Just before leaving the office for a vacation trip of several weeks Mr. Rosenwald authorized me by letter to make up a budget for schoolhouse construction in the various southern states, keeping the total within the limit of \$450,000. This amount does not include the RHSHRVE FUND for emergencies in construction, which will be determined on his return to the office sometime between now and July 1st, nor does it include the administrative expenses. Then these are added, the total budget for the 1924-25 will doubtless be a half million dollars or more.

In keeping with this authorization and request of Mr. Rosenwald, I have carefully prepared a budget for the various states, being guided largely by (a) the request from the states (b) the number of projects approved and completed on the present year's budget and (c) the number and size of projects I felt that each state could provide funds for and adequately supervise the construction of for the year beginning July 1, 1924, and ending June 30, 1925. The allotment for Louisiana is as follows:



My dear Mr. Rosenwald: -

No single effort in Negro education in Louisiana has created as much enthusiasm for better schools among these people as your benefaction. It will not be possible to supply the demand for new schoolhouses this year. Already we have twenty houses entirely completed representing an investment of over \$50,000, of which amount you have given \$6,300. Ten additional buildings are incomplete, and between fifteen and twenty will be built this summer. Some communities have been unable to get carpenters and some building projects have suffered from the scarcity of lumber.

When these fifty schools open their next term in the fall of the year, it is going to be hard to supply them with the right kinds of teachers. Our school boards are responding well to the requirement that the length of term for these schools be increased to at least five months, but the salaries of rural teachers is still lamentably low. Even at the low salaries, however, some of these teachers are paid more than they earn perhaps. Rural teachers are untrained as a class. The action of the General Education Board in co-operating with you to send Rosenwald teachers to Tuskegee Institute will help much, but we are having difficulty in finding even twenty-five teachers well enough qualified to get anything out of the summer course.

Some days ago, President Clark of Southern University, our state A. & M. College for Negroes, and I, conceived the idea that we could try to make a beginning towards training teachers for service in Rosenwald schools by providing on the property of Southern University and near the school campus, a model rural school of two teachers. Our plan is to build a house, modern but unassuming, with two class-rooms for pupils, a work room, necessary cloak-rooms and vestibule, and a practice-room for the teacher in charge who will also be the teacher-trainer for rural teachers. This house will be fully equipped and the grounds about will be redel rural work and play grounds.

After getting our project in shape, we applied to Mr. C. J. Calloway for aid toward the building of a Rosenwald model rural school on Southern University property. We called attention to the fact that the school was located in the open country, that children attending were essentially rural, that the ownership of the property would be vested in the public or State, and that this Department would direct every activity of the school. The only difference between this school and other Rosenwald Schools of which this should serve as the model would lie in the fact that this school would be better taught. better managed and better supervised than any other Rosenwald School could possibly be for years to come.

Mr. Calloway replied for his local committee as follows: " The local committee does not think that this particular project comes within the scope of Mr. Rosenwald's plan. This little school would be a part. as we understand it, of an incorporated and strong organization, which would put it out of the line of the little county rural community organization which Mr. Rosenwald had in mind in making his offer. The committee expressed deep interest and approval of the scheme for developing the rural school through this plan. No better or wiser scheme could be devised than this to strengthen the teaching forces for these Resenvald schools. When you see Mr. Rosenwald again there would be no objection on our part to your mentioning this particular method of helping the rural schools, etc."

Instead of waiting to see Mr. Rosenwald, I am writing to know whether we can get a model Rosenwald rural schoolhouse near Southern University this summer. The State Legislature is now in session and we are asking for increased maintenance appropriations, for dormitory facilities, for larger facilities for teaching industries, and for a dining hall. We can get local contributions for a model rural schoolhouse, and a few hundred dollars from state funds, but the most of the money for building and properly equipping this house is not in sight locally. Can you not help us?

My dear Mr. Favrot: While I have not decided positively to decline to recommend that your suggestion about a school for teachers be acted upon favorably, I am inclined to do so because it takes us into an entirely new field. I agree with you that there is a dearth of satisfactory teachers and if we are unable to find them it might be well to discontinue the building of rural schools temporarily. Answering your letter of December 18th concerning the statements which indicate that officials of Rosenwald schools are being exploited: It seems to me that the best way to prevent book agents from selling worthless books to these schools is to furnish lists to the officials which will suggest the proper kind of books. Frequently they buy the wrong kind of books -encyclopædias, reference works, etc. - because they don't know any better.

The Shiloh Rosenwald school, at Chatman, Louisiana, which Prof. Calloway stated has a Delco Lighting System was built on the farm of Bill Chatman, a Negro, who owns a small farm in the Homer oil field section from which he has realized several hundred thousand dollars. He moved out into this country section, bought a very large farm, built a beautiful home for himself, with Delco lights, water system, etc., for both his home and barn. He also built twelve tenant homes somewhat similar to one of our teachers' homes. After he had settled there he agreed to give very generously if the Superintendent would build a Rosenwald school on his farm. I think he paid for the Delco Lighting System entirely because he wanted to make the school a community center where they could have ample light for night meetings.

Dear Dr. Shepardson:

You will find inclosed a letter from Mr. Favrot with an attached communication from Elmer E. Lyon, Superintendent of St. Tammany Parish. I visited the Mandeville School with Mr. Lewis and Supt. Lyon last spring. This is a very attractive two-teacher building, modern and well equipped. The school grounds, consisting of more than two acres, have been fenced in and graded so that the whole appearance of the building and plot is very attractive. It seems to me that children living not more than two miles away should not suffer but little inconvenience in attending a school like this, especially as the climate there is mild.

I think Mr. Favrot hit the key note when he suggested that possibly the woman who wrote the letter to you is the one who was not able to make a certificate to teach in the public schools and is using this method of getting a new school to be paid for by private subscription so that she would be allowed to be the teacher.

In answer to your inquiry of recent date, I begto state that I find by inquiring of my School Director at Mandeville that J. Burton, H. Cade, and a man by the name of Tillman live at the Poitevant and Favre lumber camp quarters, about two miles from Mandeville. Perhaps this Tillman is the name that you write as Sillman, and these three are, I believe, all colored, although I do not know any of them personally.

Some three or four years ago, I offered to give them a teacher, provided they would furnish a house and at once they agreed to it, but later, when I objected to taking the teacher they proposed, because she did not have a valid certificate, they decided that they did not want the Parish to furnish a teacher, and for that reason they could do their own supervising. You understand, I am speaking now of the colored people at Poitevant & Favre's mill and not these men in particular, because I do not remember any colored people down there by these names.

Dear Mr. Favrot:

I have just had a talk with Mr. Finnegan Hams of Morgan City, La., who says he has met you. He tells me that he has been interested in a movement in Perrebonne Parish, which has resulted in the purchase for school purposes of 35 acres of land, and in the establishment of an institution under the auspices of the Baptists. He says there is no public school for Negroes in the community and that there is a great need for such a school. As I talked with him it seemed to me that the conditions were such as to give promise of an opening for a Parish Training School. I gave him a copy of our plan for procedure and told him that the aid of The Julius Rosenwald Fund was only given through the cooperation of the State Dept. of Public Instruction.

In case the proper amount of land from this tract were to be deeded to the proper school authorities, it might be possible to cooperate with him. Regarding this, however, you will know much more than I.

Mr. Hams seemed to be an earnest Negro. He told me he had one daughter about to graduate from Southern University and that his two sons had been trained under Booker Washington.

I shall be glad to hear from you regarding this particular situation.





My dear Mr. Shepardson:

I have your letter of May 25 telling about your interview with Mr. Finnegan Hams of Morgan City, Louisiana, and of the movement among the Negroes in Terrebonne Parish.

I am familiar with the situation prevailing in that parish. Three years ago Mr. B. C. Caldwell and I appeared before the parish school board, heard the superintendent present a plan for the building of one good Negro school in each ward of that parish, had some words to say about the merits of the proposed plan, and left feeling that the public school situation for Negroes in that parish bore promise of admirable results. I regret to say that the superintendent of schools failed to carry out his plans. He built one two-teacher Rosenwald school and stopped there. I have many times, through appeals to him personally and to the school board, recommended the continuance of this progressive spirit, but thus far without any success whatever. It must be, since the school board seemed so willing to go forward with Negro education, that the superintendent was deterred either by prominent sugar planters in his parish whose influence he feared, or by the influence of a neighboring superintendent who is distinctly hostile to Negro education and who seems to dominate school affairs to some extent in that section of the state.

We are deeply sympathetic with the situation in Terrebonne Parish, Louisiana, but since our law leaves the matter of establishing schools in the hands of the parish school authorities, the State Department of Education will be unable to do anything except to try indirectly to bring pressure to bear on the parish superintendent and school board.



Possibly it would be well to ship him one hundred, crated, directly from Chicago to Baton Rouge, Louisiana, and let him mail them out from there, sending us \$100 for Mr. Rosenwald, and pay the expenses of shipment, postage, etc., from that end of the line. Mr. Lewis assumes the obligation for the \$100, and, as he wants them for a special occasion, it seems that it would be very well to send them in bulk. When he collects and remits the \$100 sometime in January, he would give us the name of each school in which a picture was placed for our files. What do you think of this arrangement?
