Dear Mr. Embree: As I think I have already told you, ~~Mr. Bond~~ has become extremely interested in the school survey which we are making together and is very anxious to continue working with it until it is finished. When he made his original application for a scholarship for the London School of Economics we both thought that the survey would be finished in time. Later, when we saw that it could not be done, Mr. Bond considered going to London in January. He now finds that entrance in January will not be satisfactory, as courses are continuous rather than divided as they are in this country. For this reason, Mr. Bond has decided to give up the scholarship for this coming year and to work on with the Fund until the survey is completed.

According to a conversation which I have had with him and to a letter which I have had from him, which I am enclosing, he had not authorized Dr. Jones to ask for the scholarship for him for study at the University of Chicago and, in fact, is not yet ready to make any such application. Accordingly, I think the best answer to Dr. Jones' letter is a statement to the effect that we have heard from Mr. Bond that he is not yet prepared to ask for another scholarship from the Fund, but prefers to wait until his plans can be worked out more definitely. I recommend, however, that you add in your letter to Dr. Jones that we have been greatly pleased with Mr. Bond's work and that we will be glad to receive his application for a scholarship whenever he sees fit to make it.

Dear Dr. Alexander:

Thank you for your letter regarding Atlanta University. The project is very interesting, but I do not feel as interested in it as, perhaps, I should. The job here has been very interesting, and I have enjoyed it a great deal. In the process I think I have discovered that my biggest driving force is really a competitive one, unfortunately. In periods when we seem to be doing very well, I think of leaving here; but when it appears complicated and hazardous, I am more attracted by it.

For the last few months I have felt greatly relaxed about the place here, what with increased appropriations from the regents, and the like; but I have been made sensible of certain difficulties within the last week or so which excite - (whatever blood it is, since I am not Irish) - my blood, so to speak, and serve to make me wish not to be outdone. I communicated this feeling to Mrs. Bond, who pointed out quite sensibly that it is a very bad basis for doing something, - that is, to try to do something simply because you don't want to be outdone. But such, sadly, is the case; I did not want to be outdone by Brother Joseph Winthrop Holley, late of the Albany School, nor Brother Hubert; and currently I do not wish to be outdone by Brother Aaron Brown, a more formidable opponent at Albany, nor by Brother Hubert, who has had recently a renaissance of energy. Of course this is very petty and little, and there are other reasons; among them being that I have just seduced three or four people from the faculties of other institutions with glowing presidential promises, and I would not like to leave them flat, so to speak, all at once. Then, I have been talking about the education of little children so long, that I would feel lost away from that main interest.

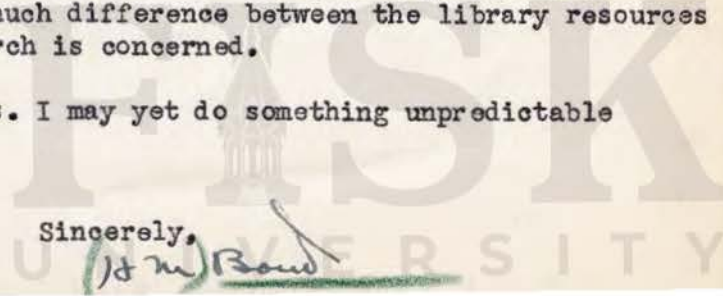
By the way, that might prompt me to leave; some of the Regents have a fuzzy idea of making Fort Valley a sort of fancy-pants liberal arts college - they think we're the best college for the "cullud people," and their idea of the best is that sort of thing - the Episcopalian influence, too, is lurking here.

I think I know what I would like to do best. If Mr. Clement had offered me Dubois' job, and given Ira Reid the one he offered me, I think I might have thought of it more seriously. Incidentally, I am to teach a class at Garrett this summer; and running through the book list tonight, and realizing that I would be in a place where there were plenty of books, it came to me that if I had a job offered to me in a place where there were plenty of books, I would jump at it. But there are no books - you know what I mean - in Atlanta; of course they will come, but right now there is not much difference between the library resources of Atlanta and Fort Valley, so far as research is concerned.

Thank you, anyway, for your kind words. I may yet do something unpredictable about it and my future.

My dear Horace: As a member of the Board of Trustees of Atlanta University, I have been very much interested in the growth of that institution. I have known for some time that President Clement had in mind asking you to come to the University. A note this morning from him of recent date informs me that he had extended to you a definite invitation to become Dean of the Graduate School and Professor of Social Sciences.

Of course I do not know the relative merits of what you are doing in Fort Valley and the opportunities at Atlanta University. I know more about the University than I know about Fort Valley and I therefore feel free to say that I consider the future development of Atlanta University of great importance. On one point I am thoroughly convinced -- that is that there is no one in the country who can contribute more to the development of Atlanta University than you. Your whole background seems to me to have given you unique preparation for the job that needs to be done there. A move of this sort must be considered from many angles and of course you must finally make up your mind where you can serve with the greatest satisfaction to yourself and usefulness to the cause in which you are enlisted.

As a Trustee of Atlanta University, I feel that the University has made a definite step forward if you should decide to accept this position.

Horace M. Bond Elected Lincoln University Prexy

PHILADELPHIA

Dr. Horace Mann Bond, former president of Fort Valley (Ga.) College, was elected president of Lincoln (Pa.) University at a salary of \$7,500, when the board of trustees met here today (Wednesday).

An alumnus of Lincoln, Dr. Bond, who is 40 years old, is the first colored president of the 90-year-old liberal arts college and the sixth in the history of the institution.

Of the many candidates mentioned for the position, serious consideration was given to five others. They were:

Dr. Rex Clement, of Bryn Mawr

(Pa., now a member of the board of trustees; Dr. Raphael O. Lanier, former dean of instruction at Hampton Institute; Dr. E. Fay Campbell, Yale Divinity School; Dr. Benjamin Mays, president of Morehouse College, Atlanta; Dr. Charles Wesley, president of Wilberforce University, and Dr. Bond.

Opposed by Dr. Imes

When the trustees met at Lincoln University on June 6, the name of Dr. Bond was presented to the board for confirmation. Dr. G. Lake Imes, then the alumni representative of the board, objected to Dr. Bond's relationship to the Rosenwald Foundation, saying that he feared such a relationship might lead to the Rosenwald control of the university.

Dr. Imes insisted further that since only a minority of trustees was present, it would be to the best interests of the university to have the presidency decided when more members could be present. The trustees agreed and called a special meeting for June 20.

Further Delay Urged

At Wednesday's meeting, several board members advised further delay on the grounds that sufficient time had not been given to examining credentials of either Dr. Bond or of several other candidates.

The point was finally made that the matter of a new president had been under discussion for three years and that the position should be filled without further delay. Dr. Bond was then confirmed as the sixth president of Lincoln University.

The policy of bringing colored men to the institution as members of the faculty began in 1933 when J. Newton Hill, now dean of the college, was put in charge of the department of English.

Since then, a total of fourteen colored men now have faculty status, while thirteen white men hold similar positions. In professional rank there are ten men from the above total—four colored and six white.

To Maintain Biracial Policy

Lincoln has boasted that she has been, for several years, appointing men without regard to color. The institution operates on a biracial basis, keeps a stable equilibrium in the racial distribution of faculty personnel and proposes to maintain this policy, according to authorities there.

Dr. Bond, now approaching his forty-first year, has distinguished himself in the general field of education.

He is a Lincoln alumnus where he obtained his A.B. in 1923, gained his doctorate from the University of Chicago and constantly associated himself with Dr. McQuiston of Columbia University and of the Rosenwald board in surveying the educational needs of colored people throughout the South.

Native of Tennessee

Born in the State of Tennessee, Dr. Bond has spent the greater part of his professional career in educational work in the South.

He has served as dean of Dillard University, New Orleans; professor of education at Fisk University, Nashville, Tenn., and president of Fort Valley College, Ga.

One of the members of the trustee board stated: "It is to be hoped that the alumni of Lincoln University, happy in the choice of a colored man for the presidency, will rally to the support of their Alma Mater and to Dr. Bond."
