The press carried this morning the news item "Coffee will be rationed at the Whitehouse." Also the First Lady of our Land stated, "My husband who thinks he is a coffee expert believes that, if dried, grounds can be used more than once, because in drying they become stronger."

Many men enjoy and make coffee brewing a hobby, and often their results surpass the most able chefs.

We have for thirty years sold and distributed almost every type of metal, china, and glass coffee maker and brewer.

The modern and most effective method of brewing coffee is in a Vacuum Glass Coffee Brewer. Not only are the best results attained in flavor, aroma, and body--but this method saves coffee. During normal conditions, one heaping teaspoonful of coffee is required for every cup. The water rising to the upper bowl and fusing with the coffee grounds requires one minute of brewing.
