





In making reservations for your journey home from New York City, it is necessary for this office to furnish the railroads with the exact time and date of your departure. The party you are to travel with will be disbanded in New York City on the day following your return from Europe and all arrangements for your accommodations will be made with the railroads by this office accordingly. Upon your return from Europe, it will therefore be necessary for you to remain in the hotel over night as a guest of the United States Government.

J. and did not care to go to the Hotel. She was informed by the undersigned that her ticket was at the hotel and that it would be impracticable to send her by taxi as far as Morristown, N. J. She stated that she did not care about the return ticket, that all she desired was to be taken to the Lackawanna Station, and she would catch a train home. In accordance with her request this action was taken.

From Europe's Chronological Report PARTY "C" HARDING May 20, 1931

The following pilgrims made side trips at their own expense and sailed with Party to New York:

Mrs. A. O. Dean - Visited Cemetery May 30-31 at her own expense, afterwards leaving for London June 3, returning to Paris June 9.

Mrs. E. Ellsworthy - Visited Warwick, England, June 5-10 rejoining Party in Paris.

Mrs. M. Veneziani - Visited Brescia, Italy, June 3-10, rejoining party in Paris.

Mrs. E. M. White Visited Brussels, Belgium, June 6-10 rejoining Party in Paris

Mrs. K. Zalesky - Visited Prague, Czechoslovakia, June 3-9 rejoining Party in Paris.

The necessary visas were secured for the above travel and itineraries planned in this office whenever desired.

Baggage for one Pilgrim, Mrs. Elizabeth Tervay, was damaged in transit from ship at Cherbourg to Paris hotel and replaced at Government expense, Pilgrim not having sufficient funds for this purpose.

From Europe's Chronological Report PARTY "C" Harding may 20, 1931

The Following extract of a report from Capt. John P. Lake, Inf. Conducting Officer Group 1 (M-A) is quoted:

" I wish to report the fact that Mrs. Adile C. Dean, 21 Franklin St., Morristown, N.J. would not associate with other pilgrims of this group.

Mrs. Deal refused to wear any of the identification badges issued by the Government and by her attitude of superiority, made it very unpleasant for those with whom she came in contact.

Every consideration was shown her, both by myself and other officers connected with Headquarters in the hope that her attitude would change but our efforts were in vain. Her "Superiority Complex" remained throughout her visit in Europe much to the disgust of the other pilgrims of the group."

Mrs. Dean was observed at various times by the Officer in Charge and she expressed satisfaction regarding her trip both at her hotel and at the train before leaving for Cherbourg on her return to the US.

Her attitude of superiority which was noted was directed entirely towards the Pilgrims.

Mrs. Nock of Party "B" remarked this same attitude while she and Mrs. Dean were stopping at the Ambassador Hotel in Paris.





Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of May 2nd, relative to your desire to go directly to the boat at Hoboken, New Jersey, when you make a pilgrimage to the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery in Europe, sailing on the PRESIDENT HARDING, May 20, 1931.

It is regretted to advise that it would be contrary to the plans made for the pilgrimage for you to go directly to the boat or meet your party in New York City on the day of sailing. All pilgrims (including those living in New York City) are assembled at the hotels at least one day before the boat sails. It is believed you will realize that where a large number of pilgrims from New York City and nearby points are sailing, if they were allowed to go directly to the pier it would be an impossibility for the Officer in Charge in New York to make any arrangements for them or to be sure each pilgrim had reported.

No exceptions to this rule have been made and it is sincerely hoped you can find it possible to comply with the routing given you. You, of course, understand that all your expenses from the time you leave home, including your hotel bill in New York City, are paid by the Government.
