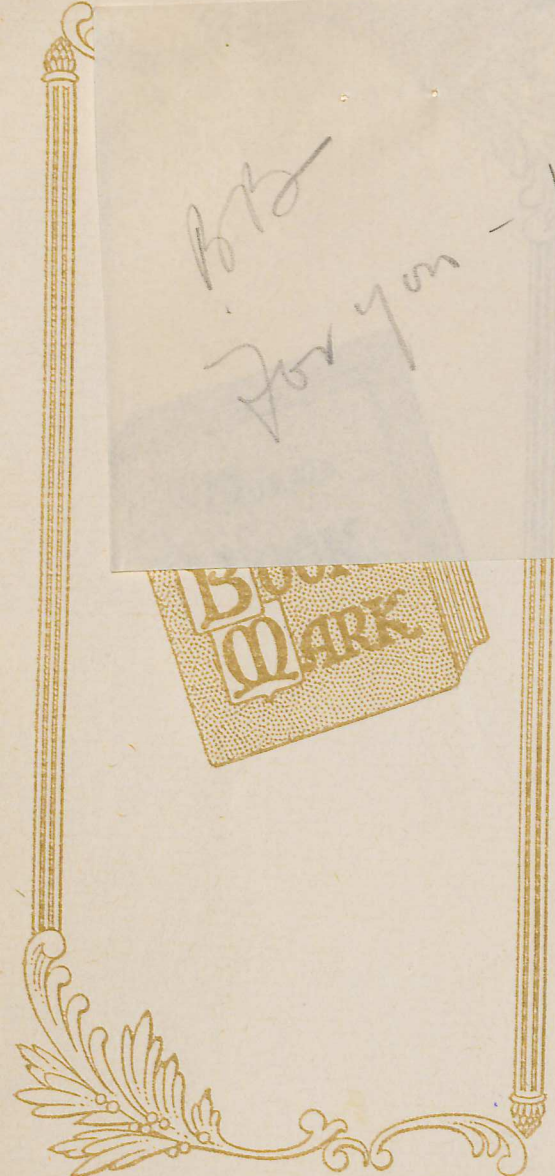
