F, 137th Infantry, was originally buried October 15, 1918 in Grave #9, Plot 12, American Battle Area Cemetery, Cmme of Chatel-Chebery, Ardennes, and was disinterred and reburied June 5, 1919, in Grave #167, Section 23, Plot 4, Argonne American Cemetery, Romagne-sous-Montfaucou, Meuse.

4. The next of kin were notified of the burial place of 1st Lieutenant W. W. Martin and Private 1st Class Harry M. Day.




Diagram represents the mouth wide open
