



Diagram represents the mouth wide open





Daymon, under the provisions of the Act of March 2, 1929. Section 4 (a) of the Act was amended May 15, 1930, so that it now reads in part as follows: "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for a period of not less than five years at any time prior to the soldier, sailor, or marine becoming 18 years of age."

Under the terms of this amendment you may be eligible to make the pilgrimage. In order to satisfy legal requirements it will be necessary for you to furnish as proof of your relationship in loco parentis the affidavits of at least two persons not related to you.

It is assumed that you desire the privilege of making the pilgrimage to the grave of your nephew, the late Private, First Class, Ulises O. Daymon, Company I, 9th Infantry, in the Oise-Aisne American Cemetery in France, under the provisions of Section 4 (a) of the Act, which states in part "or any woman who stood in loco parentis to the deceased member of the military or naval forces for the year prior to the commencement of his service in such forces".

It has been held that within the meaning of the law, a person cannot stand in loco parentis to an adult unless such adult is mentally or physically incapacitated. No man who was mentally or physically incapacitated was accepted for service in the military or naval forces. Inasmuch as your nephew was an adult at the time of the commencement of his service, his age having been 24 years and 1 month, no person could have stood in loco parentis to him for the year prior to his entry into the service. Therefore, I regret to advise that you are ineligible within the meaning of the law, to make this pilgrimage at the expense of the Government.



1. Returned. In compliance with paragraph 8, basic communication, grave #42, section F, plot 1, American Cemetery No.1764, BELLEAU (Aisne), was opened and the body contained therein exhumed for identification. When this grave was opened it was found that the cross was exactly in the center of two coffins which had been placed with no space between. The body between cross #42 and cross #41 was exhumed first and a tag found thereon bearing the following inscription: "BURNSTEIN, Solomon, #49755, Pvt., Co. B, 23rd Inf." The official directory for Cemetery #1764, BELLEAU (Aisne), shows that Solomon BURNSTEIN is supposed to be buried in grave #38, section F, plot 1.


2. The body in the coffin between crosses 42 and 43 was then exhumed and a tag, which was badly corroded, was found, but upon which the following inscription was decipherable: "HERBERT, -----, #22350--."

3. It was then noted that the cross marking grave #39 bore the inscription "HERBERS." Therefore, in view of the fact that these two bodies were buried side by side, in the same order as the crosses on graves #38 and #39, it was assumed that the bodies in this trench had been buried so close together that when the crosses were erected, in accordance with the present plan of the cemetery, they were spread out, and thus do not now stand over the bodies they are supposed to mark. A narrow trench, one foot wide, was then dug to the end of the plot, and the above supposition confirmed. Fifteen bodies were found between grave markers #42 and #52. The body presumed to be that of ROMIESKO, Andrew, Pvt., 15th Ambulance Co., as indicated by counting the coffins and crosses, was exhumed for identification, with the following results: Body buried in uniform and coffin. Remains badly decomposed. Tag was found bearing only the following inscription: "51402." Color of hair - black. Teeth all present and in perfect condition. Height - 5 ft., 6 ins. It is the opinion of this office that this body is that of Private Raymond B. CHAMBLESS, #251402, Co. I, 9th Inf., in view of the fact that the serial number is identical with the exception of the first figure, which it is quite possible had disappeared from the tag which was somewhat corroded.

4. Attention is invited to the fact that this office is maintaining the original grave numbers for these bodies, in spite of the fact that the bodies do not actually rest beneath their crosses. This has been done in order to avoid further confusion. A record has been made in this office of the above condition, and also in the office of the caretaker of Belleau Cemetery, for reference at the time exhumations begin in this cemetery for the return of the dead to the United States.

5. Grave #97, section G, plot 2, American Cemetery #593, FLOISY (Aisne), was opened and the body contained therein was exhumed by Section #6, Field Forces, who were operating in that cemetery, and Form 16-A covering this exhumation delivered to the Supervisor Area No.2, on December 20, 1920. There is no record in this office of any burial information having been recorded other than that reported on Form 1-A and Form #16 quoted above.

2. Revised Form 1-a covering burials in Cemetery 593 reports Chambliss, 251402, Raymond B., Private, Company I, 9th Infantry, to be reburied in Grave 97, Section G, Plot 2, Cemetery 593. The office of The Adjutant General verifies the name and organization of Chambliss as shown on revised Form 1-A and reports him to have been killed in action July 19, 1918.

3. Grave location blank, signed by C. J. Cole, Captain, MRC, reports: "Chambers 251402 Rammon, Pvt. Co. I, 9th Infantry, buried in Grave 2, American Section, Cimet de LaPaillefonte, Cemetery 348; one identification tag buried with body, one attached to grave marker".

General is unable to identify Andrew Romerski, and inasmuch as Captain Cole signed the grave location blanks for the soldiers buried in Graves #1 and #3, Cemetery 348, which burial information is shown to be correct as confirmed by Form 1-A, and also signed the grave location blank of Private Chambliss who is reported buried in Grave 2, Cemetery 348, it is the opinion of this office that the burial information recorded for Romerski in reality pertains to Private Chambliss although the names are entirely different.

6. The body descriptions and dental charts of Private 1/c Daymon and Private Chambliss afford the following information:





1. Returned. In compliance with paragraph 8, basic communication grave #42, section F, American Cemetery No. 1764 BELLEAU (Aisne) was opened and the body contained therein exhumed for identification. When this grave was opened it was found that the cross was exactly in the center of two coffins which had been placed with no space between. The body between cross #42 and cross #41 was exhumed first and a tag found therein bearing the following inscription: "BURNSTEIN, Solomon, #49755, Pvt. Co. B, 23rd Inf." The official directory for Cemetery 1764 BELLEAU (Aisne) shows that Solomon BURNSTEIN is supposed to be buried in Grave #38 Section F, Plot 1.

2. The body in the coffin between crosses 42 and 43 was then exhumed and a tag which was badly corroded, was found, but upon which the following inscription was decipherable: "HERBERT, -----, #22350 --."

3. It was then noted that the cross marking grave #39 bore the inscription "RERBERS." Therefore, in view of the fact that these two bodies were buried side by side in the same order as the crosses on graves 38 and 39, it was assumed that the bodies in this trench had been buried so close together that when the crosses were erected, in accordance with the present plan of the cemetery, they were spread out and thus do not now stand over the bodies they are supposed to mark. A narrow trench, one foot wide, was then dug to the end of the plot, and the above supposition confirmed. Fifteen bodies were found between grave markers 42 and 52. The body presumed to be that of ROMIESKO, Andrew Pvt. 15th Ambulance Co., as indicated by counting the coffins and crosses, was exhumed for identification, with the following results: Body buried in uniform and coffin. Remains decomposed. Tag was found bearing only the following inscription: "51402." Color of Hair - black. Teeth all present and in perfect condition. Height - 5 ft. 6 ins. It is the opinion of this office that this body is that of Private Raymond B. CHAMBLISS, #251402, Co. I, 9th Inf., in view of the fact that the serial number is identical with the exception of the first figure, which it is quite possible had disappeared from the tag which was somewhat corroded.

4. Attention is invited to the fact that this office is maintaining the original grave numbers for these bodies, in spite of the fact that the bodies do not actually rest beneath their crosses. This has been done in order to avoid further confusion. A record has been made in this office of the above condition, and also in the office of the caretaker of Belleau Cemetery for reference at the time exhumations begin in this cemetery for the return of the dead to the United States.

5. Grave #97, section G, Plot 2, American Cemetery #593, PLOISY (Aisne) was opened and the body contained therein was exhumed by section #6, Field Forces who were operating in that cemetery, and Form 16-A covering this exhumation delivered to the Supervisor Area No. 2 on December

20, 1920. Attention is invited to the fact that tag found on this body, upon which the following inscription was read: "----ISES, C. DAY  
----N, 40075, Pvt. Co. I, 9th Inf. " The body in this grave is believed to be that of, Ulises C. DAYMON, previously carried as unlocated.





The office of The Adjutant General establishes the identity of this soldier as "Private 1/c Ulises O. Daymon, #40075, Co. I, 9th Infantry," and reports him to have been killed in action July 18, 1918. There is no record in this office of any burial information having been recorded other than that reported on Form 1-A and Form #16 quoted above.

2. Revised Form 1-a covering burials in Cemetery 593 reports Chambliss, 251402, Raymond B., Private, Company I, 9th Infantry, to be reburied in Grave 97, Section G, Plot 2, Cemetery 593. The office of The Adjutant General verifies the name and organization of Chambliss as shown on revised Form 1-A and reports him to have been killed in action July 19, 1918.

3. Grave location blank, signed by C. J. Cole, Captain, MRC, reports: "Chambers 251402 Rammon, Pvt. Co. I, 9th Infantry, buried in Grave 2, American Section, Cimet de LaTallefonte, Cemetery 348; one identification tag buried with body, one attached to grave marker".

4. American Red Cross Searcher's report on file in this office states: "Private Raymond B. Chambliss reported died of wounds July 21st 1918, by Field Hospital No. 23 from wounds received in action July 18th 1918. Buried in Cemetery de la Taillefontaine, American Section, Grave No. 2."

5. Form 1-A covering burials in Cemetery 348 reports Romerski, Andrew, #107151 buried in Grave #2. The records further show Romerski, Andrew, #107151, to have been disinterred from Grave 2, Cemetery 348 and to have been reburied in Grave 42, Plot 1, Section F, American Cemetery #1764, Belleau, Aisne. General is unable to identify Andrew Romerski, and inasmuch as Captain Cole signed the grave location blanks for the soldiers buried in Graves #1 and #3, Cemetery 348, which burial information is shown to be correct as confirmed by Form 1-A, and also signed the grave location blank of Private Chambliss who is reported buried in Grave 2, Cemetery 348, it is the opinion of this office that the burial information recorded for Romerski in reality pertains to Private Chambliss although the names are entirely different.

6. The body descriptions and dental charts of Private 1/c Daymon and Private Chambliss afford the following information:

The following teeth were missing at date of enlistment; Upper right #8 and #6, Upper left #8, Lower right #8, Lower left #7 and #8. Upper right #5 was missing or decayed to such an extent as to be unserviceable.

Pvt. Chambliss: Age at Enlistment -- 25 yrs. 5 mos.; Color of Eyes -- Blue; Color of Hair -- Black; Height -- 5 ft. 5 1/2 ins.; Weight -- 110 lbs. No teeth missing at date of enlistment.

7. No further information available.

8.
