



# HIGHLIGHTS – FALL 2021

---

- 1,047 students enrolled: 560 (53%) male and 545 (47%) female.
- Average ACT composite (15), average high school G.P.A (2.57).
- The average age of the student body is 21.
- Tennessee students comprise 607 (58%) of the total enrollment.
- Out-of-state students comprise 440 (42%) of the total enrollment.
- 247 students (or 24%) reside off campus.
- 800 students (or 76%) reside in campus housing.
- Over 8 Million dollars in financial aid was awarded to 92% of Lane college student body.
- Fall 2021 deferred payment plan amount \$105,856.
- 299 First-Time Freshman (29%), 72 Transfer Students (7%), and 676 Returning Students (65%) form the student body.

















### Type and Percent Bachelor of Science Degrees Conferred




## Percent Degrees Conferred by Division





## Distribution of Graduates by Major, 2021




## Total Degrees Conferred, 10-Year Trend (2011 – 2021)

**Percent Faculty by Gender – Fall 2021**




### Percent Faculty by Rank – Fall 2021

### Percent Faculty by Degree



### Percent Faculty by Division – Fall 2021














