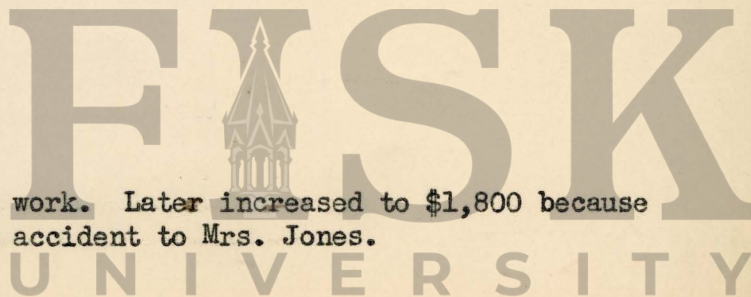

Plan of Work:

To make a practical study of conditions among different racial elements in a given community in Chicago with a view toward bringing into alignment certain conditions that make for misunderstandings, and setting up devices for eliminating them. Would work under supervision of Miss Charlotte Carr at Hull House.

Action of Fellowship Committee:

Granted \$1,500 for one year of work. Later increased to \$1,800 because of serious financial difficulty owing to accident to Mrs. Jones.

Plan of Work

I have been offered an opportunity of attempting to develop a program of "planned action" for Negroes and other low-income groups in Chicago. The aim of this project would be to make a practical study of conditions among different racial elements in a given community with a view toward bringing into alignment certain conditions that make for misunderstandings, and setting up devices for eliminating them.

Would work under supervision of Miss Charlotte Carr, Hull House. Duration of study one year or longer to begin as soon as possible.
