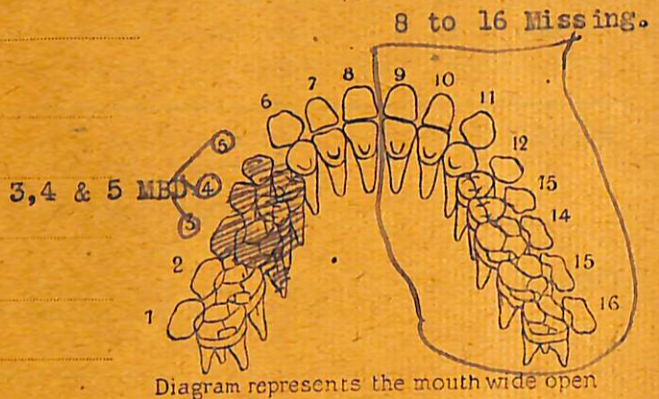
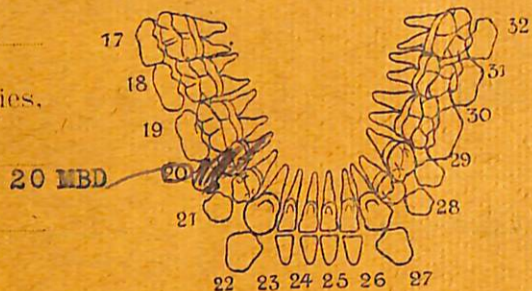


Diagram represents the mouth wide open

I might add that your communication relative to this matter was addressed to "Mrs Samuel Dale , Lehigh and Chestnut streets , Summit Hill , Penn'a" . The address ^{to the father,} now is: Mr Samuel G Dale P.O. Box: 915, Lamsford Penn'a- which is contiguous to Summit Hill

The mother, Mrs Dale died from shock when she learned of the death of her son- there should be some rigid method used in forwarding news of fatalities, to the next of kin- that would make impossible risks to parents that have organic heart weaknesses as was the case of the unfortunate victim in this case. I am not criticizing the government -simply suggesting something that I think could be worked out to good results. I have the honor of subscribing myself,

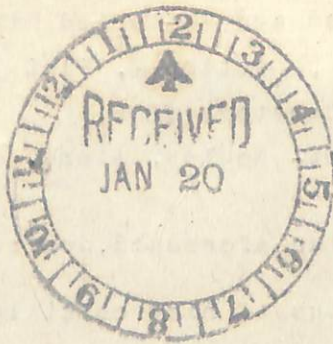
