



Diagram represents the mouth wide open





1. The records of this office indicate that you desire the remains of your son, the late Corporal Isaac C. Phillipps, Company K, 11th Infantry, interred in their present resting place in Grave #49, American Cemetery at Bazailles-sur-Meuse, Department of Vosges. This is a temporary American Cemetery and will be abandoned, therefore, it will be necessary for the body to be removed.
2. The remains may be removed to a nearby permanent French Cemetery, in which event it will be necessary for you to execute and return to this office the enclosed Graves Registration Service Form #123, which relieves the Government of the responsibility for the future care and maintenance of the grave site after the reburial has been effected and formal release given.
3. If you do not desire to assume the responsibility for the future upkeep of the grave, the body may be removed to one of the permanent American Cemeteries in France, referred to in paragraph #9 of the enclosed Cemeterial Division Bulletin, No. 10-G-W. These permanent American Cemeteries in France will be perpetually maintained by the Government in the most careful and reverent manner.
4. In view of this information it is desired that you advise this office immediately whether you wish the body of the deceased interred in a nearby permanent French Cemetery or removed to a permanent American Cemetery in France.
