

# Job Order Contracting for Construction Procurement




## What is Job Order Contracting (JOC)?

Originally established by the US Army in 1985, Job Order Contracting is a streamlined construction project delivery method designed to help public agencies and large institutions complete multiple small-to-medium-sized projects efficiently – without having to go through a full bidding process for each one.

## Core Concept

JOC is based on an **Indefinite Delivery, Indefinite Quantity (IDIQ)** contract and a unit price book (UPB). Instead of bidding out each project individually, the agency awards a single contract to a general contractor who then performs a series of projects over a set period of time.



## How JOC Works

- The contractor bids an **adjustment factor**, also known as a **coefficient** that applies to a **unit price book (UPB)** – a catalog of pre-priced construction tasks.
- When a project arises, the agency and contractor conduct a **joint scope meeting** to define the work, develop a work order, and agree on pricing using the UPB and contractor's adjustment factor.
- The contractor executes the work under the umbrella contract, enabling a reduced procurement lead time and overall faster time to completion.
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## Pricing Example Formula:

$$\text{Quantity} \times \text{UPB Unit Price} \times \text{Contractor Coefficient} = \text{Final Cost to Owner}$$

## Who Uses JOC?

- Federal agencies (Department of Defense and civilian)
- State, county, and local governments
- K-12 schools
- Higher education institutions
- Housing authorities and public works departments
- Airports, transit systems, and roadway agencies

## Typical Use Cases

- Projects that are operating under pressure due to time constraints
- Minor construction projects (generally under \$1 million)
- HVAC and electrical system upgrades
- Routine repairs or maintenance
- Renovations of all types
- Upgrades for ADA compliance
- Emergency repairs and rapid response work
- Site work and utilities
- Parks and playgrounds
- Upgrade landscaping
- Classroom additions
- Recurring projects such as bathroom renovations, lobby upgrades, compliance projects, sidewalks, and parking lots
