





It is regretted to advise that Miss Davis is not eligible to make the pilgrimage authorized by Congress in the Act of March 2, 1929, as amended. Under the law, the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe, are eligible to make the pilgrimage.

Investigation discloses that the remains of the late Charles E. Davis, Bugler, Company I, 115th Infantry, were returned to the United States for private interment in Salisbury, Maryland. In view thereof, Miss Davis is not eligible to make a pilgrimage to the cemeteries of Europe at the expense of the Government.

Two men reported in grave 20, Cty # 239, Davis & Orville G. Dryden.

A. Card shows identity as above, K/A 8/31/18, buried gr 1, isolated, C-329, Balschwiller, Alsace, 101 SW, E458.4 x N97.4;-- reburied Fr Mil Cty #239, row 1, gr 20.	F. Form 1-A, D-1622 (2/20/19) confirms the original grave location for Davis in isolated grave of C-329, Balschwiller, Alsace. Form 1-A, D-40075 (10/1/20) confirms reburial into gr 20, Cty 239, Beuthwiller, Alsace; see 2nd Ind., correspondence regarding forms 114 for American dead in Cty #239. There is no form 16 or 16-A that can be found showing the concentration of Davis from C-329 to Cty # 239.
B. File papers show G.L.B. unsigned, giving identity, no dates, but the note "reported killed in raid in front of Gildwiller, Upper Alsace; body never recovered." The reference to correspondence on Biscoe is useless as to additional information. A letter from Maj. Staten dated 6/9/19, with the Ind. answer is self-explanatory.	H. Photo # D-45551 shows cross marking isolated original burial of Davis. There is no photo of his grave in Cty #239.
D. There are very few A.R.C. Searchers reports on the men of the 115th Inf.	I. G.R.S. Engrs Plat, A-383 shows location, plan and all but 2 burials in Cty 239. The 2 not shown are Davis and Flack, both concentrations from other Ctys, seemingly after plat map was made. The same facts apply to the photographs of the graves in this Cty. See photostat herewith. Orville G Dryden is confirmed in grave 20, Cty 239, see statement of case herewith.
E. Location for Davis shown by card in C-329, Balschwiller, Alsace.	J.

SUMMARY

It is the opinion of this investigator that Davis and Dryden are both buried in Cty 239, Dryden in the grave 20 shown on the photostat and in the photograph, and Davis in another grave, called grave 20, either because next to grave 19, or in another row next to grave 21. The record of burial on white card says Row 1, grave 20, and that grave could be at the south end of the row next to the officer's plot instead of at the north end of the row which grave 20 belongs to Dryden.

A letter to Europe is recommended asking an explanation of the location of the grave of Davis. The investigator does not deem exhumation of grave 20 necessary, because the discrepancy seems to be explainable through accuracy as to location.

Your letter under date December 8, 1930 is received in which you state that you regret that Miss Davis is not entitled to a trip to France under Act of March 2, 1929, amended.

It seems that we are working under a misapprehension in regards to Davis. I did not notice the name Charles E. Davis on your first letter even though I answered it using his name. The Davis which we have in mind, whose sister would like to make this trip to France, and who was formally a member of Company "I" is not Charles E. Davis but George B. Davis, a member of Company "I", formally of Hebron, Md. Miss Anna Davis is the sister of George B. Davis and not the sister of Charles Davis as I stated before in my letter to you. This matter was first brought to my attention by Colonel Woodcock and it was his intention that George B. Davis would be looked up as we both knew that Charles Davis' body had been returned to the United States and buried in our city. I hope the information in this letter will help you to straighten out the matter and that you will write me stating fully whether or not Miss Anna Davis would be eligible for this trip to France. Her brother, George B. Davis, was killed sometime in the month of September 1918 near the city of Belfort in Alsace, France.
