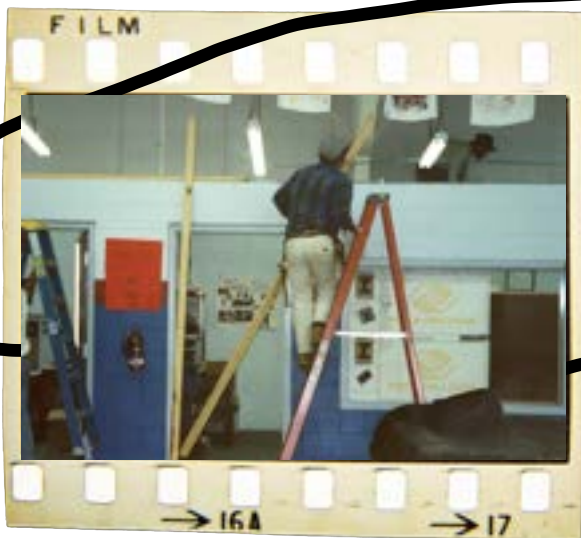
OUR HISTORY



The Boys Club of St. Charles County opened on December 12, 1955 on Clark Street in St. Charles. The Club wanted to help one youth, one life, at a time.



Membership soon exceeded capacity of the old house and on December 16, 1962, the community dedicated the new building on Olive Street. Membership and programs were able to grow at a much faster rate.



In 1994, the Board of Directors voted to build a second unit in O'Fallon to reach the growing population. This expansion out west helped serve kids not just in St. Charles City, but throughout St. Charles County



With the turn of the century, the Club's activities continued to increase. Club kids, volunteers and donors came together for many different community events like this one, "Kids Night Out" in 2000.

Celebrating 70 years of serving St. Charles County



In the 1970s, the club was infamous for their athletics and this led to a life long community of young men who can still recall their times playing at the Club.



During the 80s the Club started to expand their activities with more academic and leadership opportunities. Pictured is the 1985 Youth of the Year winner, Vicky Burke.



The St. Charles Unit moved from its Olive Street location to its current expanded facility in 2014, a 28,000 square feet building with two large gymnasiums

Today, BGCSTC operates two stand-alone facilities and opened its first school-based unit in 2022. In partnership with the Wright City R-II School District, BGCSTC launched an after-school program at West Elementary, allowing students to easily transition from school to a safe, fun after-school program.

Since 1955, BGCSTC has served as a safe haven for area youth. A place where fond memories and lasting friendships are made, while at the same time driving impact for community youth and their families.

HEALTHY LIFESTYLES

These programs develop young people's capacity to engage in positive behaviors to nurture their well-being, set personal goals and grow into self-sufficient adults.

WORKFORCE READINESS

To help young people meet the workforce challenges of tomorrow, they need safe spaces, positive mentorship and work experiences today. We allow kids and teens to, explore their interests and passions, develop their employability skills, and apply their knowledge to real-world work experiences

415 club members completed Career Launch which focuses on career and college exploration.

294 club members that were offered career exploration and post-secondary readiness experiences (career-related field trips, guest speakers, etc.)

175 club members completed interactive financial literacy experiences

OUR VOLUNTEERS

Our volunteers serve as Board members, tutors, advisors, and leaders for special events. These devoted individuals dedicate their personal time to make sure young people are reaching their full potential. In 2025, 722 volunteers showed their love by serving 3814 hours as a crucial part of our mission.

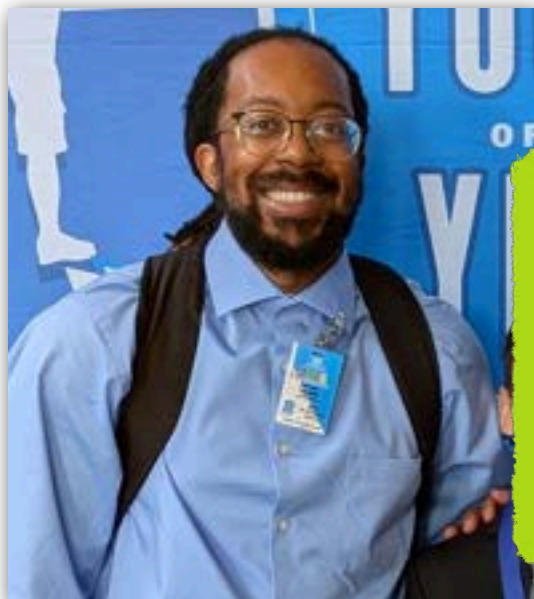

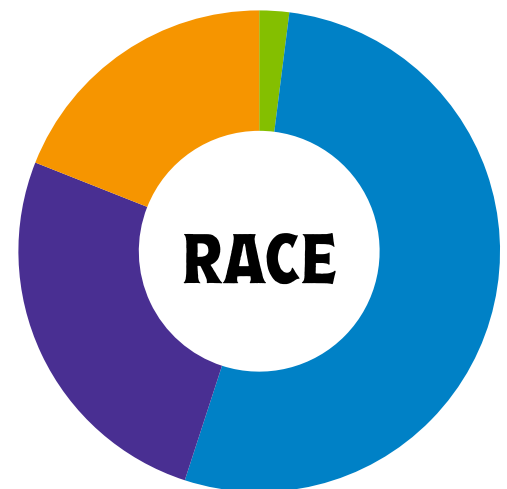

Every summer we host Back-to-School Bash at our St. Charles and O'Fallon units. These community events are open to everyone, no Club membership required. Kids come to have fun and leave with free backpacks filled with school supplies.

OUR ADVOCACY

Boys & Girls Clubs of St. Charles County continued to play an active role in advocacy, elevating the voices of youth in our community.



Advocacy at the local, state, and federal levels enables us to secure critical funding, impactful policies, and legislative support around key priority issues. Advocacy from our board and staff resulted in recognition as a 2025 Champion for Youth for the fourth consecutive year from Boys & Girls Clubs of America, recognizing the top 10% of over 5,000 Clubs nationwide for advocacy efforts.



Our 2025 Junior Youth of the Year, Autumn H, joined peers in Jefferson City for the state Youth of the Year Competition. During the same visit, Club leaders and members participated in Advocacy Day at the Capitol- sharing their stories with legislators to promote support for youth programs. State funding plays an important role in our budget.

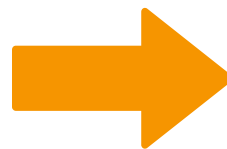

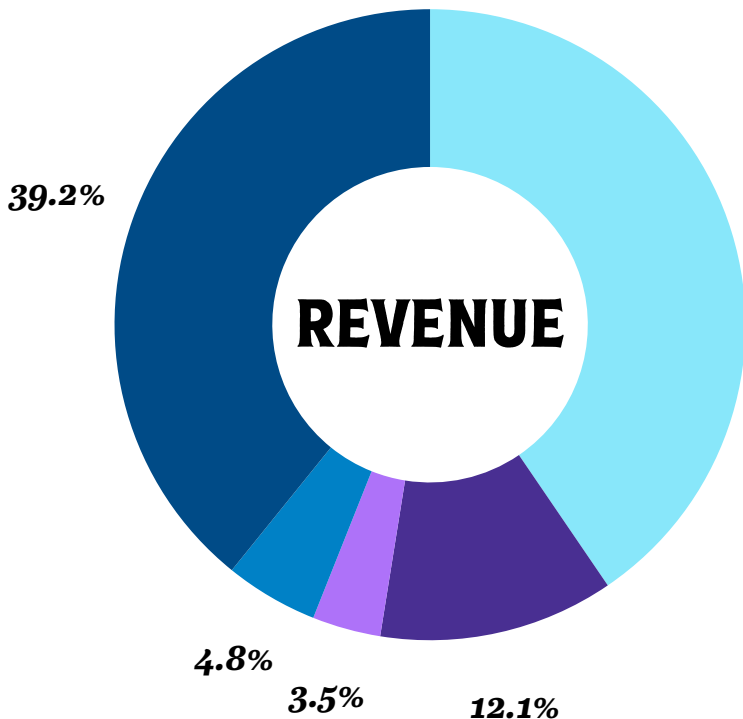

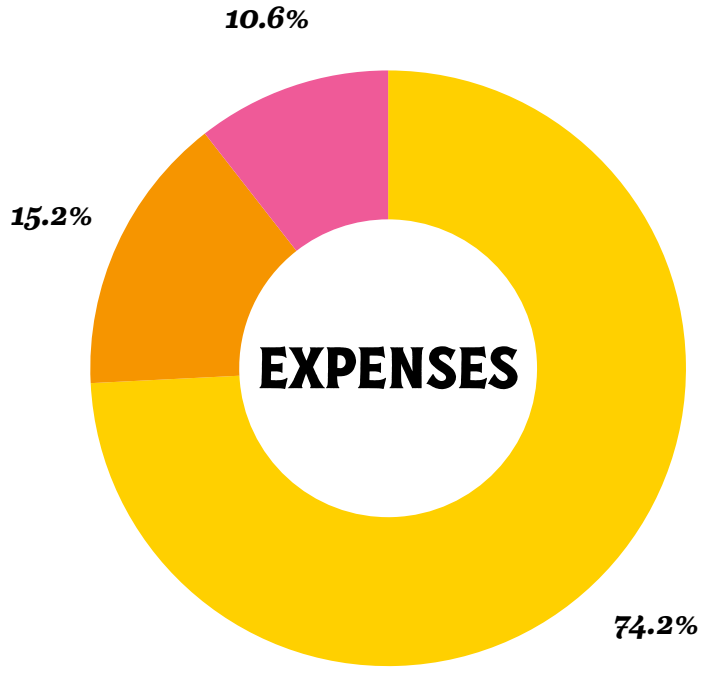
