Advent is a season of grace when we await the celebration of Jesus' birth. The Advent season is four weeks long.

The first Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of the new liturgical year. On December 8, we celebrate the Immaculate Conception, a feast that honors Mary.

The word *Advent* comes from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "arrival" or "coming."
