

BOWERY BANK HEAD LEADS COMMITTEE OF 125 TO ADVISE ON SECOND REGIONAL PLAN

Seventy education, civic, business, labor and religious leaders will meet May 25-27 at the Princeton Inn, Princeton, New Jersey, to begin review with Regional Plan Association's directors and staff of conclusions and policy recommendations that will make up the Second Regional Plan of New York and Its Environs.

They are part of a 125-person Committee on the Second Regional Plan that has been formed by James S. Schoff, just-retired chairman of the Association. Schoff is chairman of Bloomingdale's.

Committee Members

Morris D. Crawford, Jr., President of the Bowery Savings Bank, heads the new Committee. Andrew Heiskell, Chairman of the Board, Time, Inc., Gustave L. Levy, Partner, Goldman, Sachs & Company, Courtney C. Brown, Dean, Graduate School of Business, Columbia University, and Roger Hull, President, Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York, assisted in forming the Committee and are members. A list of all the members is attached.

The Committee consists of persons knowledgeable about all parts of the metropolitan area and many aspects of its economic, social, cultural

and physical development. Most members are active in more than one field related to the Region's future. For example, several are professionals, business executives or labor executives who also are directors of artistic institutions or civic or welfare associations or were former public officials. Most of the educators are also experts in a special field, for example, information media or welfare.

The Second Regional Plan

The Second Regional Plan, to be published next year, will offer recommendations on the location of activities that large numbers of people do together--jobs serving a wide market area, department stores, etc.--as well as the major transportation arteries of the Region.

The Association now defines the Region as the 22 counties in New Jersey, New York and Connecticut surrounding the Port of New York. The study may indicate that the metropolitan area will grow beyond the 22 counties by the year 2000, the Plan's target date. Research for the Plan covers 31 counties, running on an axis roughly from New Haven to Trenton and covering the area west to the Pennsylvania border and east to the ocean.

In addition to location of large-scale activities, the Plan will present prototype designs and techniques for encouraging improved design of housing, neighborhoods, communities, counties and important facilities seen by hundreds of thousands daily--e.g., one of the largest subway stations and connecting arcades.

The future of older cities of the Region and proposals for improving living conditions there and enlarging housing choice of city people also will be included.

The First Regional Plan

The first Regional Plan was prepared in the 1920's by the Committee on the Regional Plan of the Russell Sage Foundation. That group established Regional Plan Association in 1929 to advise, on the basis of the plan, the many government and private organizations whose decisions affect metropolitan development patterns.

Princeton Meeting

The Princeton Meeting this week will consider mainly the Association proposals on location patterns of jobs, particularly office jobs, and department stores, higher education, the arts, health services, large libraries, major government offices, hotels and conference centers, adult education, and apartments that might locate in association with these activities.

After a briefing on the facts already gathered by the Association staff and its tentative conclusions, Committee members will discuss them in groups of about 15 persons, with Association staff members listening. In effect, the Committee is a group of individual advisers to the Association and is not expected to issue a formal report after this week's meeting.

The remaining members of the Committee are scheduled to go over the same material in September. Several subsequent meetings of the whole group are planned into 1967.

Other Public Consultation

The Committee on the Second Regional Plan is one of several ways the Association intends to check its work with different segments of the public.

In addition, plans are being considered to continue the Association's 1963 Goals for the Region Project. Then, 5,600 persons responded to the first steps toward the Plan: the identification of development trends over the next generation, the problems they might bring, and the acceptability of some general approaches to avoiding the problems. Volunteers met in small groups after reading background booklets; they watched a half-hour television show illustrating the issues; they discussed the issues; then they filled out lengthy questionnaires which the Association analyzed and is considering.

Some of the Goals Project responses will be discussed with the Committee members.

Since neither the Goals Project participants nor the Committee members are representative of the whole population of the Region (they are more active in civic organizations and well above average in years of formal education and income), the Association wants to consult others as well. The staff is considering projects through which responses to tentative proposals can be made by those of average and below average income and years of education.

In addition, the staff continuously consults experts in the many fields directly affected by regional planning--builders, museum directors, transportation executives, department store, factory and office locaters, hospital executives, leaders in the performing arts, and other planning staffs--county planning directors, the Tri-State Transportation Commission, U.S. Housing and Urban Development Department and Commerce Department officials, and professional planning consultants who do much of the municipal planning of the Region.

Park Study Preceded Second Plan Work

Preliminary to Second Regional Plan work, the Association published The Race for Open Space, a Park, Recreation and Open Space Report. This has been followed by bond issues for parks in all three states of the Region and acquisition as public beaches of Fire Island, Sandy Hook and Breezy Point in Queens. Parks the study recommended at Tocks Island on the Delaware River and Wawayanda in New Jersey also have been acquired.

Immediate Issues of Regional Plan Interest

Among recent recommendations of the Association are:

- that New York transportation budgeting be coordinated with first priority going to transit improvements,
- that the commuter railroads be modernized as a network,
- that the Lower Manhattan Expressway be built below ground level,
- that a planning commission for the Hudson River be established by federal, New York, New Jersey and local officials,
- that the municipalities along the Hudson south of the George Washington Bridge get together to plan the waterfront area for fine apartments, shopping and recreation, replacing obsolete industrial and transportation facilities, and
- that Mitchel Field, a former air base in Nassau County, New York, be used for a modern business, commercial, educational and recreation center for the County.

Regional Plan is a voluntary nonprofit civic organization, supported by individuals, business contributions and foundations. Max Abramovitz, partner of Harrison and Abramovitz, architects, is Chairman. C. McKim Norton is President.


