

"The single most important activity for building the knowledge required for eventual success in reading is reading aloud to children."

-Jim Trelease, The Read-Aloud Handbook

HEN I READ THESE WORDS in graduate school, they rang so true. They echoed as I led story time at libraries all over Brooklyn, NY, and as I raise my own children. Unfortunately, the act of reading aloud is in decline.

New research by HarperCollins UK reveals that parents are losing the love of reading aloud, with fewer than half sharing that reading to children is "no fun for me." Gen Z respondents think of reading as "more a subject to learn than a fun thing to do."

As for reading alone, that same study says that only 32 percent of 5–10-year-olds frequently choose to read for enjoyment, down 55 percent from 2012 (http://bit.ly/43rWl4E).

Additionally, a new report from the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), based on 2024 test scores, found that a record-low number of fourth and eighth grade students in the United States had "below-basic" reading skills. According to the NAEP, one-third of eighth graders had "below-basic" reading skills—the largest number since the exam began in 1969. Also, 40 percent of fourth graders' reading skills were designated "below-basic," the most in two decades (https://bit.ly/4qZ5r2V).

Of course, this is alarming news for parents, educators, and all those who care about children and literacy. But we, librarians and lovers of stories and information, have the solution. It's been ingrained in us since we entered this profession—it's why we entered this profession. Bring back readers' choice. Bring back readalouds. Bring back the joy of reading.

This is our gospel truth. It's why 28 librarians

and five reviews editors came together to select 191 Best Books for children and young adults. Months of reading and discussion, spreadsheets and caffeine, all in service to this splendid list of enjoyable, excellent, and engaging books to preach that gospel.

We hope that this curated offering, filled with adventurous and fantastical stories, silly and breathtaking picture books, true-crime mysteries and stirring romances, and universally consumed manga and graphic novels, will be the joy-making resource that you need to impact the next generation of readers (and their grown-ups).

We hope that each title on this list will prove Maya Angelou's words that "Any book that helps a child to form a habit of reading, to make reading one of [their] deep and continuing needs, is good for [them]."



ÁGUILA, María Dolores. Menudo Sunday. illus. by Erika Meza. Dial. ISBN 9780593462256.

K-Gr 3–So many books attempt to talk about family, community, bonds of sharing, of gathering. This required reading—also a counting book—may instigate new rituals in the homes of readers who encounter it.

AWAN, Jashar. Every Monday Mabel. S. & S. ISBN 9781665938150

PreS-Gr 2—For anyone who has ever been or loved the weird little kid who always does her thing, Awan's spare story will resonate. Mabel's ritual is carried out in an illustrative style reminiscent of Taro Gomi's work; even better, the sanitation truck is right on time, and readers find that Mabel's not such an outlier after all.

BURGESS, Matthew. Fireworks. illus. by Cátia Chien. HarperCollins/Clarion. ISBN 9780063216723.

PreS—Gr 1—Chien gloriously translates sound and feeling to the page, offering children and adults a sensory experience of the inexplicable thrills of exploding lace and rocket bursts in the sky. Burgess provides a steady text that vibrates with the excitement surrounding the displays.





CORDELL, Matthew. To See an Owl. Random House Studio. ISBN 9780593649893.

PreS-Gr 2–Majestic, simple, studied drawings bring the protagonist face-to-face with the natural world. Cordell's certainty of purpose, to show the value and vivid adventures available to those who "look," makes this book impossible to put down.

FORSYTHE, Matthew. Aggie and the Ghost. S. & S./Paula Wiseman. ISBN 9781534478206.

K-Gr 3–Those readers with an annoying, want-to-be-included younger sibling will readily settle into this version of haunting. Aggie can't escape the ghost, and Forsythe's taut sentences and expressively blocky, atmospheric scenes never give away his hand. Deserving, witty, complete.

GOADE, Michaela. Moon Song. Little, Brown. ISBN 9780316461634

Gr 1-4—In alliterative language as lyrical and atmospheric as the moonlit accompanying scenes of northern forest, water, and sky, Goade evokes both the wonders of the natural world and her own Tlingit and Haida cultural background.

HAN, Sally Soweol. Nightsong. Bloomsbury. ISBN 9781547615063.

PreS-Gr 3—Soft drawings feature hard sounds, ephemeral and yet captured by onomatopoeia, as a boy discovers that the whole world sings to him, if only he is still and listening. From the raucous to the sacred, from city to country, Han's illustrations have the look of watercolors brushed across clouds.

HANNIGAN, Jess. The Bear Out There. HarperCollins/Quill Tree. ISBN 9780063289482.

Gr 1-4–In blocky, color-splashed acrylic collage, a narrator becomes that self-possessed, hysteria-inducing voice of campfire stories and urban legends, constantly threatening a visitor with dreadful scenarios of what may come. Groups will lean into every delicious word.

HARRIS, Shawn. Let's Be Bees. Holiday House/Neal Porter. ISBN 9780823457090.

PreS-Gr 2—Father and child cycle through funny imaginative leaps, to be buzzing bees, or chirping birds, or rustling trees, and more. There is no "what does it mean" to this riot of sound effects and crayonlike, ebullient scratchy scenes, but just the lingering need to share this work.

JUDGE, Lita. Old Blue Is My Home. Abrams. ISBN 9781419771521.

Gr 1-4—An old-school picture book in the best sense, the story of a child's longing amid housing insecurity to belong to a more conventional, settled world. Based on the author's childhood, the book comes with iridescent watercolor and colored pencil scenes of home in a snug blue van.


KANG, Angie. Our Lake. Penguin/Kokila. ISBN 9780593698235.

Gr 1-4–Kang's story happens to be about a death in the family, and it happens to be about a lake, but the book weaves new notions of time and space: time together, time to heal, and the space to build memories. Glowing gouache paintings move from sunlight to shadows to show tentative recovery from a devastating loss.


LUYKEN, Corinna. The Arguers. Penguin/Rocky Pond. ISBN 9781984814425.


PreS–Gr 2–The heir-apparent to Edward Gorey, Maurice Sendak, and Hilary Knight, Luyken offers up a brand-new fairy tale that feels as old as time and is relentlessly funny.













Children will understand the joy of arguing, as well as its downside, in a book that needs both group-sharing and one-on-one deep dives.

MANOLI, Costantia. The Fig Tree. illus. by Leah Giles. Roaring Brook. ISBN 9781250763136.

K-Gr 3—Without sentiment but infused with the emotional vibration of a country torn in two, the elegant story of a fig tree in the times before a conflict that led to the dividing of the Republic of Cyprus (Greek Cypriot) from Turkish Cypriot. Collagelike scenes contrast sculptural figs and the thorns of barbed wire.

MATA, Niña. New. HarperCollins. ISBN 9780063318250.


K-Gr 2–A young Filipina wearing hand-medowns on the first day of school stars in a resonant and comic story, offering empathy for other newcomers and a lesson in compassion for onlookers. The story never sinks into tropes as it shows how pushing through is far better than staying behind.


PEÑA, Zeke. Sundust/Polvo solar. Penguin/Kokila. ISBN 9780593700112.


K-Gr 3—Two children, one with a fade, the other with a long looping braid, jump over the wall into the wilder desertscape where chasing sundust and imagination turns into a marvelous adventure. Spare storytelling and all the colors of the Southwest combine into a long, languid, revelatory day. Available in Spanish and English.

RANSOME, James. A Place for Us. Penguin/Nancy Paulsen. ISBN 9780593324882.

K-Gr 4–Ransome's diplomatic note about this heartrending wordless book explains that he hopes to amplify the conditions of those without resources. What readers will find in this effusive day-in-the-life story is a Black American family




















and how they cope with limited money, the public library, and a park bench to create their own version of "shelter."

SARDÀ, Júlia. The Witch in the Tower. Candlewick Studio. ISBN 9781536243017.

Gr 2 Up—Exquisitely stylized artwork keeps pace with the deliberate, winding text of the ephemeral companion to *The Queen in the Cave*. For readers of longer form picture books, this is eye-filling and exquisitely told; a visit to these pages requires only a passport of the imagination.

SHARPSON, Neil. Don't Trust Fish. illus. by Dan Santat. Dial. ISBN 9780593616673

PreS-Gr 3—Readers learn up-close the role of the "unreliable narrator" in this hilarious satire, with deadpan delivery, art and text that take sophisticated liberties with the page, and a jab at the dark side of the internet. Misinformation or good advice? Let children decide.

STEAD, Rebecca. Anything. illus. by Gracey Zhang. Chronicle. ISBN 9781797215150.

K-Gr 3—Through white pages, room angles, black lines, and a judicious use of rainbows, Zhang's art effusively conveys the implied losses of the story, as well as tentative steps forward for a father and daughter in their new life.

STERER, Gideon. We Are Already Haunting Here! illus.by Charlie Mylie. Union Square Kids & Co. ISBN 9781454960478. K-Gr 4–A small ghost in a bowler hat leaves the family haunt to go find a perfect perch of its own. But what it finds? Heartbreak, hauntings, and hope live rent-free in a cannily affecting story of homecoming.

TABOR, Corey. Cranky, Crabby Crow (Saves the World). Greenwillow. ISBN 9780063373587.

PreS-Gr 1–Tabor takes on the superhero trope and sends it into space with this glimpse of stealth friendships among a curmudgeonly crow and the animals it tries to

keep at a distance. Choosing a blocky art style and leaving out needless explanations that might ruin the humor, the author knows that the best heroes keep their accomplishments to themselves.

TEBO, Mary. Sparrow. illus. by E.B. Lewis. Astra. ISBN 9781635926880.

PreS-Gr 3—A resonant story about Jerusalem that doesn't mention Jerusalem; here is Sparrow, at home in a crack in the Western Wall but something is missing. In perfect prose and suspense-building scenes, the story follows a small bird through a day full of promise and offers children a view of a landmark through the prism of hope.

WENZEL, Brendan. Good Golden Sun. Little, Brown. ISBN 9780316512633.

PreS-Gr 3–In scenes that are direct descendants of Eric Carle's tissue-paper gems, a blissfully childlike version of the "what" and "how" of the ever-present sun as it casts a glow over our days; in Wenzel's hands it becomes a paean to mindful interactions with nature.

AGOSTINI, Alliah L. We Dig Fossils. illus. by Joelle Murray. Random. ISBN 9780593812532.


PreS-Gr 1–Ava and her family take a trip to a fossil park, where, after a long day of digging, Ava's hopes of finding a fossil are finally realized. Great with repetition and onomatopoeia, this humorous story is unique and fun.




AHN, Angela. Julia on the Go! The Big Splash. illus. by Julie Kim. Tundra. ISBN 9781774882078.

Gr 2-4–Julia returns to her community's swim team after a hiatus to find that the sports program is in danger of being cut, all while her favorite coach has been replaced by a












much harsher one. With pitch-perfect dialogue, Ahn presents a resonant, slice-of-life chapter book about friendships, pushing past first impressions, and conflict resolution.

ATINUKE. Love from Anna Hibiscus! illus. by Lauren Tobia. Candlewick. ISBN 9781536239515.

Gr 1-3–Nigerian youngster Anna Hibiscus's worldview is changed when she vacations with her grandparents at their childhood village. In this lovely series addition, Atinuke covers topics like child abandonment and socioeconomic disparity in an age-relevant way and offers examples of kids inspiring the adults in their lives by doing good on a local scale.

BAILEY, Jenn. Henry's Picture-Perfect Day. illus. by Mika Song. Chronicle. ISBN 9781797230252.

Gr 1-3—Henry returns in this sweet, funny tale of embracing imperfection and authenticity on class picture day. Prose and illustrations excel in their trademark expressive simplicity. Young readers on the autism spectrum may relate to Henry's musings and his wry skepticism of the "rules" around an important event.



BROACH, Elise. Bulldozer & Friends: Bulldozer Goes to School. illus. by Kelly Murphy. Little, Brown/Christy Ottaviano. ISBN 9780316564199.

Gr 1-3—The delightful construction vehicle makes his school debut. Broach and Murphy continue their long-time collaboration to deliver this stirring and accessible early chapter book about the power of friendship and determination to overcome every challenge.



Gr 2-4–Youngest sibling Miriam is convinced her family is fibbing about the tooth fairy, and she's going to prove it with science. Full of endearing art, including charts, doodles, and field notes, Cypess's novel is a hilarious account of a charismatic Orthodox Jewish girl who will charm kids and adults alike.

navigate the trials of big sisterhood. Haydu's tender prose and inventive vocabulary capture the delight and frustration a new baby sibling brings; Appert's sweet, colorful art highlights an imaginative world of fun words and creatures readers will adore visiting.

HIGUERA, Donna Barba. The Unlikely Aventuras of Ramón and El Cucuy. illus. by Juliana Perdomo. Abrams/Amulet. ISBN 9781419777424

Gr 2-4—The Newbery author's first chapter book series centers a young cucuy (Latine boogeyman) and his first assignment to terrorize a naughty human boy who is more homesick than mischievous. Perennial themes, clever worldbuilding, quirky characters, and Perdomo's adorable art blend perfectly in this just-right, silly entry.



LYONS, Kelly Starling. Ty's Travels: Super Ty! illus. by Niña Mata. HarperCollins. ISBN 9780063083721.

PreS-Gr 1–With a makeshift cape and mask, Ty becomes Super Ty, using his imagination and kindness to save the day—until he faces a problem he can't solve, prompting his older brother to become a superhero, too. This joyful, empowering early reader celebrates imagina-


tion, family, and small acts of heroism.

MEDINA, Juana. Elena Camps. Candlewick. ISBN 9781536216424. **PreS-Gr 2**—Determined elephant Elena struggles to set up her camping tent. Medina's signature art, the short text, and the playful onomatopoeia and humor in this engaging story will show emerging readers the values of perseverance and emotional regulation.

PIZZOLI, Greg. Earl & Worm #1: The Bad Idea and Other Stories. Knopf. ISBN 9780593649664.

PreS-Gr 2—New neighbors Earl and Worm become best friends over the course of three short stories. Similar to Elephant and Piggie and Frog and Toad, this duo will quickly find its place as a staple on young readers' shelves.







RYLANT, Cynthia. Mouse & Spoon: Owlets and Tarts. illus. by Janna Mattia. S. & S./Simon Spotlight. ISBN 9781665962186.

K-Gr 2–At the Mouse and Spoon bakery, three determined mice help a pair of exhausted owls and their babies fall sleep with their delicious treats. Cozy art in a soft palette, paired with brief sentences and a gentle narrative, make for a satisfyingly sweet early reader, perfect for bedtimes.

SKENE, Pat Lamondin. One Beaded Earring. Natalie Laurin. Orca. ISBN 9781459841598.

Gr 1-5—When Delia brings her mom's cherished beaded earrings to school and loses one, she strives to make things right and learns about her Métis heritage along the way. Monochrome illustrations depict a loving family bonding over traditions in a rich, accessible narrative of a multigenerational family reconnecting with their Indigenous roots.

SNEVE, Virginia Driving Hawk. The Summer of the Bone Horses. illus. by Steph Littlebird. Abrams/Amulet. ISBN 9781419759550.

Gr 1-3–A Dakota boy spends the summer with his grandparents at a reservation while his father undergoes a serious operation in this spare and moving early chapter book. Through cultural touchstones and resonant themes, Sneve and Littlebird sensitively capture the uncertainty of familial challenges and the resilience found in intergenerational bonds.





APPLEGATE, Katherine. Pocket Bear. illus. by Charles Santoso. Feiwel & Friends. ISBN 9781250904362.

Gr 4-6-Created to sit in a soldier's pocket, Pocket Bear now runs the Second Chances Home for the Tossed and Treasured. When a new teddy bear with a fascinating past shows up, he and his feline friend Zephyrina discover even more about courage, love, and the enduring effects of war.



BLANKMAN, Anne. The Enemy's Daughter. Viking. ISBN 9780593623046.

Gr 4-7–It's 1915, and after surviving the *Lusitania* attack and her father's capture on suspicion of being a spy, Marta's perilous journey home to Germany forces her to question loyalty, war, and prejudice. A powerful historical fiction adventure fusion of friendship and survival.







BRINER, Karen. Starry, Starry Heist. Holiday House. ISBN 9780823456444.

Gr 4 Up—When Max meets the mysterious DZ, who reveals that time travel is real and Max can do it, he must choose: go back to correct his biggest mistake or save the painting *The Starry Night* from never existing. This science fiction story skillfully weaves in grounded elements that make it appealing to all readers.



CHERRYWELL, Steph. The Ink Witch. Little, Brown. ISBN 9780316585958.

Gr 3-7—Transgender Becca discovers her witch heritage when Aunt Malatrice casts a spell on her mother; this takes Becca on a quest through a magical world where she will collect the necessary items to save Mom. Equal parts humor and fantasy make for an exciting story of inner strength and courage.

CHU, Kyle Casey. The Queen Bees of Tybee County. HarperCollins/Quill Tree. ISBN 9780063326958.

Gr 6 Up—When Derrick Chan's basketball plans fall through, a summer with his grandmother in Georgia leads him to new friendships, self-expression through drag, and a deeper understanding of his late mother. This book demonstrates courage in the face of challenging situations—even when it's family who poses the biggest obstacle.



EDGMON, H.E. Defanged. Feiwel & Friends. ISBN 9781250874009.

Gr 4 Up–Vampires are out of the coffin, and a cure is now available, but Lux Priddy doesn't want to be cured. So, he runs away to find the runnored city of Nox Urbus, where he













can be himself. With a cast of lovably odd characters, this is a deliberate yet engaging look at the way society vilifies groups who are different from the so-called norm.

GLASER, Karina Yan. The Nine Moons of Han Yu and Luli. HarperCollins/Allida. ISBN 9780063284432.

Gr 5 Up—Told in alternating timelines between ancient China and Depression—era New York, the story follows Han Yu, who travels the Silk Road alone when his family falls ill, and Luli, who is desperate to save her family restaurant. A beautiful, moving story about bravery and the power of art.

IDIL, Raidah Shah. How to Free a Jinn. S. & S./Salaam Reads. ISBN 9781665982634.

Gr 4-8—When Insyirah moves to Malaysia, she's shocked to learn that the spirits from her grandmother's stories are very real and alive there. This thrilling and rich fantasy centers on a girl with the gift to see and control jinn.

KIM, Graci. Dreamslinger. illus. by Drew Alott. Disney/ Hyperion. ISBN 9781368104777.

Gr 5 Up—Aria Loveridge, a Dreamslinger haunted by her mother's death, infiltrates Seoul's kingdom-training program to expose its secrets. She uncovers truths that could reshape her destiny and the world's. Surprises abound that will have readers guessing to the very end and begging for a sequel.

KING, Wesley. Benny on the Case. S. & S./Beach Lane. ISBN 9781665937696.

Gr 4 Up—When thefts threaten to shutter the Newfoundland retirement home where he lives, Benny launches an investigation to save it. This charming mystery, set against a refreshingly unique backdrop, balances an engaging whodunit with rich emotional depth, themes of friendship and acceptance, and a rare portrayal of a protagonist with Mosaic Down syndrome.

LUKOFF, Kyle. AWorld Worth Saving. Dial. ISBN 9780593618981. **Gr 6 Up—**A's transphobic parents drag him to a conversion support group where teens keep disappearing, and he fears he or his friends may be next. Very real-world challenges, such as hate and homelessness, face A, though Lukoff expertly intertwines these with Jewish folklore and mysticism in this heartrending tale.

MANDANNA, Sangu. Vanya and the Wild Hunt. Roaring Brook. ISBN 9781250899835.

Gr 4 Up-When a mythic monster attacks her home, Vanya







is swept into a hidden world of magical books, mythical beings, and long-buried family secrets. This fast-paced fantasy weaves globe-spanning traditional folklore with themes of belonging and self-acceptance, creating a rich, inclusive world where a neurodivergent protagonist finds courage and community.

MEJIA, Tehlor Kay. The Better to Eat You With. Delacorte. ISBN 9780593647073.

Gr 5-8–Evan can't wait to escape her parents' arguing (and her mother's food restriction) at Sonrisa resort with her friends. But something fearsome is terrorizing the camp, and Evan realizes it's as hungry as she is. Mejia sensitively weaves a harrowing yet hopeful tale of parental-induced anorexia with a heart-pounding creature feature.

MESSNER, Kate. The Trouble with Heroes. Bloomsbury. ISBN 9781547616398.

Gr 3-8—Climbing the Adirondack Mountains is not Finn Connelly's idea of fun, but after his anger manifests in vandalism, his sentence is to hike the entire range. Through Finn's poetry and letters detailing his thoughts on grief and adolescent angst, readers join in his breathtaking and deeply satisfying journey.

NELSON, Vanda Micheaux. Radiant. Dutton. ISBN 9780593855782.

Gr 4-7–In 1963 Pittsburgh, Cooper navigates being a Black girl amid tunnoil on a personal and a national scale. Nelson's powerful verse novel centers a tween learning to love herself; readers will appreciate the seamless infusion of notable historical events into a perennially relatable narrative of self-acceptance and compassion.

PAULINO, Jasminne. The Extraordinary Orbit of Alex Ramirez. Putnam. ISBN 9780593859315.

Gr 5 Up—Seventh grader Alex loves science and space, but in his self-contained classroom, he doesn't learn much



















about either. When his teachers tell him he's not ready to join the regular science class, he decides to be his own advocate—and maybe even prove he can be extraordinary.

PYRON, Bobbie. Octopus Moon. Penguin/Nancy Paulsen. ISBN 9780593616291.

Gr 3-7—All the change that fifth grade promises sends Pearl spiraling. When she is diagnosed with depression, she is excited to have an explanation and course of action, but the stigmatization that comes with it leads to more challenges. This novel in verse is one of the most authentic and honest portrayals of depression for this age group.

RANSAW, Rosalyn. Smoke and Mirrors. Abrams/Amulet. ISBN 9781419770135.

Gr 4 Up–After being unfairly blamed for a barn fire, Andy agrees to help a reclusive old man restore a decaying mansion with ties to a vanished magician and an unsolved murder. Fast-paced and layered, this mystery deftly explores race, bias, and trust through the eyes of an emotionally complex narrator grappling with his father's incarceration.

REARDON, Joan. Dad Rock Dragon Quest. S. & S./Aladdin. ISBN 9781665963367.

Gr 3-8—Zadie takes after her rock and roll—obsessed dad, so she can't wait to spend a week with him; if only her mom's boring boyfriend wasn't tagging along. When poachers invade and kidnap her dad's dragon, an epic magical adventure ensues. Readers will love this fast-paced yet emotional exploration of family dynamics.

ROMERO, R.M. The Tear Collector. Little, Brown. ISBN 9780316578066.

Gr 4-8—Malka and her brother Ezra live on an island with the few survivors after the Flood. When Ezra gets the island's illness, Malka is desperate to find a cure. Readers will root for Malka to save the infected islanders in this dark and powerful dystopian tale that is infused with hope.

SMITH, Sherri L. Candace, the Universe, and Everything. Putnam. ISBN 9781524737931.

Phenomenal Loris Lora

This month's cover artist wove aspects of Frida Kahlo's life into a garden of creativity



Since 1997, School Library Journal's December issue cover has been created by an artist whose work was chosen as an SLJ Best Book that same year. Past illustrators include Maurice Sendak, Bryan Collier, and Yuyi Morales. This year's cover was made by two-time Pura Belpré Honor-winning Loris Lora, illustrator of one of SLJ's 2025 Best Books, Frida Kahlo's Flower Crown (Abrams), by Nydia Armendia-Sánchez.

Frida Kahlo's Flower Crown is the second picture book biography Lora has illustrated; the first was Phenomenal AOC: The Roots and Rise of Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez by Anika Aldamuy Denise (HarperCollins, 2022).

In her bordered illustrations for *Frida Kahlo's Flower Crown*, arrayed in the colors of a Mexican sunrise, children can play hide-and-seek with the flora of the region: tejocote, prickly pear, date palm, Mexican wild yam, old man cactus, and more. These have the simple sensibility of potato stamps but are far more delicate—an iridescent feast.

Lora shifts easily from biographies of powerful women to board books that will entice children into reading; in Laura Gehl's Who Laid These Eggs? and Who Dug This Hole? (both Abrams, 2025), the illustrations are full of bulging, bold shapes of friendly creatures that elevate the lift-the-flap concept to fresh new heights.

For May Your Life Be Deliciosa by Michael Genhart (Abrams, 2021), Lora infused the illustrations with the colors of her childhood in Mexico, with saturated pastels that head in the direction of neon but never stray from more subdued origins.

Magazines versus books

SLJ asked Lora what's different about the process of designing magazine covers as compared to book illustration. The difference is designing within the given parameters. For Lora, "this included designing around all the magazine cover text and labels while

also trying to captivate the audience's attention with a single image. It can be quite a task, but I enjoy storytelling and eye-catching images."

The prompts for any Best Books cover artist—stars, readers, celebration— are daunting, but Lora plunged in. "Frida surrounded herself with plants, books and curiosities; I found a connection to the prompts through this," Lora explains.

"The cover was largely inspired by an early spread where young Frida is

playing with her imaginary friend (herself, as a nod to her 1939 *The Two Fridas*) under a cedar tree. I envisioned this version of Frida further escaping into her curiosity and imagination through the books and stories she reads," Lora reflects. "Brightly colored stars, flow-

ers, and animal creatures emerge from the pages and loop around her in the night sky. I think of how the stories we tell also evoke this same sense of curiosity and imagination."

Armendia-Sánchez's text guided Lora's illustration choices. "Nydia's writing was always my north star when illustrating the book," Lora

says. "Whenever I felt like I was too overwhelmed on details of Frida's biography and making sure everything was factually correct, I always referred back to Nydia's storytelling as the main inspiration and focal point. She beautifully blends Frida's biography with nature in a very poetic way, and I wanted to match it. My goal as an illustrator is to bring text

and image together to create a powerful book for readers to enjoy."

She had a chance to contribute details beyond the text, without taking the book off course. "Behind Nydia's words is a heavy amount of research into Frida Kahlo's complex life," Lora notes. "Details about the time period, what her garden looked like, and Frida's lifestyle all support the story in ways that are not mentioned in the text. Incorporating these details and knowing when to pull back was essential. I wanted to make sure it was true to the story Nydia wrote and be able to interpret it in my artistic voice."

As with her work on *Phenomenal AOC*, Lora brings bold visuals to tell the story of a strong woman of color via flattened perspectives and impressionistic blocks that are unconventional in a picture book biography.

Naming such influences as Charley Harper, Alice and Martin Provensen, Mary Blair, J.P. Miller, and Alexander Girard, Lora says, "A lot of my influences come from mid-century artists and graphic designers who are shape-based and graphic in their approach."

She explains further: "Perspective is often implied through basic shapes and can lend itself to storytelling and creating strong compositions. Over the years, I've really learned to embrace this way of looking at things and bring it into my practice with modern sensitivities. Color plays an important role in my storytelling and often helps evoke emotions through the harmonies created. My sense of color not only comes from learning color theory but also from my Mexican culture and upbringing."

Addressing difficult truths

The author and Lora had to grapple with aspects of Kahlo's story that the artist foreshadows in choices that carry through to Kahlo's later years.

"Her iconic brow is instantly recognizable and might be one of the first things we notice when we envision Frida," Lora says. "It was a helpful detail to lean on when depicting young Frida and following her through the years. With any story where we follow a character aging, it's helpful to have a specific feature or color palette to help the reader follow the character. Even on the magazine cover, her eyes and brows are instantly recognizable under her flower crown."

Kahlo's polio and her later, serious streetcar accident are difficult parts to include in a children's book, but Armendia-Sánchez does; Lora embraced the direct approach with the illustrations as well. "We wanted to not shy away from these very difficult parts of her life, even if we found creative ways in showing it," Lora continues. "One of the notes I

remember discussing with the team was making sure Frida's right leg was much thinner due to polio. It might not be noticeable at first, but it's a very important detail."

"Symbolism can be a helpful tool when illustrating difficult moments," Lora says. "Instead of showing an actual accident, we showed her in bed recovering and being uplifted by creativity. But if you look closely at the illustration, near the vase with broken stemmed flowers, I drew a skeleton figurine and toy streetcar on the nightstand to help illustrate this tragic moment in her life and how close she was to death."

"Finally, on the last spread, the team and I felt it was important to show her in a wheelchair painting surrounded by nature. Frida dealt with a lot of chronic pain throughout her life and often painted in bed or in a wheelchair. It's important to show people throughout history with disabilities who also did remarkable things. Frida's resilience is incredibly inspiring and an important fact to know about one of the most celebrated Latina artists in history."

Future projects

Lora has several new works underway, including 123s of Baby's Needs, a sequel to the ABCs of Baby's Needs (both little bee books), and a nonfiction title with Nosy Crow.

"I enjoy being able to illustrate various types of books for all ages and collaborating with authors," she shares. "Recently though, I've been trying to tap into writing and illustrating my own picture book projects and looking forward to being inspired."

Gr 8 **Up**–This uplifting graphic novel reimagines L.M. Montgomery's classic orphan as a queer teen at odds with his estranged grandparents in 1995 Tennessee. Beautifully told, with themes of self-acceptance, friendship, and family, Dan's story will be embraced by Anne devotees as well as readers unacquainted with the source material.

UKAZU, Ngozi. Flip. First Second. ISBN 9781250179517. **Gr** 9 **Up**—Chi-Chi, one of the few people of color at her boarding school, keeps crushing on rich white boys. When her current crush, Flip, accidentally plays her promposal video in front of the whole class, that should've been the worst part of the day. But when they switch bodies, things get even more chaotic. This thoughtful spin on the *Freaky Friday* plot is a sweet and funny reflection on perspective, perfect for fans of awkward romances.

VAN LIESHOUT, Maria. Song of a Blackbird. First Second. ISBN 9781250869814.

Gr 10 Up–An omniscient blackbird weaves together the story of one young woman's bravery in the Dutch Resistance in 1943 and another's search for clues to her family history in 2011. Brought to life through eye-catching il-

lustrations and historical photographs, this gripping tale of risk, resilience, and hope invites readers to consider what impact they might make in their everyday lives.

WALZ, Jason. The Flip Side. Penguin/Rocky Pond. ISBN 9780593617991.

Gr 8 **Up**—After his best friend dies from cancer, Theo's grief fractures reality itself, manifesting into a world turned upside down where he is hunted by the monstrous embodiment of his depression. Rendered in cinematic panels, this brooding supernatural adventure doubles as a highly relatable exploration of loss and how to survive it.

WILLIAMS-GARCIA, Rita. One Crazy Summer: The Graphic Novel. illus. by Sharee Miller. HarperCollins/Quill Tree. ISBN 9780062935595.

Gr 3-7–Bringing Williams-Garcia's award-winning novel to a new generation, this graphic adaptation follows three sisters in 1968 as they travel from New York to California to visit their estranged mother, who sends them to a day camp run by the Black Panthers. Over the course of the summer, they are shaped by complex, funny, and sometimes difficult lessons about family and racial identity. Rendered in a youthful art style, this graphic adaptation captures a pivotal cultural moment in Black history, while remaining humorous and deeply moving.



A fantastic look at neurodivergence, handled with care and accuracy, in the manga medium.

HIMEKAWA, Akira. Kamudo, Vol. 1. Viz. ISBN 9781974757800. **Gr 6 Up**—As the pulse of the life-giving dragon dwindles, the demi-creatures of Hinoaruchi tremble. Ushering in this new







era is Kamuna, the first human in existence. The lore, individualized dragon designs, and plot of prophecy will enthrall fans of high fantasy. Yet it is Kamuna's relatable quest for belonging that etches inward.

HYEON, A & Yu Han-ryeo. My Life as an Internet Novel, Vol. 1. Random House Graphic/Ink Pop. ISBN 9780593901281.

Gr 7 Up-Dani, 14, wakes to find herself in an internet

novel—but as the beautiful main character's sidekick, destined to be used as a plot device and forgotten. As she navigates this world, readers are treated to a metafiction with attractive character designs and highly dramatic moments. With satirical humor at every step, this self-aware tale peels back the tropes to reveal a tender ode to friendship.

HYUUGA, Natsu. The Failure at God School, Vol. 1. illus. by Modomu Akagawara. Yen Pr. ISBN 9798855404593.

Gr 6 Up–Ordinary Nagi rescues a lost boy and suddenly finds herself with an invitation to god school. Discovering powers is a common trope, but Nagi's journey is unique as her abilities stubbornly remain hidden, giving the narrative time to develop intriguing characters and rounded storylines.

IWAMUNE, Haruo. The Color of the End: Mission in the Apocalypse, Vol. 1, Yen Pr. ISBN 9781975397227.

Gr 7 **Up**—In a world ravaged by an unearthly pandemic, Saya and her creature companion drift through ruins, searching for life. When a research institute discovers a rare ability stirring inside Saya, her quiet survival becomes something far greater. Filled with intrigue and intricate art, this beautiful and haunting sci-fi is a slow-burn meditation on humanity.

Gr 4 Up–Timid Hikaru has a great singing voice but only sings into a mop at her after-school job. When her











both his mother and his reputation, he relocates from Yokohama to Hokkaido to live with his grandfather. There, he discovers an alternative to skating—ice hockey. And while he has no idea how to play, his extraordinary skating skills could be his redemption on the ice. High-impact, kinetic artwork propels this dramatic sports journey of pride, rivalry, and second chances.

friendships comfort, bestowing hope that Makoto will find acceptance.

Gr 3-6–Zombies attack Nico in the mine, awakening his family's mod power. With his abilities unleashed, it's finally time for Nico to start his own adventure, just like his father. Minecraft is always in demand, but this series can also be an introduction to the franchise, perfect for younger readers discovering manga.

Gr 8 Up–When Ruri wakes up with dragon horns, she must contend with the upheaval of her new half-dragon identity while wrestling the trials of being a regular high schooler. The horns spark little change beyond forcing awkward Ruri out of her shell with newfound attention and popularity



from curious classmates. More slice-of-life than fantasy, Shindo's book sparkles with contemporary art and dry humor as each panel turns Ruri's (mostly) ordinary life into an irresistible read.

SOUP, Tomato. A Witch's Life in Mongol, Vol. 1. Yen Pr. ISBN 9798855414219.

Gr 7 Up-Ringing with wisdom, this volume imparts

how knowledge can change one's life. Soup's disarming blend of Tezuka and Satrapi tracks Sitara's journey from slave to witch, not shying away from tough realities. Drawing inspiration from 13th-century cultures and figures, this is a soundly researched and respectful gateway into Persian and Mongol history, featuring identities seldom seen in manga.

Gr 7 Up—Hime has loved her best friend since child-hood and was the first to know Akira identified as a girl. When Akira transitions publicly, Hime takes it upon herself to become Akira's protector, even dressing like a boy to support her friend. But Hime must untangle her complicated feelings and motivations to truly understand what it means to be an ally and friend. Big questions and deep conversations explore topics of gender identity, expression, and friendship in a safe space through this tender manga.

TAMURA, Ryuhei. Cosmos, Vol. 1. Viz. ISBN 9781974754649. **Gr** 8 **Up**–A cosmically delicious dark horse! When aliens arrive on earth, there is one thing they need—insurance. Weirdness, thrills, and meditations on the meaning of life coexist in this sci-fi-set piece.

Gr 10 Up–Devotion drives the swoonworthy love story of this bestselling danmei series. For its abridged adaptation, STARember adorns the affable Xie Lian's third ascension to godhood with a gown of gorgeous paintings. The Crown Prince's first ghostly interference investigation is just a taste of the slow-burn romance, tragedy, and mysterious heavenly politics to come.
