Dear Supt. Marrs: You will find attached budget appropriations for 1930-31, on construction, extension of school terms (no appropriation for new schools in 1930-31), transportation of pupils, school libraries, and Rosenwald School Day Program.

The total appropriation for construction in 1930-31 is greater than the actual amount used by the Southern states during any budget year in the past. Judging from requests of the states for types above six-teacher, the lump sum appropriation will be ample to take care of these larger types and teachers' homes, which will be allocated to states by specific applications.

Previous announcement has been made of the Fund's withdrawal of aid on one-teacher schools and the reduction on the two-teacher type from \$500 to \$400, beginning July 1, 1930, and the desire to place emphasis on (1) the construction of consolidated schools, (2) the development of high school opportunities, and (3) the stimulation of training in vocational subjects, where well trained teachers are to be employed.

On behalf of the Officers and Trustees of the Fund, please let us thank you and your staff for the fine co-operation given us in the past. We hope that you will feel free to offer any suggestions you may desire, looking to the betterment of the work in which we are all so vitally interested.

In addition to the above allotments, lump sum appropriations have been made by the Fund for (1) school-houses from seven-teacher to twelve-teacher types and (2) teachers' homes, specific allocations to be made to states by approved applications, after a careful study of each individual project.

The Fund will also consider giving for the year 1930-31, one and one-half times the regular allotment to the first Rosenwald school constructed in any county having 10% or more Negro population. There are now 101 such counties in the South with Negro populations ranging from 10% to 72%, which have not built a single school by aid of the Fund. This special offer is made with the hope of stimulating a large number of these counties to erect schools of three-teacher type or larger the current year.

The attached plan for distribution of aid shows for the year 1930-31 the schedule of allotments for all types of construction and some general requirements.

Dear Mr. Bludworth:

I have read with interest your letter telling about your complications in securing maps of counties. • Of course, we do not want to put unnecessary burdens on any of the states. We do feel, however, that it would be helpful to you and to us if we could have this information and no doubt it would be beneficial to the county superintendent to go over his county and chart the schools. This would help him to visualize the whole county and see where there might be a possibility for consolidation of one or two small schools into a centralized school. We do not want to hold you up too long but do the best you can. Where it is impossible to get a county map, a district map would give all the schools in that particular district, which would enable you to tell whether or not it would be feasible to consolidate. We are trying hard to cooperate with the states in stimulating the larger types of buildings.

Mr. Credle wrote you on July 26th, calling attention to the fact that we have abandoned use of the county superintendent's blank in filing applications this year. You will notice from the attached blank that the county superintendent signs the original application in triplicate, sending it to you. If it meets fully with your approval, you and the State Superintendent sign and send it on to us. You would naturally go over it very carefully and return the blanks to him for corrections if they did not meet fully the requirements. When the application is approved by this office, you will have two copies and you can send one to the superintendent and he will know exactly what to expect. He will have the official signatures, not only of the State Superintendent and yourself, but of the Julius Rosenwald Fund as well. Don't you think this is better than the old plan?

Dear Mr. Bludworth:

I realize fully your difficulties in securing the maps and I am saying again for you to do the best you can to get such information that would lead up to an intelligent decision as to whether the schools are properly located with reference to a county. Probably in most instances, particularly in the smaller schools, a district outline or chart of the school would answer most purposes, where the county-wide is not available.

If you prefer to have county superintendent's blanks in addition to the blanks which we send out, it will be entirely satisfactory for you to have them made up as you like. Still we would want the county superintendent to sign the blanks which you submit to our office, in keeping with a new policy. After you have secured all of the information, you might make out the blanks and have the county superintendent sign them in triplicate before sending them to this office. You can see that we are trying to connect the work through the state department to the county superintendent, and have complete records in our files. I hope this will cause you no inconvenience.

Dear Mr. Bludworth: Because of the temporary let-up in business activities and the lean crop year, leaving an unusual number of people without employment, it seems to be an opportune time to erect schoolhouses. Wherever school boards can arrange to build now while the cost index of materials is around the bottom and labor can be had very cheap they will not only save from 10% to 25% in the total cost, prices, but will help to furnish employment to a large number of needy people. It would be good business and good psychology to keep all the wheels of the public machinery rolling at this time, and I believe a good educational policy to concentrate on needed building programs.

I notice that some delay in filing applications for construction aid is caused by the request for a county map or drawing to accompany the application. Where this is not available it will always be sufficient in case of schools below the seven-teacher type to have the superintendent make a sketch of the nearby Negro schools giving sizes and distances. This will help you and us, but most especially you, to study the community to see whether there should be a consolidation effected.

We shall be glad to have applications filed for all projects - schoolhouses, homes, shops, equipment and libraries as rapidly as they can qualify.

Do you feel that you will use all your appropriation for schools below the seven-teacher type? If you have desirable projects of seven-teacher type or larger, please let us know in time for one of us to visit these towns with you in order not to cause delay in getting the work of construction begun, wherever applications are approved.

Dear Mr. Bludworth: I note from your letter of the 26th that the Rock Hill School at Sandfield, Hopkins County "was destroyed by fire some weeks ago." You ask what amount of aid they will receive in rebuilding the school since they received \$1,722.36 insurance. Our records show that the total cost of the building was \$3,350. This would make the rate of insurance collected about 52%. If the Fund should aid at all in rebuilding it could not give more than the difference between 52% and 100% or 48% of the regular allotment which would be \$192.

To complete our records I would like to know as definitely as you can give the date and cause of the fire. If it was incendiary we would like to know what steps have been taken to apprehend and punish the guilty one.

I note that this building received the bonus for the first building in Hopkins County about the first of March.

I may get in.


Your letter from Mr. Hiles received. He was in the office and talked to me about this matter and I told him I would have to refer the matter to you. I will take it up with him.

Dear Mr. Smith:

I have received your letter of August 6 this forenoon and read it with care. Allow me to make the following observations:

The difficulty in securing maps does not come from a lack of interest on the part of the county superintendent, but Mr. Smith, we have no such thing as county maps in Texas without a cost of from \$1.50 for a photostat copy to a hundred dollars for an authorized map with districts pasted in different colors. The photostat is merely a copy of the original county map as it now exists in the Land Commissioner's office with the original grants only.

I can make, so can the county superintendent, a map of most any county in Texas. When I make one I have to send it to the county superintendent to have the highways, towns, schoolhouses, etc., placed on it. When I ask him to make it he takes his good time. I will get them in some time, but the process is a very slow one in Texas.

The letter referred to written by Mr. Credle, dated July 26, was received and read by me. Even though he said they had abandoned the use of the old county superintendent's application blanks, I did not have the brilliancy to think that we were not going to use some others. I do not think the plan is for the better. If I were to send these blanks to the county superintendent every time expecting them to be returned filled intelligently, it would take me six months to get two dozen applications properly attended to. It would be necessary under this plan for me to go and make the application with the county superintendent in most cases.

I note what you say concerning signatures of two bonded officials to the checks. The delay is not causing me any trouble, of course, but the lumber men do not understand it. I have always been able to give them the money about ten days after an inspection was made. One of these inspections has been made more than two months and the other two about one month.


The inspection for Comanche, Travis County, Texas, I-J, has not been acknowledged. Neither have I heard from it since it left my desk. The two approved applications received today, 4-J and 5-J, were not accompanied with approved inspections. Have you changed that plan also? In other words, I have in today's mail received from Mr. Credle approved applications, 4-J and 5-J with the statement that checks for these projects would be delayed a few days. Do you expect to hold the inspection reports sent in with these applications? It is the I-J about which I am suffering. These people finished their house about the first of May. I told them I thought I could get the money soon after the first of July.

This letter may sound like a wail. The fact is, I am in a muddle and can't get started off on the Rosenwald business this year. I know not what to do but to unload my worries, or, to put it another way, to have a frank talk with you about the matter. I am willing to do anything you say but haven't been able to get quite in the harness under the new regulations.

I am sending a copy of this letter to you and one to Mr. Credle.
