My dear Mr. Bailey:       Sometime ago you made inquiry as to the possibility of obtaining a fellowship to enable you to get started on your work at the University of Chicago this fall. Unfortunately your application came after the Fellowship Committee had made its selections for this year, and I was forced to write you to that effect.

As I recall, you indicated that if you could get a toe-hold here, you would rather start here this fall with the hope of getting a fellowship soon after the first of the year than to study in some other institution than the University of Chicago. While, of course, no one can be absolutely sure of a fellowship for any individual candidate, I feel that you would not be taking too great a chance if you came on to Chicago and began your work with the hope that the fellowship would come through at the time of selection, early in 1947.

With that in view, I have been making some explorations as to whether or not there would be any possibility of your getting some part time work here, which would enable you to get started this fall. Yesterday, I had a conversation with Mr. Horace Cayton, Director of Parkway Community House, 5120 South Parkway. He was interested in you and thought that there might be a need for your services on his staff, and suggested that I have you write him. He indicated two or three activities where they might possibly need a man of your type, but I think I had better not undertake further elaboration on this point. I suggest, therefore, that if you are interested, you write Mr. Cayton and explore the matter further yourself. It is a little difficult to deal with matters of this kind through someone else.

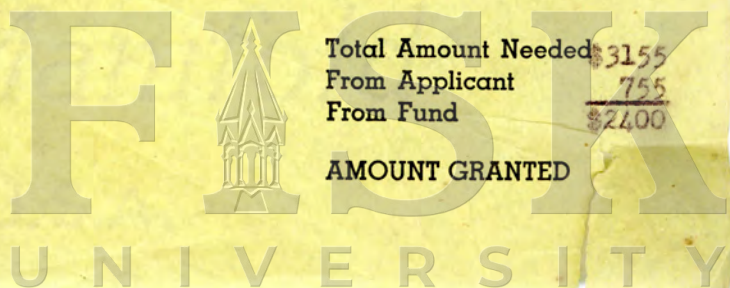

A TENTATIVE WORK PROGRAM PREPARED FOR THE JULIUS ROSENWALD FUND

It is not clear in my mind exactly what is required of a statement of a proposed work program. I do not know whether it refers to a planned academic program or the statement of a specific research project or both, so at this time I can be definite concerning only the general type of work I plan to do. The following is a tentative statement.

My basic interest is social research in the realm of minority group problems. This interest includes both the acquisition of theoretical knowledge and the development of practical techniques for application in specific situations.

For the past four years, I have gained valuable experience at Flanner House in both research and practical community organization; however, I need further training and experience to qualify as a competent specialist in the field.

I have just completed an exploratory study of Negro and White rentals in Indianapolis for my Master's thesis at Indiana University. This study, in part, tentatively explores the possibility of measuring the degree of restraint to "free" competition imposed upon a minority group by comparing equated rent-differentials. Following is a copy of the statement of the hypothesis which briefly describes this viewpoint:

This study is an exploratory attempt to test the hypothesis that Negroes pay higher rents than Whites for equivalent housing accommodations in northern cities. An explanatory principle is provided by the processes of discrimination and competition.

Competition is the regulative principle which produces order in human society as well as in plant and animal life. The competitive struggle for existence regulates the number of individuals, controls their distribution, and develops an approximate balanced relation between their numbers and available resources. Both economic and social competition are human ex-

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tensions of this struggle for existence but on this level competition is more or less controlled by custom and culture.<sup>1</sup>

On the economic level, competition is obviously an imperfect regulator of the activities of individuals and groups who are following their self interests in a profit system. Further, competition at this level is not the only regulator of man's activities as competition for status in any one of a number of directions may produce activities incompatible with competition for economic gain. However, for our purposes, we may admit the oversimplification and proceed to postulate competition as the only regulator of pecuniary activities. Thus in the case of rentals perfectly free competition would limit variations in rents to corresponding variations in size and relative accommodations in dwelling units.

In spite of the fact that free competition is an abstract construct having no observable referent, the concept is useful in considering the problem of Negro and White rentals. We may provide a referent by selecting some available index which we can observe and measure. Such an index is the rent paid by white tenants.

This selection is realistic because our economy is dominated by native born whites who determine the rules according to which the economic activities of our system must conform.<sup>2</sup> It is to be expected, therefore, that the factors of competition would be at least as favorable to this group as to any other in our economy. In other words, competition in the dominant white group should be at least as "free" as could be found in any other group of our economy. In this sense we may speak of free competition for tenant dwelling units as a norm expressed by white rentals.

In addition to being a "white man's country" this is a country belonging primarily to the "elderly, male, upper class, Protestant Northerner."<sup>3</sup> Therefore, to the extent that this group develops and maintains a competitive economic situation favorable to itself and unfavorable to other groups, every other social and economic group is a minority group.

Various impediments to free competition may be imposed upon these minority groups, especially those in the economically weak classes. Since "caste" consigns the overwhelming majority of Negroes to the lower class,<sup>4</sup> Negroes, in general, must overcome the same disadvantages to free competition as other low income groups.

Our thesis is predicated on the further assumption that Negroes must overcome additional disadvantages to competition because of racial discrimination. As an explanatory principle this assumption is confirmed by this study only to the questionable extent that it was possible to subject adequate "controls" through matched samples of data.

These additional handicaps imposed upon Negroes are observed in many forms of competition. A commonplace observation is that when a Negro athlete is allowed to play on a white team (for example, football), the Negro is usually the "star" of the team. The Negro must be superior before he is even accepted into competition. The same circumstances are more or less true in the various areas of industry and education. Negroes, like other ethnic minority groups, must do more and know more than whites to achieve the "norm" in accomplishment. It is in this sense that we expect them to "pay" more for equivalent housing facilities and other "privileges."

Granted these assumptions, a differential in rentals between Negro and white tenants for equivalent housing facilities "in favor of" white tenants may be interpreted as an index of the additional handicaps to free competition for living space imposed upon Negroes by our culture.

This study takes two steps in an analysis of this rent-differential: (1) a critical review of the available literature, and (2) an exploratory study of the problem in Indianapolis using some of the standard statistical methods.

I believe that some indices of restraints to competition can be developed and standardized and that it is also possible to measure their effect on other areas of community life and on the minority group in question.

Further, it may be possible to establish from this technique a race relations index which in any particular community could be used as a barometer of race relations enabling concerned reform groups and civic agencies to direct their activities on the basis of valid information rather than guess work.

At the present time I am beginning a research project to isolate and control the variables effecting the establishment and maintenance of an efficient recording system for Flanner House which can be used both as an adequate basis for evaluating a program and as a basis for continuing research over a long time period. The following is Mr. Blackburn's statement of this problem:

"We would like very much to set up the record control and recording systems in our various divisions which would enable us, now, to record interviews and documents in a way that they would lend themselves easily to standardization and systematic analysis throughout all of our divisions -- health, vocational aids, housing, self-help services, and social services. It is necessary to get sufficient standardization so that the material could be punched as a matter of routine, perhaps on I.B.M. (Hollerith) tabulating cards or some other adequate form of tabulation, so that during our evaluation interval it would be a simple matter of running the cards. We would like to fix this up as a sort of ten-year project for the scientific analysis of community development."

This is a very difficult task but should prove an interesting experience.

This fall I plan to continue further graduate training in sociology. I plan to achieve a working knowledge in economics and social psychology. Also I shall do intensive work in research methods including statistics and methods of sociology measurement.

It is now my plan to continue the study of Negro and White rentals for my Ph. D. thesis. I would like to run another explorative study in Bloomington and then run a major study in Chicago.

I am not definite as to the exact type of work I shall do after an interval of study. Mr. Blackburn assures me that Flanner House is developing a laboratory for competent social research which will need my continued services.

To me this phase is not overly important at present because there are problems to be solved and a growing interest in finding ways to solve them.

I fully realize that this statement is inadequate and hastily prepared, however, it is the best I can offer under the circumstances.

Your consideration of my application for fellowship is deeply appreciated.
