Plan of Work

To show by an analytical study of a specific instance of inter-racial and general intercultural working together during a crisis, that race prejudice may diminish almost to the vanishing point in a mixed group dependent for survival on its own inner resources. For three years my two young children and I were imprisoned (Philippine Islands, 1942-45) with Negro and dark-skinned Oriental family groups. All normal stratifications of society were disrupted by our imprisonment. A new, cross-sectional, leadership arose. From my internment diary I hope to prepare for publication a manuscript on the leadership phase of our internment experience.

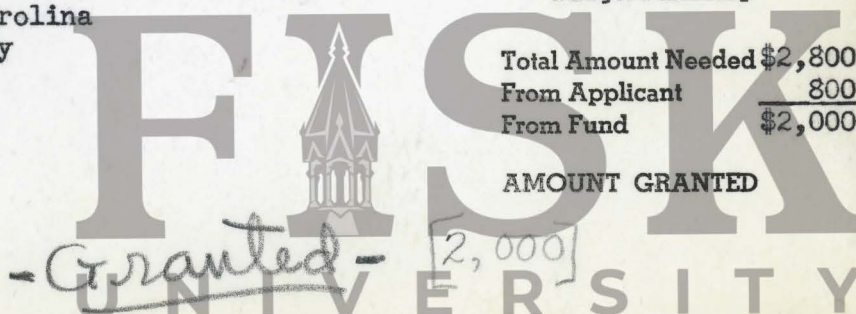

Plan of Work To prepare for publication a study of the changes in class structure which occurred within a racially mixed society imprisoned for three years by the Japanese in the Philippines. Race prejudice diminished almost to the vanishing point within a heterogeneous group dependent for survival upon its willingness and capacity to cooperate. The destruction of normal class and racial barriers within this society permitted the emergence of a new interracial, cross-sectional group leadership.

Requests renewal for six months beginning June 1947. Wishes to continue to study at the University of North Carolina under the supervision of Dr. Howard W. Odum. Expects to go into teaching or to work in the field of race relations in the South.
