The Act of Congress of March 2, 1929, as amended May 15, 1930, authorizes pilgrimages to the cemeteries Of Europe during the years 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 for the mothers and widows of deceased members of the American forces who were lost or buried at sea or whose remains are interred in Europe.

Your attention is particularly invited to the fact that this is the last opportunity you will have to make the pilgrimage under the provisions of the above mentioned Act. Unless you take advantage of this LAST chance to make a trip in 1933 you will receive no benefit from the Act. There is no provision of law which will permit the Government to make a money allowance to any mother or widow who does not choose to make the pilgrimage.

IT IS REQUESTED THAT YOU GIVE THE MATTER YOUR MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION BEFORE REACHING A DECISION, BEARING IN MIND THAT THIS IS THE LAST OPPORTUNITY YOU WILL HAVE TO MAKE THE TRIP AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE.

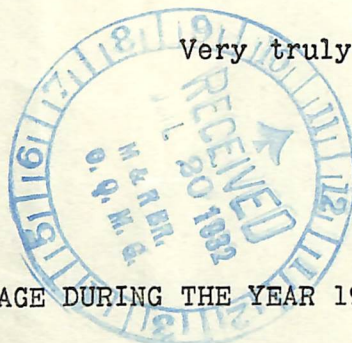

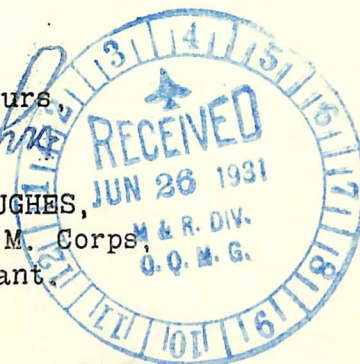



Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of August 29, 1929, relative to the pilgrimage of the Gold Star Mothers and Widows to Europe.

It is regretted that you feel unable to make the pilgrimage to the American Cemeteries in Europe. However, within a reasonable time prior to the beginning of the pilgrimage in May 1930, blanks will be forwarded you upon which to make formal application for the journey, should your health be so improved at that time that you will be able to go.

In connection with your request for information concerning the cemetery in which you son's remains are interred, you are advised that the Meuse-Argonne Cemetery is located near the small town of Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Meuse, France. This cemetery is the largest of the American Cemeteries overseas and contains the bodies of approximately 14,000 members of the American forces. Each grave is marked with a white marble headstone showing the name, rank, regiment, division, date of death and the state from which the soldier enlisted. This cemetery has been beautified with trees, shrubs and flowers, making it a fitting final resting place for our soldier dead.

Your letter has been referred to the Chief Signal Officer, U. S. Army, this city, for consideration of your request for a photograph of the Meuse-Argonne Cemetery, inasmuch as such photographs may be obtained from that office at a nominal cost. You will no doubt receive further information concerning this matter at an early date.

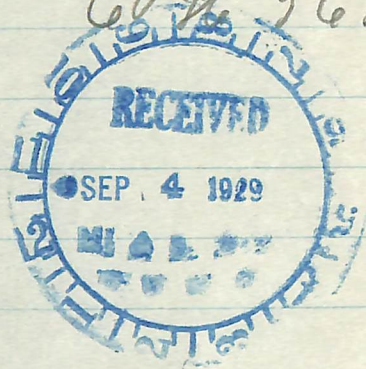

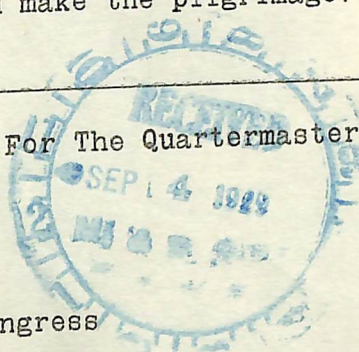

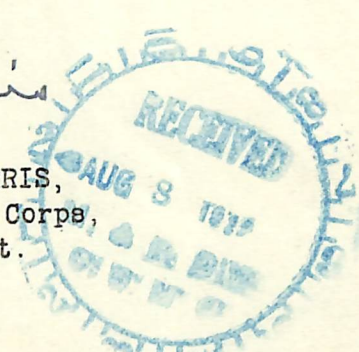

In connection with your request for information concerning the cemetery in which you son's remains are interred, you are advised that the Meuse-Argonne Cemetery is located near the small town of Romagne-sous-Montfaucon, Meuse, France. This cemetery is the largest of the American Cemeteries overseas and contains the bodies of approximately 14,000 members of the American forces. Each grave is marked with a white marble headstone showing the name, rank, regiment, division, date of death and the state from which the soldier enlisted. This cemetery has been beautified with trees, shrubs and flowers, making it a fitting final resting place for our soldier dead.

Your letter has been referred to the Chief Signal Officer, U. S.
