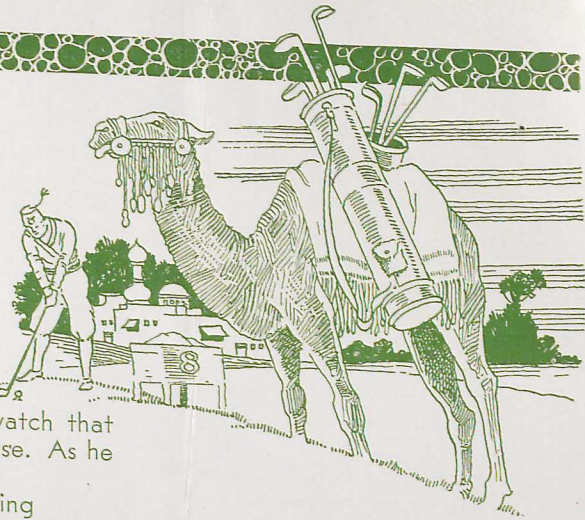

## Pacific Northwest Shrine Council

AT the invitation of Al Kader Temple the above organization held its annual meeting in Portland, Friday, April 27.

Al Kader, Portland, Ore. El Korah, Boise, Idaho

Algeria, Helena, Mont. Hillah, Ashland, Ore.  
Bagdad, Butte, Mont. Nile, Seattle, Wn.

Ten of these temples were represented at this meeting, which was successful in every way. Those in attendance from Seattle were Hugh M. Caldwell, Past Potentate of Nile and

Imperial Assistant Rabban; John A. Bennett, Potentate of Nile; O. B. Joseph, Chief Rabban; Paul Watt, Past Potentate and Treasurer, and Frank B. Lazier, Past Potentate and Recorder. Representatives to the Imperial Council and the Recorder of each Temple form the membership of the Council.

The purpose is to bring the Temples into closer fraternal relationship with each other; to exchange ideas as to the best methods of conducting their business as well as social affairs; to arrange for exchange of stunts in the Second Section; to talk over matters in general covering the Order in the Northwest, and also to discuss new legislation coming before the Imperial Council at its coming convention.

Committees are appointed covering different subjects. They retire; at the end of a specified time bring in their reports, which are then discussed by the Council as a whole.

Grover C. Nolte, Past Potentate of Affii Temple and President of the Council, called it to order at 9 a. m. in the Masonic Temple. About 11, Imperial Potentate John N. Sebrell, who was making his official visit to Al Kader, paid us the honor of a call, and talked to us for a few minutes. At 12, luncheon was served. At 3, the session was closed with the election of Noble A. A. Jessup, Past Potentate of El Korah Temple of Boise, Idaho, and Emeritus member of the Imperial Council, as President. The following were re-elected: Dr. Spotswood, Past Potentate of Algeria Temple, Helena, Mont., Vice-President; Hugh J. Boyd, Past Potentate of Al Kader Temple, Treasurer, and Frank B. Lazier of Nile, Secretary.

Al Kader maintained its enviable reputation as a host, and the different Temples are deeply appreciative.

## Origin of the Shrine

DO YOU go much on ancestry? Perhaps you do. Perhaps you don't. That's a matter of personal privilege, anyway. I suppose, however, that you are interested in being able to show a proper birth certificate. Most of us are. That being the case, I thought it might be interesting to you to know something more than possibly you may already know about the birth place and birth certificate of the Ancient Arabic Order of the Mystic Shrine for North America. All right. Here's a brief outline, if you will bear with me for a few minutes.

Two men stand out most prominently in its formation. Dr. Walter M. Fleming, an eminent physician and surgeon and Masonic scholar, and Wm. J. (Billy) Florence, the actor. Both of New York City.

Some, there are, who claim to trace its ancestry back to an institution founded by Kalif-Alee, son-in-law of the Prophet Mohammed, A. D. 656, at Mecca, in Arabia, as a Vigilance Committee to bring to justice those who had escaped their just deserts through the tardiness of the law, and to promote religious toleration among cultured men of all nations. From what we know of Islamism, they may have succeeded as a Vigilance Committee, but failed as far as toleration was concerned. The above claim is rather far fetched to give serious credence to. Some claim that Billy Florence, who had traveled extensively in Europe and the Far East, including Egypt and Arabia, had been initiated into some one of the Ancient Orders or Societies, existing there, and from them got his ideas for the Shrine. However, there is nothing certain about that. Others claim that in his travels he acquired some knowledge of the mysteries and ritualism of some of those Societies, and communicated it to Dr. Fleming, who with other Masons used it as a basis for our Ritual and our Order. That seems reasonable. Others claim there is no such connection. All right. What does it matter? It isn't what your ancestors accomplished that counts, anyway. It's what you accomplish. It isn't how your ancestors lived that matters. It's how you have lived.

This you can depend upon. Your Order has a birth certificate, all right enough. So you can rest easy as to its respectability; and its accomplishments speak for themselves.

Dr. Fleming, Billy Florence, and a number of other prominent Masonic friends, said to be thirteen, who were in the habit of meeting frequently together, conceived the idea of forming an association that would bring them still more closely together. Out of this idea the Shrine was developed. Dr. Fleming, the Masonic scholar, probably had most to do with writing the ritual. It surely bears evidence of careful research into some ancient and

beautiful order of religion. The fact that they adopted Arabic and Egyptian symbols, shows the influence of the actor Florence. The jeweled costumes; the picturesque Arab with his tent and the Holy City of Mecca together with the religion it typified, naturally appealed to him, and bears out the idea that he may have acquired those ideas while traveling in the East.

However that may be, the ritual was actually written some time during 1870. On the 16th of June, 1871, eleven members were admitted. These, with Fleming and Florence, probably formed the thirteen already referred to. The real date of its birth certificate, however, was September 26th, 1872, at which time the Order was formally organized in the City of New York, under the name of "Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine for North America," and resulted in the establishment of the first Shrine Temple under the name of Mecca.

While the idea of associating these genial spirits more closely together may have been at first for the purpose of developing a purely social Masonic organization, it has since developed, as you well know, into one of the greatest Fraternal Orders in the world. An Order where the spirit of cheerfulness and helpfulness prevails; where upright men can meet in harmony and frank goodfellowship, without fear of discussion of political, religious or personal differences, and where they can indulge in pleasure without intemperance; hospitality without rudeness and jollity without coarseness.

Its growth has been phenomenal. In 62 years it has acquired a membership of over half a million, in 157 Temples. It surely has developed the most wonderful playground in the world for its members, and, at the same time, developed the finest possible spirit of fraternity among men.

If it had accomplished nothing more, it would have amply justified

its existence, and given every Noble cause to be proud of his membership. Its taking on, in 1920, the more serious and glorious humanitarian work of building and operating hospitals for the care and cure of Crippled Children, (as referred to in the April issue of this magazine), gives the Nobility still greater cause to glory in the fact that they are Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

The founders evidently were members of either the Knights Templar of the York Rite, or the 32nd Degree of the Scottish Rite, bodies of Freemasonry, because they made membership in one of those bodies a prerequisite to membership in the Shrine. Wise, indeed, were they in this provision. Wiser, perhaps, than they knew. Those two great Masonic bodies had been traveling in parallel lines. As a result, there was not quite the close companionship or cooperation between them that was desirable. The Shrine changed all that. Like the Apex to a Triangle, it drew members from both bodies and furnished the much-needed common meeting ground for them. The results have been beneficial to both Rites.

Surely the Shrine has good cause to be proud of its accomplishments.

INTERESTING MASONIC HISTORY

ON February 26, 1930, Masonic members of the House and Senate, and other prominent Masons, visited Fredericksburg Lodge No. 4, F. & A. M., of Fredericksburg, Va., of which President George Washington was an honored member.

Displayed on the Altar for this occasion was the Bible on which our illustrious Brother George Washington, assumed his Masonic obligations and, by its side, the original minute book containing the record of his entrance, passing and raising. The minute book also contained the oldest record in existence, by nine years, of the conferring of the Royal Arch Degree. This was on December 2, 1753. The Bible was published in 1668 by John Field, printer to the University of Cambridge, England. The minute book starts in 1752.

This Lodge furnished to the cause of American Independence seven Generals for the Continental Army, to-wit:

General George Washington, Commander-in-Chief;

General Hugh Merce, hero of and killed at Princeton, N. J.;

General George Weedon, hero of Brandywine and commander of all Virginia troops at Yorktown;

General William Wolford, wounded at the battle of Brandywine, captured by the British at Charleston, and died while a prisoner at New York;

Colonel Fielding Lewis, who married Washington's only sister, and who manufactured firearms for the Army, and commanded a Division at Yorktown;

Jacob VanBraam, Disciplinarian and Drill Master of Washington's Continental Army, was also a member;

Dr. Laurens Brooks, Surgeon of John Paul Jones' ships, was a member, and last but not least of our heroic Revolutionary members was General, the Marquis de LaFayette;

Sir Lewis Littlepage, Chamberlin to the ill-fated Augustus, last King of Poland and intimate friend to Catharine the Great of Russia, and Major General in the Russian Army;

And in the Mexican War, Major General Daniel Ruggles, whose command raised the first American flag over the fort at Chapultepec.

According to other Masonic Lodges wherever located, their just deserts to historic fame, it was in St. Andrews Lodge at Boston that the Tea-Party was organized, that every man who threw tea overboard was a member of that Lodge and that Paul Revere, who made his famous ride, was the Junior Warden of the Lodge, and the man who placed the lantern in the old South Church, was also a member of the same Lodge. This Lodge furnished more than 50 of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence. Those which furnished the five members who drew that document, namely Richard Henry Lee, who moved the Resolution; Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Livingston, were all members of the Order. We also know that every member of the Constitutional Convention, except five, were Masons, and to these Lodges we give due credit, and still proudly maintain our claim.

This Lodge and that of Port Royal, 28 miles distant, were sacked during the War '61 to '65; they being the only two Lodges thus treated in that conflict.

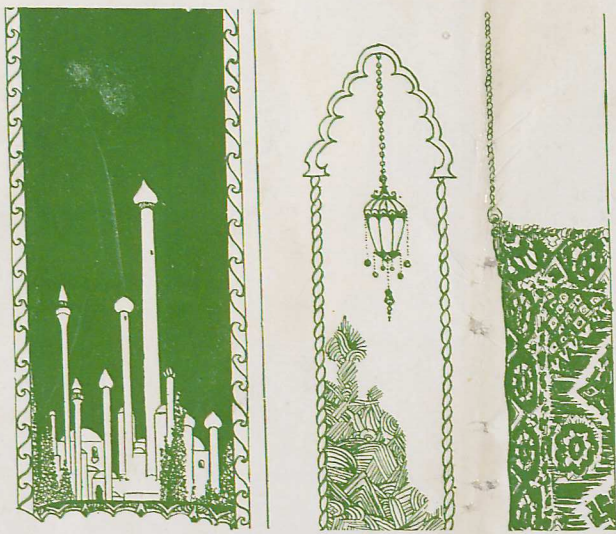

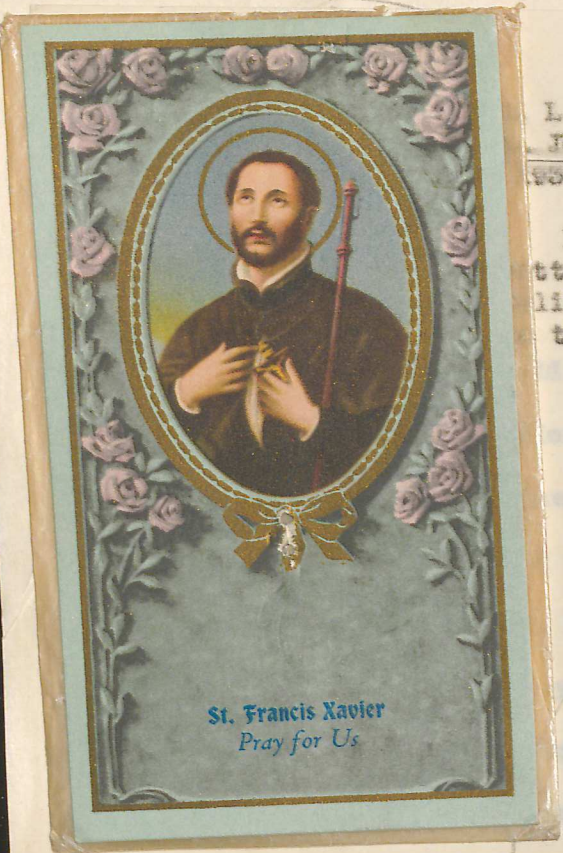
