

Why Relying on Job Boards Can Be Inefficient

- High competition: Many international job postings attract hundreds (sometimes thousands) of applicants, making it very difficult to stand out.
- Low response rate: Even well-qualified candidates often never hear back, because large employers use automated systems to filter applicants.
- **Limited visibility:** Many international jobs are *never posted publicly* they're filled through networks, referrals, or internal candidates.
- Passive approach: Applying online is easy, but it doesn't build professional relationships or cultural knowledge — two things that are critical for global career success.





What Works Better

Use job boards **strategically**, while also investing time in:

- **Networking internationally** (LinkedIn, alumni, professional associations)
- Targeted outreach (writing directly to organizations)
- · Volunteering or interning abroad
- Building global skills and visibility online (e.g., sharing projects, blogging, or contributing to international discussions)

Job boards can be a great starting point for exploring the international job market.

Job boards help you see what kinds of roles exist, which employers hire internationally, and what skills are in demand. However, they should not be the *only* strategy used when seeking international work.



#2c: TOP TIPS ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF SKILLS

MyWorldAbroad's top ideas

- Know how to sell yourself: Getting hired takes more than a good resume (although this is a prerequisite) –
 it takes charisma, networking skills, self-knowledge and confidence.
- Conduct a skill-search:
 - WHO ARE YOU? Analyze your professional self and ask for the input of past employers and colleagues in order to come up with your defined skill set.
 - WHAT SKILLS ARE EMPLOYERS LOOKING FOR: Look at job descriptions and use AI to help tease out what skills will be important for each job.
- Present yourself as a professional: Students have a tendency to talk in terms of what they are studying instead of in terms of the type of professional they hope to be. Have you just finished a master's in economics? Then present yourself as an economist!
- Write an elevator pitch: You need to have a two-paragraph description of yourself fine-tuned and at the ready. You never know when you will be given a short opportunity to sell your professional self to a potential employer!
- Write a target resume: Ensure that every component is written to support your job objective. Focus on your soft skills (while noting your hard skills).
- Develop 5-10 career stories: The easiest way to describe your skills is to show them in action. Describe
 job scenarios that capture your success and skills.
- **Keep your list of skills short, simple and targeted!** We are all complex individuals, with multiple nuanced skills in several areas. However, conveying this complexity to employers isn't possible. Instead, you must simplify your professional description, creating a clear and coherent package that features your top skills. Focus on two or three themes, with only a couple of skills each. Support your targeted job search and to sway the employer with the message: "think of me this way!"



#3: NETWORKING IS THE BEST JOB SEARCH STRATEGY

- Be ready to talk about your skills!
- Focus on a targeted job search (tomorrow's webinar).
- Meet with employers, by phone, by zoom, in a coffee shop,
- Go to in person job fairs.
- Make use of personal contacts.

● Top 10 Networking Ideas to Meet Internationally Oriented Employers

1. Attend International Career Fairs & Global Employer Panels

Look for on-campus or virtual fairs featuring multinational firms, development agencies, or global NGOs.

← Tip: Prepare targeted questions that reveal your interest in global operations, remote international roles, or overseas placements.

2. Join International or Multicultural Student Organizations

Clubs like AIESEC, Model UN, International Business Society, or language clubs attract globally minded peers — and often invite guest speakers from international firms.

f Tip: Volunteer for event logistics or speaker outreach to gain direct contact with professionals.

3. Network via LinkedIn's International Alumni

Use your university's **LinkedIn alumni tool** to filter graduates by country, company, or international field (e.g., "UN," "Embassy," "NGO," "Export," "Sustainability").

† Tip: Message alumni for short informational interviews about their career paths.

4. Engage with Chambers of Commerce & Binational Business Councils

Organizations like the Canada-EU Chamber of Commerce, AmCham, or France-Canada Chamber host mixers, panels, and international trade events.

Tip: Students can often attend at a reduced rate or as volunteers.

5. Attend Events at Consulates, Embassies, or Trade Offices

Many organize networking receptions, internship programs, or cultural events.

Tip: Follow their Eventbrite pages or newsletters — and introduce yourself to trade officers or cultural attachés.

6. Volunteer at International Conferences and Global Summits

Events like the One Young World Summit, TEDxGlobal, or UN-related youth conferences attract global employers and NGO leaders.

† Tip: Volunteering offers insider access and excellent résumé content.

7. Engage with Globally Active NGOs and Social Enterprises

Organizations working in sustainability, migration, development, or global education are often headquartered locally but operate internationally.

† Tip: Reach out for part-time roles, internships, or mentoring opportunities.

8. Leverage Faculty and International Research Connections

Professors often collaborate internationally — in trade, policy, or research.

← Tip: Ask if they can introduce you to international partners, visiting scholars, or companies connected to their projects.

9. Attend Networking Nights Hosted by Global Corporations

Firms like Deloitte, Siemens, Google, and Scotiabank run "international talent" recruitment events or panels about global mobility and remote work.

👉 Tip: Even if the event isn't explicitly international, highlight your cross-cultural adaptability and language skills.

10. Connect Through International Volunteer and Internship Networks

Programs such as Cuso International, IAESTE, Intern Abroad HQ, or UN Volunteers link students to professionals in the field.

👉 Tip: Build relationships before, during, and after placements — many international jobs arise through referrals.



#4: CREATE YOUR OWN OPPORTUNITIES

....because freelancing has become one of the best entry points for students to build international experience without leaving home or while living abroad.

- Offer your services on a contract basis or as an intern.
- Research "industry projects in your field" and identify a service you can provide (easiest for STEM or master's level students).
- Register for freelance job platforms (example UpWork), connecting independent professionals with clients who need short-term or long-term work done remotely.
