INTRODUCTION

The Attorney Professionalism Forum is made possible through the efforts of the Committee on Attorney Professionalism ("CAP") of the New York State Bar Association ("NYSBA") and is published in the monthly issues of the NYSBA Journal. This eBook is a compendium of Forums published in the Journal between January 2012 and December 2020, principally written by Vincent J. Syracuse of Tannenbaum Helpern Syracuse & Hirschtritt LLP ("Tannenbaum Helpern") with CAP members and his present and former colleagues at Tannenbaum Helpern, including Maryann C. Stallone, Carl F. Regelmann and Alyssa C. Goldrich.

The Forum is intended to promote thought and discussion on the subject of attorney professionalism, civility, ethics and professional responsibility. Although often sourced from court decisions and ethics opinions, each Forum is based on hypothetical questions using fictional names, characters and locations.
