

### **Timeline of Recent Major Developments (continued)**

The history field is facing multiple challenges, including increased government censorship, cancelled grants and services from federal agencies, and efforts by the White House to promote a triumphalist vision of the U.S. 250th anniversary. **This page highlights the relevant major developments from January through July 2025.**

- **July 25:** Federal judge [grants a preliminary injunction](#) halting termination of thousands of NEH grants to members of the Authors Guild; [in same order](#), judge declines to issue preliminary injunction in lawsuit brought by the American Historical Association (AHA) and fellow associations.
- **June 16:** U.S. Government Accountability Office, Congress's nonpartisan watchdog agency, [finds that White House broke the law](#) in IMLS funding for [grants and contracts](#); White House [lays off 100 employees](#) from the National Archives.
- **June 9:** U.S. Department of Interior requires all NPS sites to [post signage encouraging visitors to report](#) any information they feel depicts past or living Americans or landscapes in a “negative” light.
- **June 6:** Federal judge [declines to issue a preliminary injunction](#) stopping the White House from dismantling IMLS in a case brought by Democracy Forward on behalf of the American Library Association (ALA) and AFSCME.
- **May 15:** Federation of State Humanities Councils and Oregon Humanities [file joint lawsuit challenging executive actions](#) against NEH.
- **May 13:** Judge [issues preliminary injunction](#) requested by 21 state attorneys general in lawsuit filed to defend IMLS; [injunction requires](#) Trump administration to undo steps taken to dismantle IMLS and prohibits further action against agency.
- **May 12:** Authors Guild and group of scholars file [class action lawsuit](#) contesting [cancelled NEH grants](#); federal judge soon [issues order tentatively consolidating](#) this lawsuit with similar suit brought by AHA et al.
- **May 8:** President Trump [dismisses Librarian of Congress](#) Carla Hayden.
- **May 2:** White House releases its [FY26 budget recommendations](#), which eliminate funding for NEH and IMLS, as well as reduce support for NPS.
- **May 1:** AHA and partner associations [file lawsuit to defend the NEH](#).
- **April 29:** [Mellon Foundation makes one-time, stop-gap emergency funding commitment](#) of \$15 million for all 56 state and territory humanities councils.
- **April 10:** Portion of [cancelled NEH grants announced reallocated](#) to White House's “Garden of Heroes” project.
- **April 7:** [Democracy Forward files lawsuit](#) on behalf of ALA and AFSCME in support of IMLS.
- **April 4:** Twenty-one state attorneys general file [lawsuit to defend IMLS](#).
- **Weeks of April 3, 8, and 15:** Thousands of [NEH](#) and [IMLS](#) grants suddenly cancelled.
- **Week of April 3:** Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) [places approximately 80% of NEH staff on administrative leave](#).
- **March 31:** DOGE places entire [IMLS staff on 90-day administrative leave](#).

- **March 27:** Trump signs [executive order](#) attempting to [replace evidence-based history with deceptive, exclusionary narrative](#) at Smithsonian Institution and NPS sites.
- **March 14:** Trump signs [executive order](#) aimed at dismantling IMLS.
- **February 14:** DOGE [lays off approximately 1,000 NPS staffers](#).
- **February 7:** President Trump [dismisses Archivist of the United States Colleen Shogan](#).
- **January 29:** Trump signs executive orders [promoting narrow, incomplete view of history and commemoration](#): one undermining effective and accurate [K-12 history education](#) and one promoting an exclusively celebratory [observance of the U.S. 250th](#).
- **January 20:** Trump signs [executive order](#) ending diversity, equity, and inclusion programs throughout the federal government.
