Mr. Willey was given permission to defer work under his grant for one year in order to take part in a survey with the Institute of Andean Research, in Peru. The Andean Institute is sponsored by the Committee on Cultural and Commercial Relations between the American Republics.

Mr. Willey returned to the United States in May, 1942. He used the results of his Peruvian study as his Ph. D. dissertation, since the U. S. Government provided funds for immediate publication of South American Study. Ph. D. will be conferred by Columbia University in February, 1943. Will teach two courses at Columbia during 1942-43, and devote balance of time to research and writing of comprehensive volume, "Introduction to Florida Archaeology". 6/22/42
