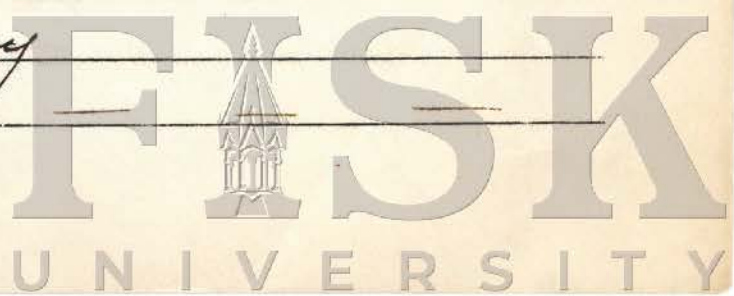

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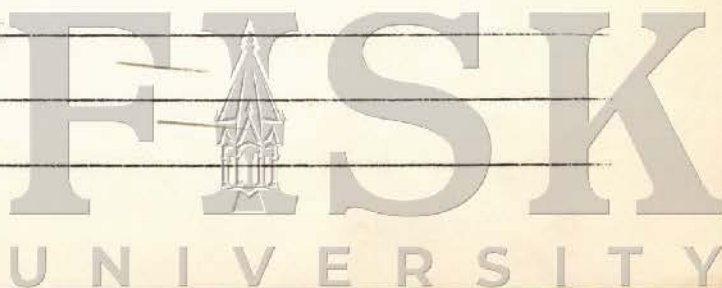

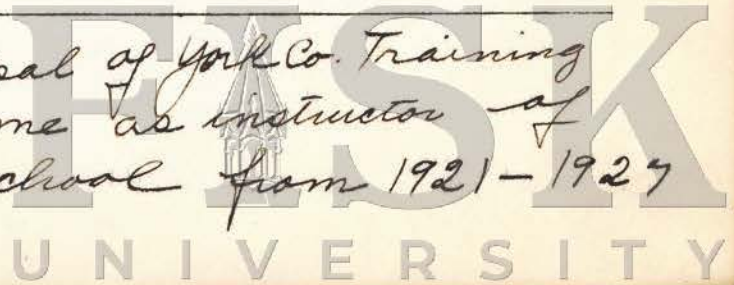

My dear Miss Barrow: I have the honor to inform you that at a meeting of the Committee on Fellowships of the Julius Rosenwald Fund, you were awarded a grant of \$800 to study home economics during the year 1931-1932.

The award is made subject to approval of your proposed course of study by the Officers of this Fund and your acceptance for the course with proper credits by the university in which you propose to enroll.

It is our understanding that you plan to study home economics at Columbia University. We suggest that you make application promptly for enrollment and obtain the assurance of the authorities of the university that on the basis of your present credits, you will be eligible for the Degree of Master of Science at the end of one year of study.

Further correspondence concerning your work, the procedure in payments on the fellowship, and other details should be carried on with Mr. George R. Arthur of this office.

The Trustees and Officers of the Fund take much satisfaction in being able to co-operate with you in your plans for further study.

Dear Mr. William C. Haygood
Committee on Fellowship:

As you know I received the Master of Science Degree from Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y. in 1932. After taking the degree, I returned to my work, that I had started in Home Economics, at Philander Smith College. In 1935 I organized a four-year curriculum in Home Economics (Before going to Cornell my curriculum was a two-year curriculum) I continued my work in revising, and developing our four-year curriculum until February of 1940. At this date the College granted me a leave to continue graduate study at Columbia University, in the City of New York. In February of 1941 I took the Master of Arts Degree, at Teachers College, Columbia University, N. Y. City. Since that time I have done six weeks of summer school ^{work}.

at the University of Minnesota, and one and a half quarters of Summer school work, at Ohio State, Columbus, Ohio. I receive a General Education Scholarship for my first six weeks, at Ohio State. I was sent as a representative from this College.

There is a general feeling that the work in our Home Economics department is constantly growing. I came here in the fall of 1929. At that time there was no Home Economics on the College level. I organized, or am the founder of this department. Our enrollment has grown from about 15 to over 80. From one teacher to five. The expansion of our Curriculum has been in terms of meeting human needs. Over one hundred and fifty have graduated from our department, and are helping to meet human needs in the various Southern states. Some have gone on to do graduate work.

I enjoy my work very much here at the College, and through ^{out} this State.

Aside from my teaching here at the College, I work on fifteen Faculty Committees. I am Chairman of the Division of Arts. A few of my other activities include - teaching in the Church Sunday School, working with the Red Cross Association, and working with the various Community Clubs.

Last Spring ¹⁹⁴⁵ we celebrated the tenth Anniversary of our four-year Curriculum, in terms of an Educational Conference of Home-making.

In "The Philanderian", a quarterly Publication, December, 1938. - I have published an Article "The Place of The Division of Arts in The Curriculum at Philander Smith College." (on page 34)

In The Elementary Magazine, Nov. 1936 Vol. X No. 11 Under the topic "Helps for the Study of The Negro in America" (Page 598) is an article published, that I wrote. Another article that I wrote appears in - The Christian Advocate - Southwestern Edition, February 28, 1935, on page 124. I still have a keen

appreciation for the fellowship that made it possible for me to do my first graduate study.

I am still interested in further training in order that I might render more and better service to the uplifting of human beings.

Philander Smith College has granted me a leave to continue my graduate work, at Ohio State, in Columbus, Ohio.

I plan to leave here December 30th. On January 1st. I'll register for the second quarters work. It is my desire to study, at least a year.

I shall be glad to keep you in touch with what I am doing.

My address after December 30th. will be 200 Lexington ave.
